Who Pays What Taxes and How

Nothing certain, says the old saw, but death and taxes. True enough. But while taxes are certain, the kind of taxes is not so certain.

The Federation of Tax Administrators found that out in a recent survey. And they found that 42 per cent of all taxes collected by governmental units in 1939 were of a kind entirely absent from the tax system of 40 years ago.

Taxation was a simple matter in the early 1900s. More than half of the taxes collected then were direct property taxes—you owned a house or a lot, or a building, or a piano, and you paid taxes on it. That was the beef-and-potatoes of government support in those days. But today only a third of taxes come from that source.

Here, from Treasury figures and the Census Bureau, are figures that show who pays what taxes and how:

Several things appear from the above table. First, we have no "tariff for revenue" at all, for customs receipts are a poor last among sources of income.

Observe how the automobile has come to the front as a tax source, with 10 per cent of all taxes in 1939 coming from auto and gas taxes.

The apparent rise in the percentage of income taxes is not conclusive as the table makes it appear, as in 1922, for instance, income taxes accounted for as much as 28.6 per cent of tax collections.

This swing in the kind of taxes over a period of years shows clearly how taxation, like everything else, has had to adjust itself to a changing civilization.

Fords for 1941 Are Larger, More Beautiful, Outside and Inside

DEARBORN, Mich. — The new Ford line is released for public inspection Friday.

There has been a lot of advance discussion of changes. And changes there are, starting off with a considerable increase in size for the Ford V-8's, De Luxe and Super DeLuxe.

Designers have taken full advantage of increased wheelbase and overall lengths to give added spaciousness, and Ford engineers have worked right up from bigger tires through to luxury seat cushions and new softer springs for the solid enhancement of riding comfort.

A new four-cylinder truck and commercial car engine is part of the economy features included in the Ford working line.

The wheelbase of these big new DeLuxe and Super DeLuxe Ford V-8's is longer and the overall length greater. The designers have taken advantage of this extra overall to increase the inside body length both in foot room and seating width. In fact, the front seat of the sedan is seven inches wider than last year. The head room is greater and the window area, already large in previous Ford cars, is even larger this year.

Running boards have practically disappeared from sight, due to the width of the new bodies. But they are there to step off when the doors are opened.

The 85-horsepower V-8 engine is still unique as it is in the only eight cylinder car in the low price field. These new Fords have lower transmission gear ratios thus hiking up the "get-away."

In addition to beauty both inside and outside the Ford engineers emphasize the greatly improved ride in all 1941 models.

This extra riding comfort starts with two inches longer wheelbase and a new electrically welded "X" type frame. This new frame structure is 100 per cent more rigid, making the body now mounted on big rubber cushions still quieter in service. The springs, front and rear, with their increased effective length, have a balanced action eliminating any

"pitching" and give the easiest kind of ride. The rear seat cushions are two inches farther ahead of the rear spring and axle, which further improves the riding qualities.

The four lever-type hydraulic shock absorbers now have a more sensitive adjustment to match the new softer acting springs. The new improved ride stabilizer, connected by swinging shackles to the front axle, minimizes side sway and improves steering.

Super DeLuxe cushions are unusually comfortable since luxury type individual coil springs are used. Over these is a thick pad of latex treated curled hair which gives a softness only associated with expensive cars in the past.

The new Fords have big 12-inch hydraulic brakes, for quick, smooth action and long service. The emergency, or parking brake, is on the rear wheels and operated by a steel cable. The brake lever is under the instrument panel, at the left of the driver. The new hood lock knob is located under the instrument panel near the brake lever. This protects the engine, battery and accessories from theft.

An entirely new body design is included in the 1941 Super DeLuxe line—a sedan coupe. This coupe combines a close coupled body design with comfortable seating for six. Also in the line there is a convertible club coupe, seating five, and equipped with an electrically operated top that functions even when the engine is not running. It is operated by throwing an electric switch.

There are four body types in the DeLuxe line, six in the Super DeLuxe. There are three color choices for the DeLuxe and six in the Super DeLuxe line.

Among the refinements which are new this year on all models are the speed lines on the side of both front and rear fenders, the new hidden gasoline filler cap, electric light on the luggage compartment lid which automatically lights whenever the lid is raised if the car lights are burning, ventilating front windows, a new wide tempered glass one-piece rear

