





# CONDITIONS GOVERNING GRID RACE UNALTERED

AUSTIN, Aug. 23.—Although the date for Texas high school football has been changed to Oct. 1, 200 schools already filed acceptance, according to Roy Bedichek, chief of the Texas league bureau.

It is the ninth year of the annual state championship in football, said Bedichek, "and the early enrollment indicates a total registration of 1,200 schools." The number of schools who participated last year was 225 schools in the championship game arranged by the state office.

Interconference or interdistrict games between participating schools shall not count on a team's percentage, according to the football plan. A defeat by a non-participating Texas high school, regardless of size or date, shall eliminate a school from the state race. This rule, however, does not apply to El Paso because of the fact that El Paso cannot participate on account of location.

Practice games, that is, games to which no admission is charged and which are not regularly conducted by an official or officials, shall not count on a team's percentage.

In case of tie games, the tie shall be broken by the counting of points made when one team penetrates the other's 20-yard line. This is not a new method of scoring, as the points are to be considered unless the game results in a tie.

Unless both teams agree to the cancellation, a game which is cancelled after the contract has been signed shall be forfeited to the team not at fault. The visiting team always has the right to demand a guarantee sufficient to cover all expenses and in addition 50 per cent of the net gate receipts of the contest. A demand for a flat guarantee which is clearly in excess of expenses shall, upon action of the state or district committee, disqualify the offending team from further participation.

**Other States Use Plan.**

The home team shall furnish a playing field without cost to the visiting school, unless mutually agreed otherwise. All officials shall be agreed upon in advance, and outside officials are preferred.

**Defeats Unharmful.**

The state is divided into eight conference districts and 28 counties. Any district or county which is disqualified in the state championship will not be eligible to enter the interconference league whose head coach is a full-time employe of the board of the school which represents. "Full-time," means for the whole scholastic year for the contestants, no student in football who has had school systems during the year is eligible if he was in attendance when he withdrew from the school. In addition, he shall have the state office certificate from the superintendent or principal of his school. One of the conditions of the certificate is that, in the opinion of the superintendent or principal of the contestant, he is not directly or indirectly in any way connected with the services of the contestant.

WASHINGTON.—The voters of the United States this fall will elect either Alfred E. Smith or Herbert Hoover as their next president, and everybody knows it—but that doesn't mean that Smith and Hoover are the only candidates seeking the presidency.

As a matter of fact there are three others. The optimists of politics, you might call them. They are:

Norman Thomas, Socialist nominee.  
William E. Varney, nominee of the Prohibition party.  
William Z. Foster, Communist.

While none of the three kids him-elf into thinking he has a chance at election, all are hopeful of polling a large vote and building up their respective parties into places of power in the distant future.

The Socialist party is the largest of the three, and Thomas is probably the most widely known of these three candidates. His socialist vote has been growing slowly but steadily, although its size in the 1924 election cannot be computed since much of it went to LaFollette, who polled a total of \$22,000. In 1920 Eugene Debs, who was the Socialist candidate while imprisoned at Atlanta, got 577,799 votes.

Thomas' Career Colorful.

Thomas, oddly enough was born in the home town of the late President Harding—Marion, O. A tall, rather thin, gray-haired man of about 48, he is the descendant of a long line of Welsh parsons, Presbyterian and nonconformist, the first of whom came over to America in the early part of the last century. His father was pastor of a Presbyterian church in Marion, and Thomas as a boy earned spending money by peddling copies of Harding's Marion Star.

He worked his way through Princeton and the Union Theology Seminary and after taking a trip around the world as reader and companion for a wealthy easterner he entered Presbyterian mission work in New York. His activities among the children of the "Hell's Kitchen" district drew wide attention, and he was soon put in charge of all Presbyterian East Side mission work.

When the World War came Thomas took an active part in the Society Against Militarism, and espoused pacifism so vigorously that his backers began to object, and he resigned his social service job. He then became editor of *The World Tomorrow*, drawing

AUSTIN, Aug. 24.—In two years, U. S. Senator Morris Sheppard will be fighting to retain his seat just as Senator Earle B. Mayfield is doing today and Sheppard's opponent will be Governor Dan Moody. It will be surprising to many to learn that in this prospective race, Ferguson thinks Moody has a good chance to win. Whatever the Ferguson thinks of Governor Moody, he concedes the governor to be one of the most efficient campaigners the state has had.

