Telephone Co. Plans Survey of Tri-Cities

One System Hook-Up Study Is Announced

Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. will move a team into Eastland County to make a survey of possibilities of grouping Eastland, Ranger and Cisco into a one unit operation.

That's the information Bell officials gave this newspaper Saturday. The team of men will move into the tri-city area this week to make the study and give their recommendations.

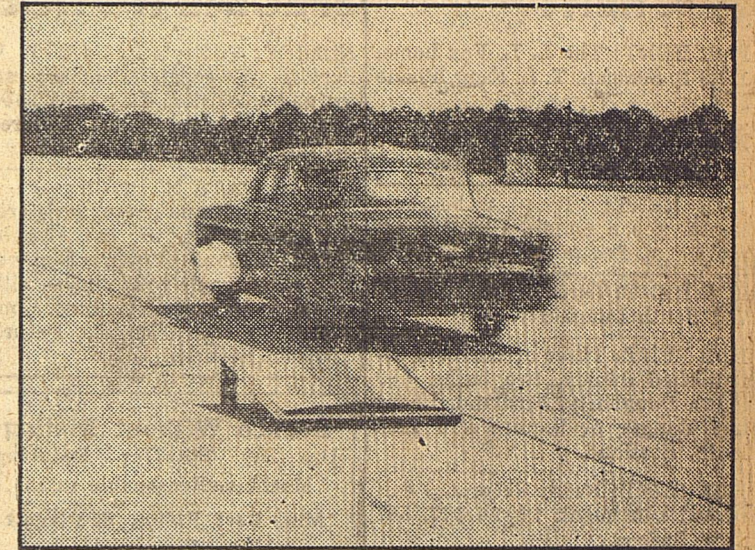
Such a plan has been put forward for some time by citizens of the three towns. Only weeks ago the Eastland Rotary Club urged the telephone company to take such a step.

W. H. McAnally, area manager, revealed the planned survey. He said the Bell crew would check in

to the situation and determine if it would be financially possible.

Under such a plan residents of the three Eastland County cities would be able to make calls from one town to the other without paying a long distance charge.

Under the plan proposed by citizens from the three cities, there would be one telephone book for all of the cities.

The City fathers gave the go-ahead sign to City Manager James Young to file 15 personal tax suits. The suits were to have been filed Friday.

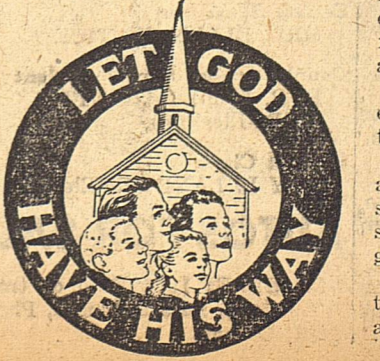
Commissioners voted to purchase paint and other needed supplies to ready the City swimming pool for the summer months.

Mrs. Jim Horton Gives Talk On Flowers at Civic League Meeting

Mrs. James Horton displayed a beautiful array of flower arrangements, illustrating various points in her talk on that subject to members of the Civic League and den Club who met at the Woman's Garden Club who met at the Woman's Club Wednesday afternoon. She was scheduled for March 12, accepted the challenge of presenting it a month early with only a few hours' notice when guest speaker Miss Ella Pierce of Itaska was unable to be in Eastland because of inclement weather.

Mrs. Horton was introduced by Mrs. Art Johnson, president. Beginning her talk with a description of the proper tools for securing flowers, Mrs. Horton then explained methods of keeping flowers fresh or reviving them.

Violets, maidenhair fern and new greenery take their water from the flower bud, she said, and will survive much longer if immersed in water for a short period. She received a number of comments of surprise from the informal audience when she told of hard-stem flowers which will stay fresh longer if their stems are first placed briefly in boiling water.

In discussing containers, the speaker stressed the importance of appropriateness as to texture. Coarse textured flowers, such as zinnias, are more attractive in a heavy, informal container such as earthenware, she said.

Roses, on the contrary, she elaborated, should always be in crystal or silver for "they deserve the very best."

Mrs. Horton then described the various designs, giving their names and suggesting techniques for achieving them. She also gave methods for preparing foliage for dry arrangements.

A Valentine motif was used on the refreshment table at which Mrs. Grady Pipkin presided for the club's tea hour.

A white net cloth, embroidered with small white flowers, covered the table. At each corner were small nosegays of red carnations.

The centerpiece was an arrangement of red carnations and white Styrofoam hearts trimmed with red chenille. Tall silver candelabra on either side held white bobnall vigil lights.

Silver appointments were used throughout. Napkins were red and white.

The Valentine theme was repeated in an arrangement on the piano where pink and red carnations were encircled with a red satin heart.