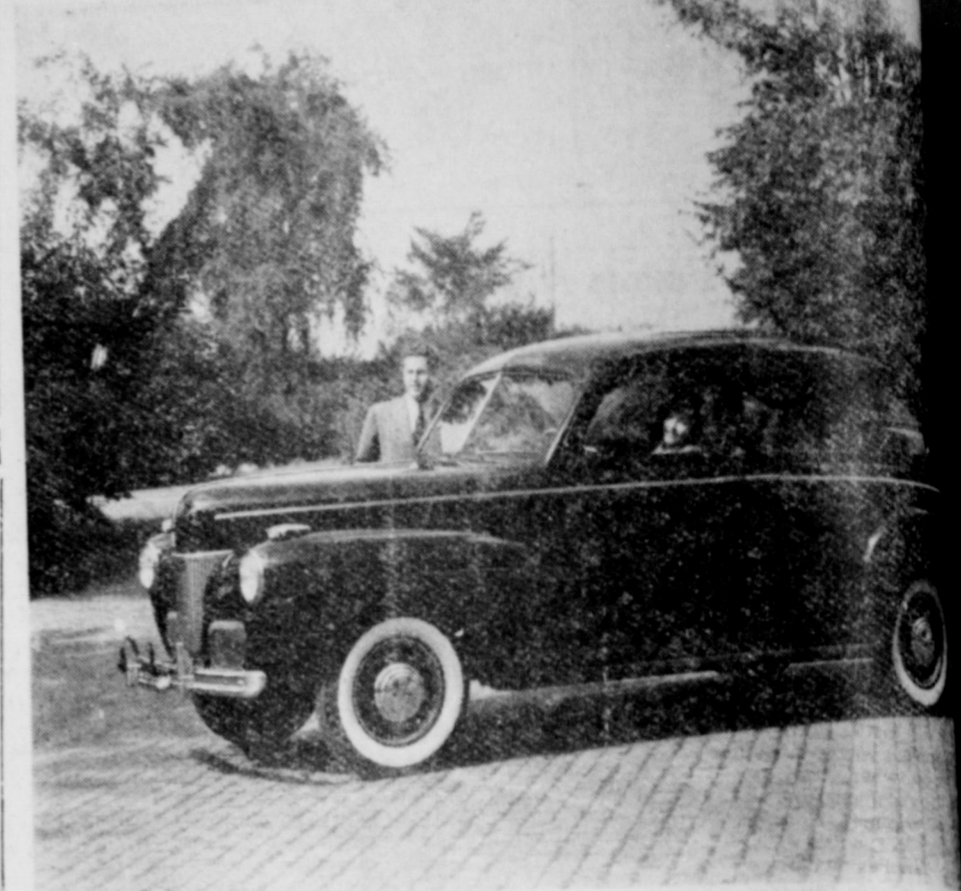
Surface Soil To Hold Proof Of Underground Oil

TULSA, Okla.—Oil fields of the future may be discovered by surface indications, almost as they were in the beginnings of the industry, recent developments in the exploration branch of the industry indicate.

Earliest oil fields in the United States were drilled where direct observation promised the possibility of finding oil—where there was visible or tastible evidence of oil or gas bubbling from the ground or standing on the surface of pools and streams.

All the available surface indications throughout the length and breadth of the nation soon were found and drilled, however. For many decades now the sites of most exploratory wells have been determined scientifically by the geologist, the geochemist, the physicist, the paleontologist, and a host of others who have used instruments and analysis to figure out unseen underground geological formations. Currently they have a batting average of about one hit in seven tries. Soon, however, if the newest deductions of the scientists are correct, the industry may come full circle, back to its beginnings, with a difference.

Experimentation has convinced many shrewd oil men that although there are no more oil springs to point the way, the surface of the earth still holds important direct indications of the window, radio grilles in all cars, twin windshield wipers with speed control, twin sun visors, fender top parking lamps, and two-spoke, clear-vision comfort-type steering wheels. presence of oil and gas miles underground, evidence in the presence of hydrocarbon compounds that, as gas, have leaked for centuries through the thousands of feet of intervening rock to leave undeniable traces in or near the surface soil.

The theory is that slowly the hydrocarbon vapors distilled from buried oil formations by underground pressures as high as 6,000 pounds per square inch and temperatures which often reach 200 degrees F., tend to pass upward through rock pores and rock frac-

tures to the surface. Here they are whisked away by the wind, but not before they have left behind in the earth nearly all of their wax and mineral make-up.

By chemical and spectrographic analysis these test-tube wildcaters are beginning to study the soil of thousands of acres of possible oil-bearing territory, and they believe that, either by soil analysis alone, or by combining their results with those of the other scientific methods of modern oil exploration, they can report for the first time the positive presence of oil and gas.