"When a man gets to 50 years, he cannot campaign in a state as big as Texas, like a young man can," Ferguson said. "There is a big difference between being able to make four speeches a day and making one every other day. I think I am in as good physical condition as any man of my age, but I cannot campaign like I used to. Campaigning is like prize fighting with the difference that the prize fighters get a chance to rest at intervals which a man does not get when he is making a speech."

In 1930, Senator Sheppard will be 55 years old while Governor Moody will be 37.

Former Governor Ferguson thinks that Senator Sheppard will also be handicapped by his long residence in Washington. This dates back to 1902 when he was elected to congress. His senate membership began in 1913.

Senator Mayfield who has been making a strenuous campaign is 47. That is only eight years younger than Senator Sheppard will be in 1930 but Ferguson puts 50 years as the dividing point for age's effect on political work. Up to 50, a campaigner will tire, Ferguson finds, but he will recuperate rapidly. After 50, he has to drive himself to keep up the pace.

What the issues will be in 1930 Ex-Governor Ferguson did not attempt to say. He indicated that he expects to see economic questions a factor in the near future.

In tomorrow's election, it is likely that there will be a lighter vote than the 735,000 votes cast in the July primary. The race for the U. S. Senate in that primary drew only 671,000 votes. In spite of the intense campaigns by Mayfield and Tom Connally, during this month, it is not reasonable to expect a larger vote than all the senate candidates received in the first primary.

Another argument in favor of the smaller vote tomorrow is the fact that there are also fewer local races to bring out a big vote, although Dallas, San Antonio and Houston all have run-offs that are being hard fought.

There will also be four run-off races for state senate and twenty for representative places. There is one run-off race for congress. This is in the Seventeenth District for the seat held by Tom Blanton. All of these will help to

bring out the voters.

As reflecting sentiment on the presidential election, tomorrow's balloting will have little significance. The withdrawal of Tom Love, "Hoover democrat," eliminated the only chance to get a line on the number of democrats who are not going to support Smith.

One prominent democrat, who declined to be quoted for obvious reasons, took the position this week that the whole idea of calling a rally of democratic leaders and starting a Texas campaign is unsound. "Texas will not go republican if there isn't a meeting held nor a speech made," he said. "Yet, by this activity, we are giving the republicans a chance to claim Texas is doubtful."

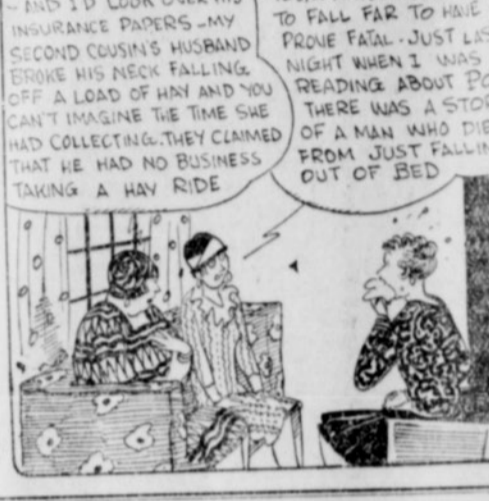

Alabama to Decide If Word Of Infidel Is Good in Court

By NEA Service. DECATUR, Ala.—Is the lack of faith in a Divine Being sufficient grounds on which to determine whether or not a man's evidence in a court of law is to be believed?

This novel question has been raised by J. N. Powell, Morgan county attorney and member of the Methodist church, in an appeal to the Alabama supreme court from the conviction of Mrs. Emma Marshall on a charge of murdering her husband, Thomas Marshall.

At the trial, the state produced evidence tending to show that Marshall, when he was found by neighbors at his home, suffering from a pistol wound in his abdomen, accused Mrs. Marshall of having shot him.

also has on it the Washington coat of arms in a design of stars and stripes. It is possible that the design may have suggested the United States national emblem.

Another interesting fact is that a sundial design was used on the early American dollar, on the copper cent, and on the paper note of one-third dollar. These dial designs bore two inscriptions—"Fugio" and "Mind your business."

The pieces were known as the "Fugio dollar," "Fugio cent" and "Fugio note." The copper coin was also known as the "Franklin cent," due probably to Franklin's association with the United States coinage.

