Crime Inside Crime Revealed By Officers

A crime within a crime was revealed today by local law enforcement officers in the unraveling hubcap thefts in Eastland County.

The weird, gangland type payoff came to light last week with the arrest of some fifteen teenage boys from Ranger and Eastland.

According to officers, the two youths stole two hubcaps and hid them just outside Ranger.

Local and county law enforcement officers are continuing an investigation of the hubcap thefts.

Some fifteen boys have been questioned about the thefts, ranging from hubcaps, fender skirts, and one automobile.

City and county law enforcement officers continued to uncover stolen automobile accessories this week to focus more attention on the county and city teenagers involved.

At the same time, officers have revealed the unique, uncanny, and eerie actions of the teenagers towards each other.

TAYLOR COUNTY IS SECOND County's Bond Sales Rank First In Zone

Any businessman doubting that there is money to be spent in Eastland County should take a look at the latest report issued by the United States Treasury Department concerning savings bonds.

Eastland County set the pace in District 16 with total sales of \$114,200. Ranking second in the sale of bonds was Taylor County (Abilene) with purchases of \$99,866.

February sales pushed the county's total purchases for the first two months of 1958 to \$177,514, or 35 percent of the county's goal of \$507,000, according to Guy

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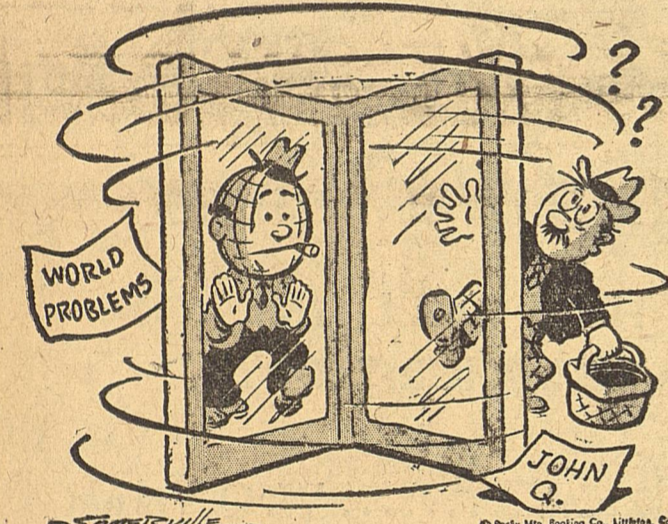

### Christian Science

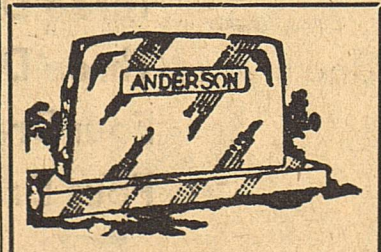
God's supremacy and all-power will be explained in the Lesson-Sermon entitled "Reality" at Christian Science services Sunday.
