




### **Richard C. Cox Seeks District Clerk Position**

these soils when they are wet breaks down their natural aggregation, and plowing when too dry may turn up great clods which are difficult to break down for a seed bod. Plowing dry also causes the finer particles in the soil to sift to the bottom of the furrow which is a partial cause of plow pans. Froper timing of all tillage operations is of utmost importance to encourage natural granulation in the soil.