A well-known Shakespeare lover and critic has on his dial a quotation from one of the Sonnets: "Love alters not with Time's brief hours and weeks." An old English dial, known as the Leap Year Dial, bears this inscription: Listen to my simple rhyme, Telling hapless maidens the time, flow each February three years fled, Women all may ask to wed.

In Aesop's great fable 'twixt the tortoise and hare. The former he made out the winner; But the sun which took part on that day, I'll declare, Defeated the tortoise and outran the hare. Though not planned by Aesop, "the sinner."

An eighteenth century English dial is inscribed with the following deep and beautiful message: He who dedicates each hour To a power divine, Receives full of the Christian's dower— Life's water turned to wine.

Such an inscription bears out Charles Lamb's tribute to the "silent heart language of an old dial." The sundial has come down to the present day surrounded by fact and fiction, romance and tragedy, superstition and sanctity, love and love. But no matter how much history, art and literature may try to associate their sorrows, their legends, their superstitions, their speculations, their gloom, with the sundial, the fact remains that all the effort in the world cannot cause a well-conducted and properly placed dial to record anything but sunny hours!

He was in his hey-day when Nelson, Wolgast, Ritchie and Welch were fighting. Today he should be fat and forty, but he is neither. He is lithe, slim and 43.

Jack Britton, former welter-weight champion of the world, has planted the hardest blow on Father Time's jaw that the old man ever felt.

Five thousand fight customers got the thrill of their lives the other night when Britton slipped into the ring to face Tony Vaccarelli, a 25-year-old youngster with a world of speed and a punch that is nothing to sneer at.

There were lumps in 5,000 throats as the old master stamped in the resin and limbered up his arms for a fight that was either going to send him over the hill to the poor house or put him back on the high road to riches.

Britton scored a brilliant victory and a mighty roar went up through the crowd as they realized that Jack again had his foot on the ladder of fame which he scaled so brilliantly two decades ago.

Despite a line of fat around his belt, Britton stepped out and set the pace through the fight with Vaccarelli to win six of the ten rounds and the decision.

A Great Comeback. Perhaps it was the most thrilling comeback in the world of sport since the day Jim Jeffries vainly tried to beat off the attack of Jack Johnson and went down to the canvas, a greater fighter in defeat than he had ever been in victory.

You may pore over the dope sheets and confidently utter the old maxim: "They never come back." But just when you think you are 100 per cent right along will come a grizzled old man like Jack Britton to knock the calculations of mathematicians sky high.

Britton is asking and giving no quarter because he is 43 years old. He steps to the center of the ring with his aged legs twitching with the desire to fly into action.

For 25 years he has been taking punishment in the face and in the body and has refused to wilt, for the name of Britton has long been a by-word for courage in the ring.

Clean living has helped him in his comeback. Long before Gene Tunney was ever heard of, Britton had turned his back on the bright lights and the foaming mug and had decided that if he was going to be a world champion he might as well sign Mother Nature up as one of his allies.

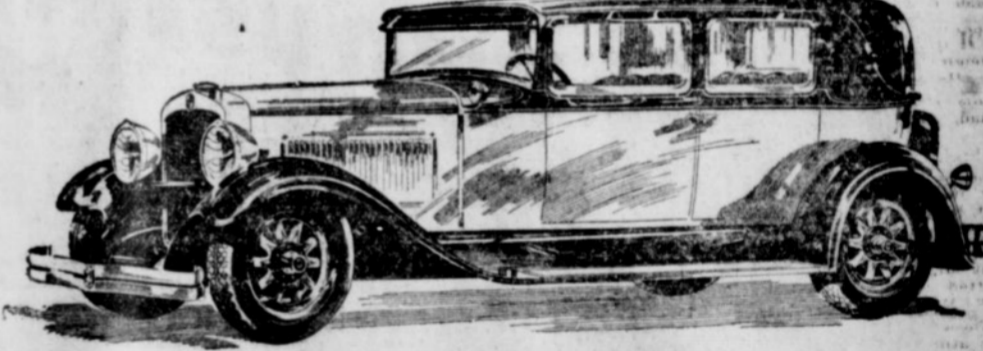

tion in the United States. A naval understanding between the British and the French is a move to keep the peace in Europe, for without such an entente, the two nations would be potential enemies with a new war between them in the making. France has held back from complete endorsement of America's program of reduction of naval armament primarily because she has regarded her needs in warships as controlled by the possibility of a war between herself and Great Britain. In the events of such a conflict, history has shown that victory goes to the power which is triumphant at sea. France cannot afford to rival Great Britain in capital ships and in any combat between surface craft, the French navy would be annihilated by the British.

