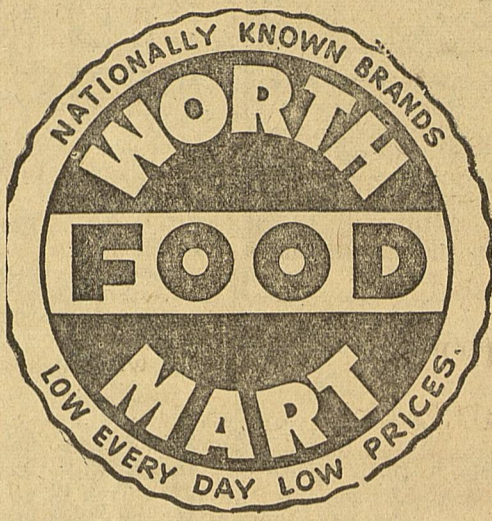

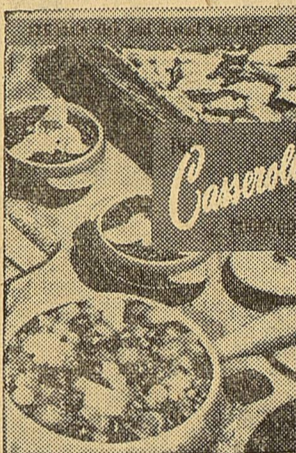

### Group Named To Promote More Local Reading

Mrs. I. C. Inzer, president of the Thursday Afternoon Study Club, sponsors of the Eastland Library for the past 41 years, today named a committee to head Eastland's part in a major national reading promotion drive.

Chairman of the Eastland Library week Committee is Virgil Moore, editor of the Eastland Telegram. Other members of the committee are Mrs. Cecil Collings,

Mrs. Jay Whatley, Wendell Siebert, Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins, Mrs. Art Johnson, Larry Kinard, Dr. J. D. Jolly and Horace Horton.

The program—with the theme "Wake Up and Read!"—is a dramatic citizens' campaign to re-establish reading in the daily life of every American. Focussing on the rewards of reading for fun, knowledge and advancement, and on the services of libraries of all kinds, the drive will culminate in the first National Library Week, March 16-22.

"Now as never before, a united effort to increase reading is needed," Moore said. "A recent survey shows that over 60 percent of U. S. Adults had not read a single book last year, other than the

Bible.

"More reading is vital for an informed public in today's complex world—and for mental challenge and satisfying recreation in the coming age of leisure."

"This committee represents the widest community interests. Its activities to encourage reading—in homes, schools, churches, businesses and civic centers—can make our drive here one of the nation's most effective," the new Library Week chairman said.

our time. When a man gets so busy he's too busy for church, he's too busy for God and when he gets too busy for God; he's a fool. He's not putting things in their proper place of importance of his own life, and his failure to adjust the things of this life to their proper place or relative importance is something most of us will have to answer for at the time of the Great Judgement.

It behooves all of us who are physically able to do so to be in a House of God every Sunday morning. He who belittles God in this life will find himself belittled in the next one and any man ought to know better than to trifle with God. God won't put up with it. We can kid ourselves about this all of our lives, if we want to, but we can't kid God about it long enough to take a breath. God shall not be mocked.

There isn't a man in Eastland who'd live in a town that didn't have a church. If such a situation were to exist that something should happen to Eastland to the extent that all of her churches were destroyed, the people of Our Town wouldn't be able to rest until we had a church of some sort built. We'd work day and night like a bunch of eager beavers waiting

for the master beaver's inspection trying to get a new church built. If we had to work all night, day and night, for days on end, we'd do it, as long as we thought we were building our town a nice church for our people to worship their God in a manner acceptable to Him.

After we finished the church, though, what would happen the first Sunday? Would all of our people turn out for the first service in the new structure? We might for a Sunday or two. But just as soon as the new wore off between 60 and 75 percent of all the people of Our Town would stay at home to read the Sunday comics.

Those very same people who had worked so hard to get the structure built in the figurative case above would be some of the very first to sit at home contented that they had done all they need do for their Lord. Self satisfaction with one's own accomplishments is sure going to get a lot of people in trouble when the time for the Great Answering comes.

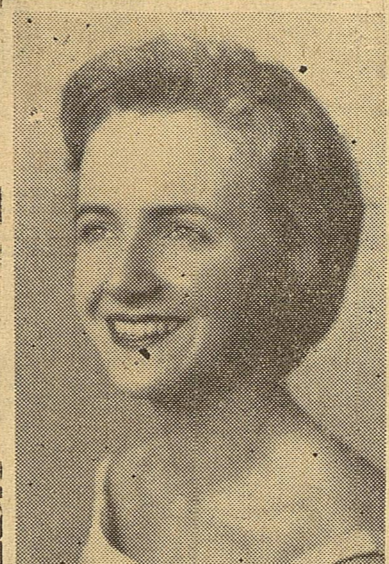

crop on his land would probably be rendering substantial services during one or more months in the year. In this case, he would not get social security payments for the months in which the cover crop was planted.

"Farmers who have questions about soil bank payments in relation to their social security should get in touch with a representative of our office when in their county," Tuley concluded.

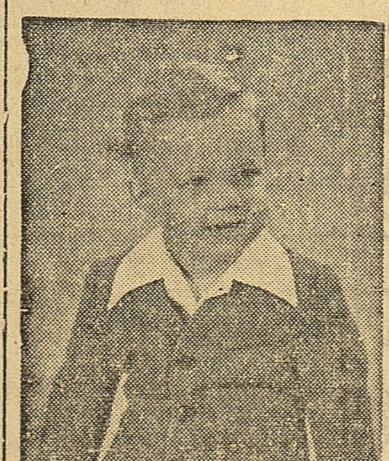
