

# Do We Forget Our Boys On Their 13th Birthday?

Eastland Little League baseball fans can't forget such boys as John Garrett, Bobby Cartwright, Elijah Govan, J. D. Ables or Buddy Moser. How could they? Just two years ago these boys were thrilling fans of the Little League with some excellent baseball.

They can't forget them, but apparently they have! That's a big statement, and it isn't a nice one. But let's take a long look at it, and then you can

decide.

Monday night the Teenage Baseball Association called a meeting to plan to give the boys who have graduated from Little League a chance to continue playing baseball. Four persons, including a Telegram reporter, were present at that meeting. How many fathers of the boys who would gain so much by such a program were home watching TV?

Little League baseball is wonderful and we would be the first

to fight for it. We just cannot believe, however, that a boy should quit playing organized ball when he gets 13 years old.

The situation here in Eastland—where we have perhaps the best Little League set up in this part of the state and a highly disorganized program for boys aged 13 to 16—reminds us of a situation we once confronted.

Year in and year out in the town where we once lived, the junior high school turned out a

winning ball club. Then those boys went to high school and couldn't beat their way out of a wet bag. As it turned out there were more fans out to watch the junior high team play on Thursday nights than there were to watch the seniors play on Friday nights.

We wonder how these Eastland boys feel? When they were 11 and 12 years old there was a top-notch league for them to play in. They were taught the fundamentals of the game.

Then that magic 13th year rolled around. They advanced to Teenage baseball. They advanced to a field so poorly lit that it is dangerous to let boys on it. They advanced to a weedpatch where they had to hunt for every ball hit out of the infield. They advanced to a League where three men vainly try to carry on a program too big for 15.

Is Eastland less able to care for its own than Rising Star, Ranger, Cisco, Albany and

Clyde? Each of these towns has a well organized program. Eastland, in fact, is supposed to field two teams (one of 13-14 years old and another of 15-16 years old) in the same leagues.

Some financial aid has been offered. The Eastland Quarterback Club has agreed to contribute \$200 to the cause and the Eastland National Bank has for several years sponsored one of the teams.

What is most needed now? Your help.

Adult leadership is a must. At least two managers for the 14-15 year olds are needed. The organization needs someone with enough training to serve as treasurer. The organization needs a lot of volunteer help.

Fireman's Field, where the games will be played, needs a fence around it. It needs a lot of work on the lighting, the scoreboard needs repairing and the field needs grading and mowed.

Here is an answer to a problem which has faced this com-

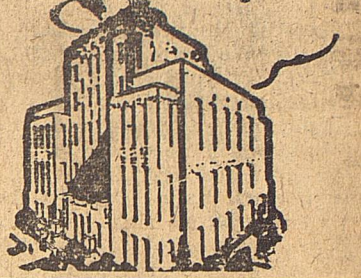
munity. Here is something to keep boys busy doing something they enjoy. The cost is small. Money isn't even half of the answer. Without adult leadership the program cannot be.

Next Monday at 7:30 p.m. a meeting will be held in the Texas Electric conference room. You owe it to the youth of this city to be there. You don't have to be a baseball expert to help. If you can drive a car, dig a hole or mend a hole in a uniform, you can help. Will you?

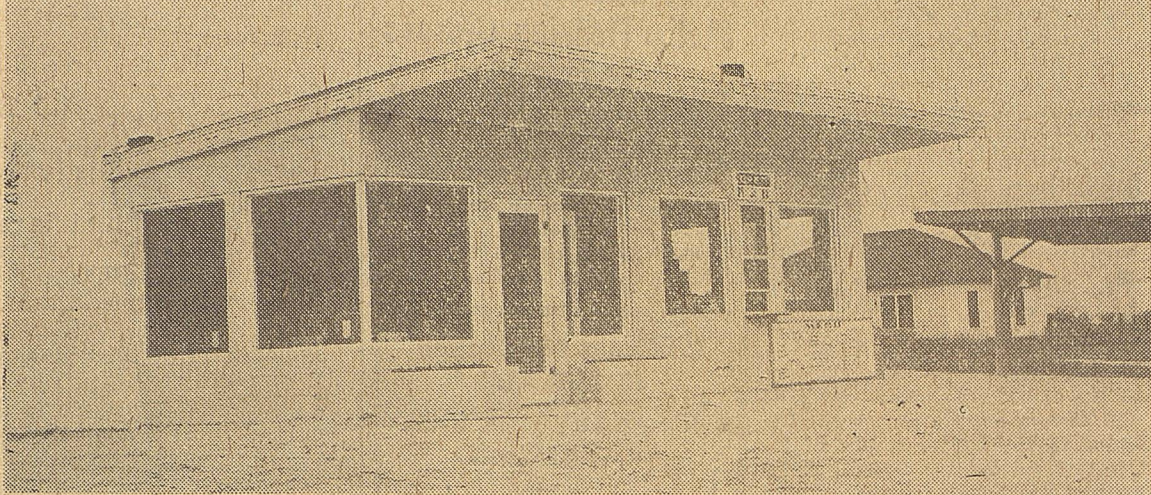

### Installation of Dial Phones Is Underway Here

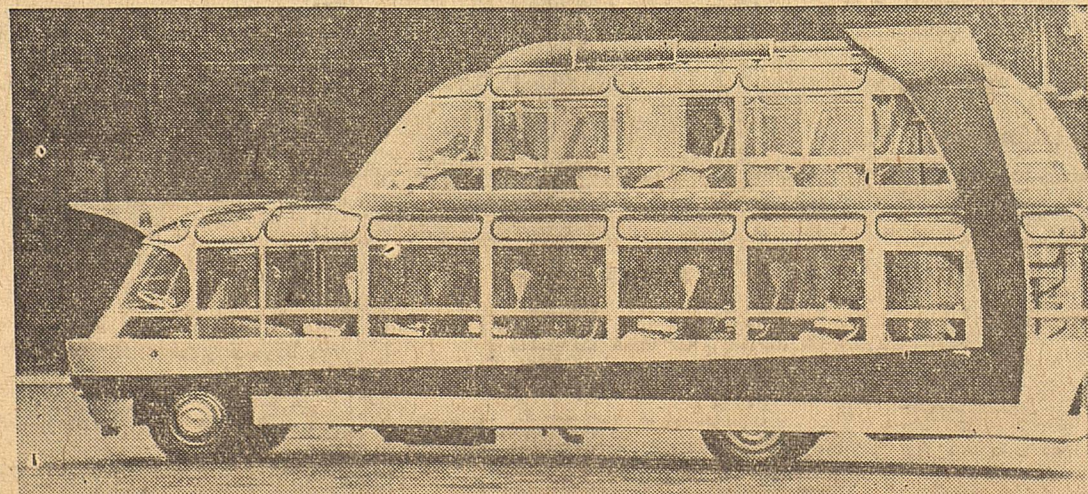
Installation of dial telephones will begin in the immediate future here. W. H. McNally, manager, announced today.

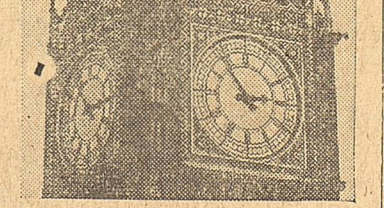
The county poultry judging team came out second, and the dairy judging team won fourth place.
