Annual Affair to be Held at New Church

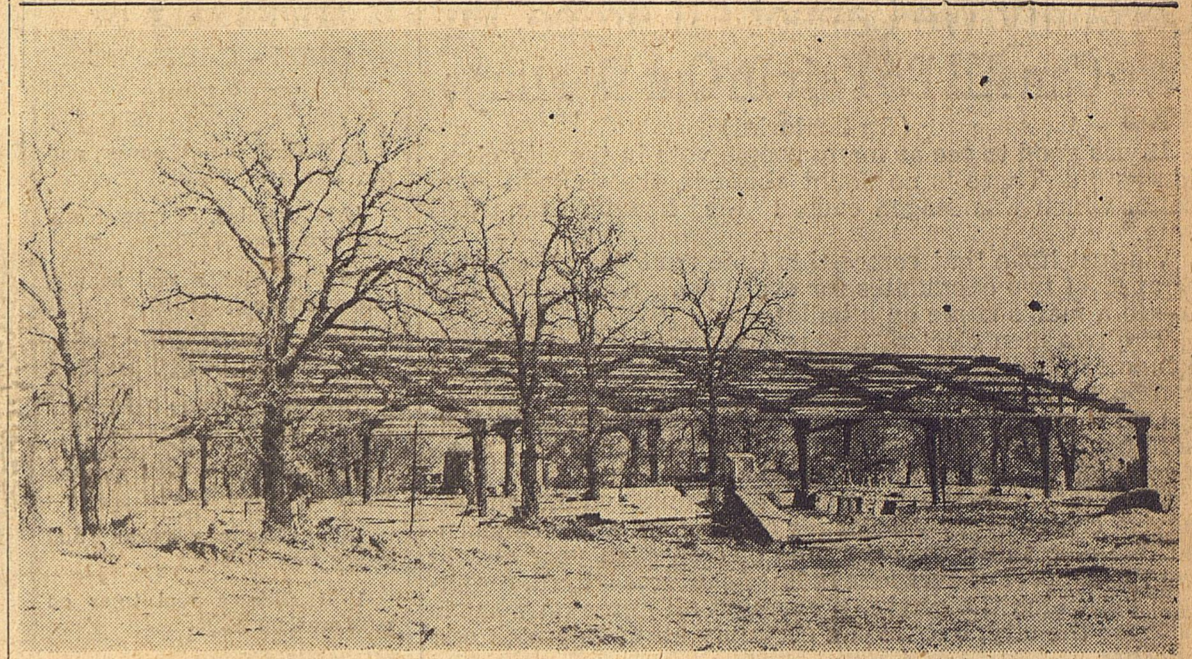
Eastland will join the rest of the free world Sunday in celebrating Easter.

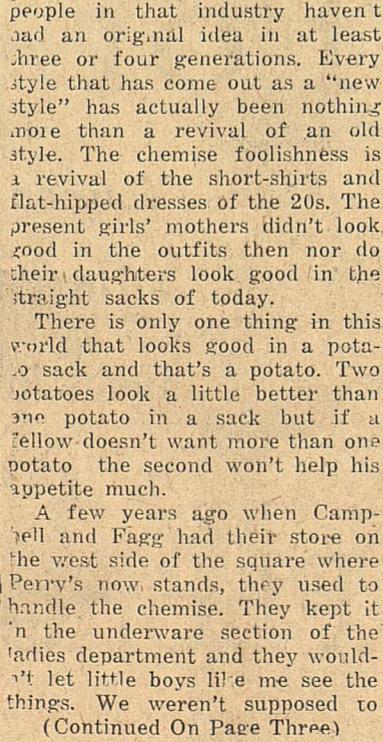

Coffee Tuesday To Open Cancer Drive

Eastland's Cancer Drive will get underway here Tuesday when volunteer workers meet at the Christian Church annex for coffee and doughnuts.

Mrs. R. L. Carpenter, who will head the Eastland drive, said some 40 volunteers are expected to attend the 9:30 a.m. meeting. The drive will be explained at the meeting and volunteers will be given their working material.

The Cancer Crusade stresses two things, "A check and a check-up". Mrs. Roscoe Hopper of Ranger is Eastland County chairman this year. The county's 1958 goal has been set at \$2,500. The money is a part of the \$30,000,000 to be raised in the nation-wide campaign. It will be used to push the war on cancer on three fronts: research, education and service.

Gov. Price Daniel has proclaimed the month of April as Cancer Control month, and April 15 as Texas Cancer Control day.

Mrs. Carpenter said, "The whole program of the ACS is directed toward saving lives, countless lives when the mystery of cancer is solved and the disease brought under control. But our annual campaign is also an intense effort to save lives here and now. I refer to the 75,000 who die needlessly of cancer every year. They die simply because the disease isn't diagnosed in time."

Volunteer workers will leave leaflets at each home which explain why a regular health examination is the best protection against needless death from cancer—the number two disease killer in the United States.

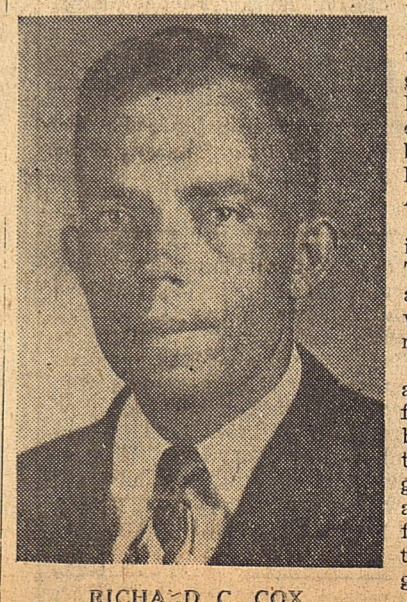

(Continued from Page One) lands of this area show "hoof pans" resulting from wet grazing. A good litter of grass residue on grassland will do much to cushion livestock trampling. The stability of soil structure can be built up and maintained with cropping systems which return large amounts of plant residue to the land. Best results are obtained from plant residue if legumes are used in the rotation or nitrogen fertilizer is used for the specific purpose of decomposing starchy plant residue. The maximum potential plant only when the soil is in good tilth. A soil in good physical condition is well aggregated. Soil aggregates are stable when wet and resist melting down and running together when they contain organic matter and the various natural colloidal cements that are formed from the decomposing starchy plant residue. Soil in good tilth has an open structure, will absorb water readily, and resist erosion.

Conservation construction is once more in full swing after a period of wet weather. Farmers recently completing farm ponds are R. O. Watson near Alameda and Aubrey Easter on Highway 80 west of Eastland. Farmers recently completing terrace and diversion terrace systems are Roy Adams near Dothan, H. C. Pounds north east of Morton Valley, and J. O. Jones west of Chaney. Grass planting time is here. Several farmers will be planting grass in the next few days.