**Depend On Submarines**  
But, with the development of the submarine, the French have evolved a theory, based on Germany's use of submersible craft during the world war, that the trierle submarine would have a chance of subsiding Great Britain in a future conflict. This belief, which is the basis of France's strategic preparations in naval construction, might be realized in practice, especially if the French showed sufficient psychological astuteness to refrain from Germany's mistake of sinking unarmed craft carrying non-combatants.

Great Britain has to face the fact that although Anglo-French relations for the present are on a friendly basis, it is France, in reality, more than Germany that is Britain's hereditary continental enemy. Great Britain cannot afford to take a peremptory attitude toward the French submarine policy. France is building submarines at an unprecedented rate and is not to be deterred by any requests for information concerning the use for which they are intended. It is necessary for Great Britain to approach the subject in a statesmanlike way and to seek to avert the possible thrust at her by diplomatic means.

That is the essential purpose of the British naval negotiations with France. No diminution in France's submarine building program can be expected to be forthcoming for the moment. Great Britain, however, by a succession of cautious approaches to France, is gradually putting herself in a position where the French may agree to discuss the possibility either of ceasing submarine construction outright or limiting the size of undersea craft.

**Britain Will Compromise**  
To accomplish a purpose so closely to the heart of British policy, Great Britain would be willing to make great concessions. If submarines were to be outlawed by agreement among the powers, the danger of the isolation of the British Isles in another war would be reduced to a minimum, whereas expansion of submarine effectiveness must jeopardize the British overseas food supply on which the nation subsists. France holds this trump in the game of European diplomacy and certainly will not throw it away to no purpose.

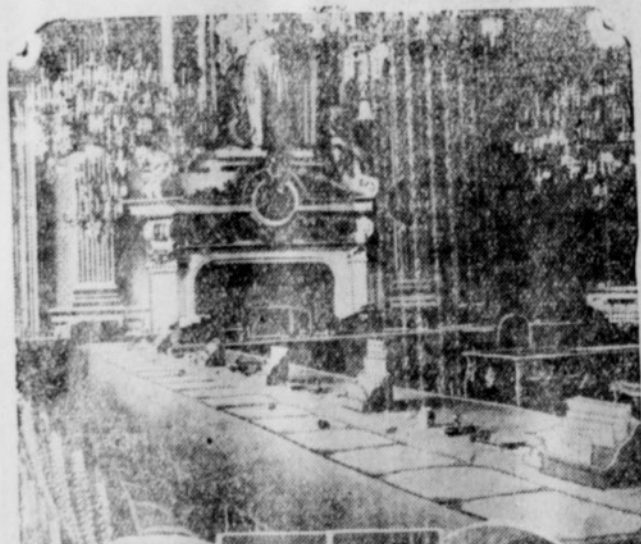
What Great Britain can offer France in exchange for a submarine agreement is a matter for the diplomats to discover. France is restless under the charge of militarism levelled against her because of her conscription policy. The extreme efforts of international peace advocates to reduce the size of standing armies and limit conscription are distasteful to France for in the eyes of the French general, it is the eyes of the French general that they would endanger national security by reducing France's military supremacy over Germany. Great Britain here has it in her hands to befriend France,

though not too completely, for the British do not wish to see France hold the balance of power on the European continent. How far the British government can go in this direction without encountering resistance from the anti-militaristic movement among the British people adds perplexity to the problem. The fact that the matter is so highly complicated shows how the naval relations between the British and French are in a special category. They will so continue until submarines disappear as a menace to Great Britain's future.

