

No Ruling Yet From Benson On Betty Brashears: I have read Acreage Request

No ruling on the Southwestern (easy to read and interesting), Peanut Growers' Association's recent request for an acreage increase for growers of Southwest around 18 books and the best one Spanish peanuts has yet been handed down by Sec. of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson, Ross Wilson, manager of the SPGA, told this newspaper today.






