



"Many farmers who are signing. rendition for all back taxes be re- up in the Government's soil bank fect this has on their social security, "R. R. Tuley, Jr., district. manager of the Abilene social security office, said today.

"We explain to them that, for social security benefit purposes or for the amount of earnings per mitted to a farmer getting retirement benefits, soil bank payments. must be counted. These payments. apply to acreage reserve, conservation reserve, and also in cases where a farmer has placed his.

For example, Tuley went on, a ports those payments as net earnings for social security purposes.

He gets social security credit for. A farmer who place's his farm in the soil, bank after he retires and has started getting old-age insurance benefits, must report soil bank payments also. They apply

Whether or not benefit payments are affected by the money he that he is worth that much of he gets under the soil bank program depends upon the substantial services he renders. Soil bank payments would not affect the oldage insurance benefits of a farmer who elected to plant trees on his land and merely give a little