### Prohibition Bans Both the Grogshop And the Pawnshop

One striking effect of prohibition—an effect that is nationwide in its economic significance—is the closing of the small neighborhood pawn shop. Every city in the land has seen the number of these shops dwindle until today perhaps one exists where a dozen flourished while the saloons were open to manufacture custom for them. In New York, prior to 1920, every slum and tenement district had these shops in nearly every block. Loans of as little as 10

cents were made. As collateral security these pawn-brokers would accept anything that had the slightest value. Clothing, shoes, tools, furniture, kitchen utensils, clocks, the family Bible, rugs, toys—anything that could be handled easily made regular trips to the "hock shop" as family income ebbed and flowed. Those were the "good old days" when a pair of new shoes marked a red letter day in the life of the child of an average mechanic; when "Big Tim" or "Little Jim" or "Honest John" would wax fat behind his bar and occasionally, with great show and much ado, give away a few tons of coal during the winter to families beggared in his saloon. Boston had the same story to tell. Chicago, St. Louis, Memphis,

Cincinnati, Cleveland, San cisco, New Orleans, Philadelphia, Denver, drank from the same cup. In the saloon days the tenement district saloons all boasted a "dies Entrance" to a back room from these doors led regular beaten paths, each to the pawnshop. Designed after months of work by an engineering department of 180 employees, proven in numerous test rooms and in the field, decorated by eminent stylists, the new Frigidaire is the culmination of sixteen years in experimental work and twelve years in the actual manufacture of both household and commercial refrigerating equipment, according to E. G. Blechler, president and general manager.

"In presenting the new Frigidaire we have taken one of the most important and progressive steps in the history of our organization," said Mr. Blechler. "It establishes a milestone in the history of refrigeration, proves again the superiority of General

Motors engineering and reemphasizes Frigidaire's long established leadership in the field of automatic refrigeration.

"A forced draft, playing upon the condenser instantly drives heat taken from the food storage compartment through the rear of the cabinet into the open air. Two fans circulate air over a newly designed condenser, constituting a truly scientific solution of the heat removal problem. This change in design makes it possible to transform the lower part of the cabinet into a broad, unbroken panel, Louvers are eliminated, thus removing the last trace of the mechanical from its appearance and adding to the pleasing and symmetrical lines of the entire cabinet."

The first of the three lines in which the new Frigidaire is presented is porcelain enameled, inside and out, finished in white and glacier gray, with chrome plated hardware of satin surfaced design. The second line has the same specifications throughout with the exception of the exterior finish, which is of enduring, snow-white duco. It is also finished in a number of pastel shades on special order. It affords the same positive refrigeration and lasting qualities as the first line at a considerable saving in the original investment.

Smaller models, similar to those in the first two lines are offered in the third. This is headed by

two cabinets of five cubic feet capacity, suitable to the needs of small families. It also includes a special series of eight cabinets designed for installation in apartment houses. Cabinets in this line are also trimmed with handsome hardware of advanced design and equipped with ultra quiet compressors.

Although the mechanical units of the new Frigidaire have been greatly changed it is still possible to use them in equipping the family ice box with automatic refrigeration. The cooling coils are placed in the ice compartment and connected with the compressor which is placed in some remote location, usually the basement. If the ice box is a good one, this method gives highly satisfactory results at a considerable saving.

Many ideas, taken from both airplane and automobile designing have been incorporated in the different models. Compressors have been reduced in size. The condenser now resembles an automobile radiator, and affords more passing capacity than would ever be required in normal use. All mechanical parts are completely concealed.

The new Frigidaire has undergone months of the most severe test. Radio amplifiers have been used to check it for sound. For weeks at a time it has performed in rooms heated to 100 degrees, freezing ice cubes within a few hours without ever once reaching its refrigerating capacity. It has been operated for months in hot moisture-saturated rooms without losing its lustre or its hardware becoming tarnished and dull. Mechanical door slamming devices have given its hinges and latches the equivalent of twenty years of use, without damaging them.

An automatic belt tightening device has been provided. Piston valves have been increased in size. The motor and many other moving parts have been mounted upon rubber, following the wide experience of General Motors in engine and chassis mounting. Mechanical parts have been made more accessible. In some instances an extra food shelf has been added. Closer limits have been specified for all moving parts, insuring better operation and a longer period of usefulness.

In addition, a still lower initial payment has been provided for those who desire to purchase on the well known GMAC plan, through which all products of General Motors are financed. Announcement was also made

of additions to the line of Frigidaire water coolers. A new cooler, similar to that now used for cooling bottled water, but which is attached direct to the water main, is in production. Another water cooler has a small compartment where lunch and bottled beverages may be stored.