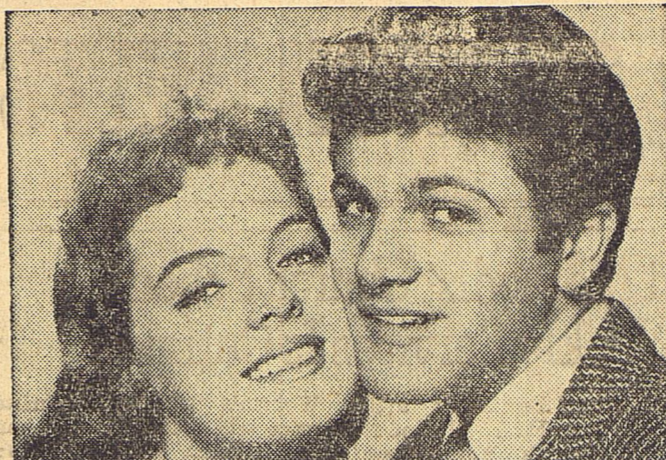
Other high school honors include: class officer for three years, FHA officer for four years, and salutatorian of her graduating class.

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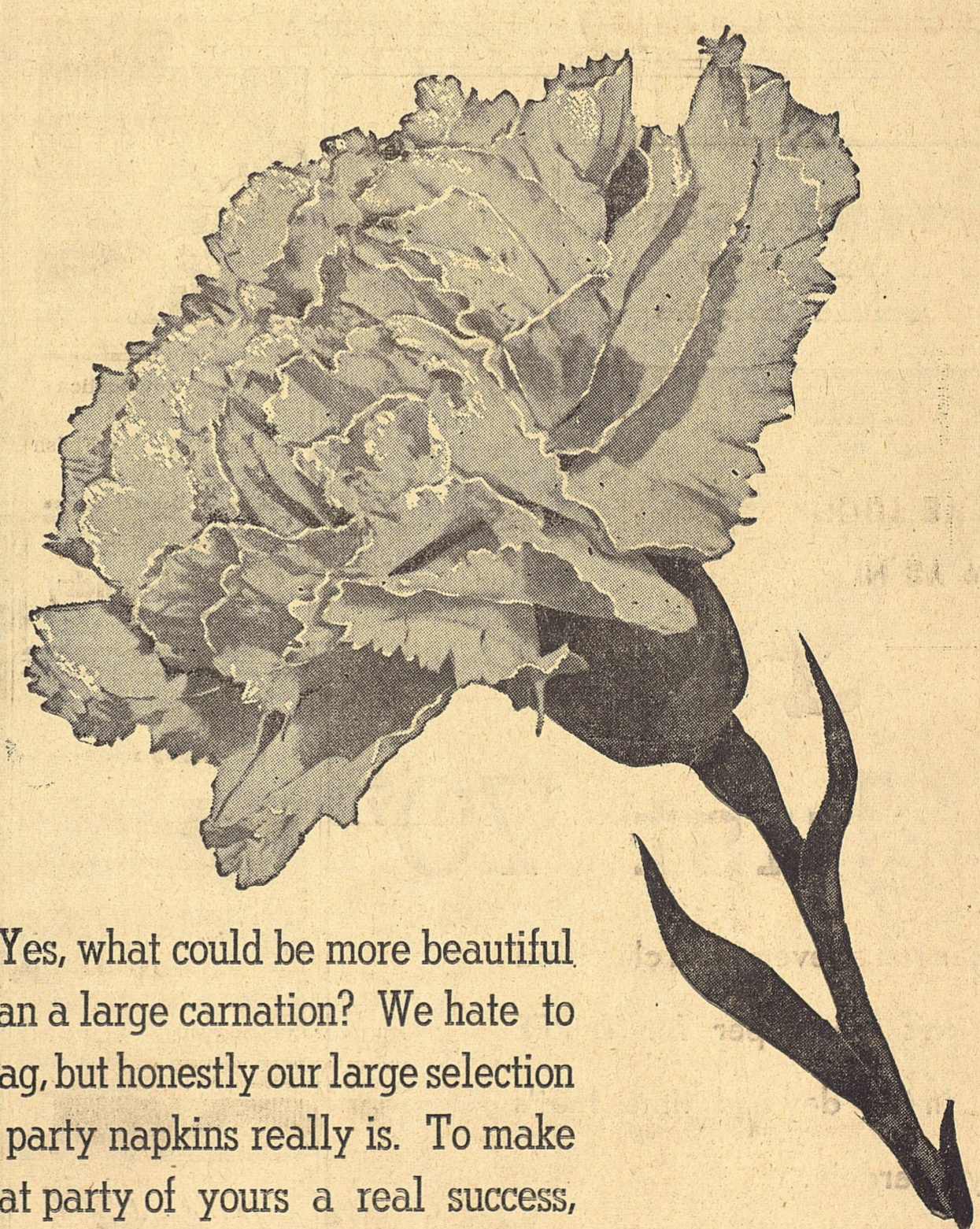