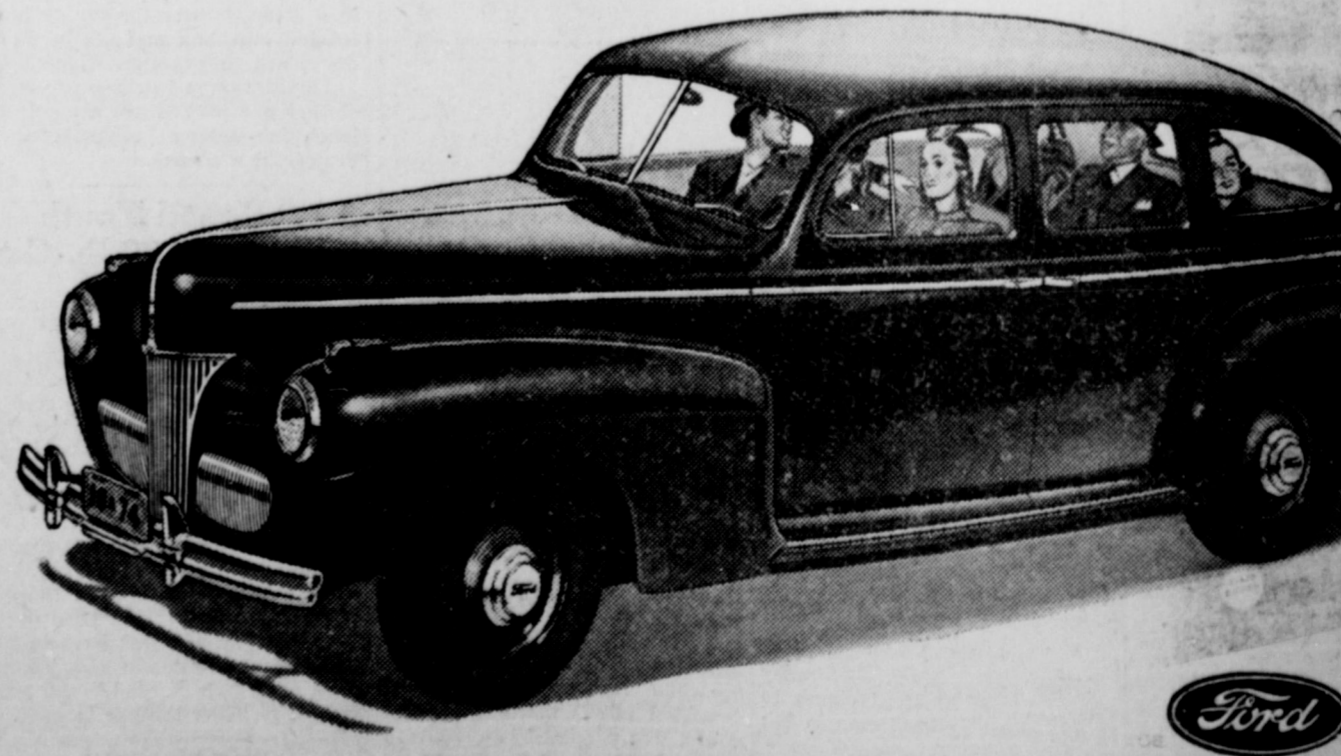

MODERN MENUS

BOTH for economy and for the sake of good nutrition, include liver and kidneys in your balanced weekly menus for all the family.

Calves liver is usually more expensive than beef or lamb liver. It has both tenderness and delicacy in flavor. But the other livers can be made equally delicious and tender with careful cooking. Lamb's kidneys are considered the most delicate, but beef and veal kidneys are also good eating.

TOMORROW'S MENU

BREAKFAST: Green apple sauce, wheat cereal, bacon rolls, currant jelly, coffee, milk.

LUNCHEON: Cheese souffle, cole slaw, orange and banana cup, cookies, tea, milk.

DINNER: Beef kidney stew, mashed potatoes, broiled tomatoes, celery, stewed fresh prunes, soft custard sauce, coffee, milk.

LIVER WITH SOUR CREAM

One and one-half pounds of beef liver sliced 1/2 inch thick, flour, salt, pepper, butter or bacon grease, 1 cup sour cream, 1 tablespoon minced parsley.

Remove tendons and tubes from liver if butcher has not done so. Wipe with damp cloth. Mix salt and pepper and flour and dredge liver with mixture. Get fat hot in frying pan. Cook liver for 5 minutes, turning occasionally until well browned. Add more fat if needed. When liver is browned turn in sour cream and slowly bring to boil. Sprinkle with parsley.

A beef kidney stew makes an ideal high nutrition low-cost dinner special. Serve with mashed potatoes or noodles and broiled halved tomatoes.

SLIVER OF GARLIC

3 tablespoons flour, 1/2 teaspoon black pepper, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 cups water or vegetable stock, 1 teaspoon minced parsley, 2 teaspoons minced celery leaves, 2 tablespoons sherry or 1 tablespoon lemon juice.

Split kidneys. Remove membrane and tubes, using sharp knife. Slice kidneys. Cover with salted water and stand for 30 minutes. Drain. Heat butter, add onion, garlic and kidney slices. Simmer for 3 minutes. Stir in flour and seasonings and continue to stir until all slices are well coated. Then slowly stir in liquid and continue to stir.

Add minced parsley and celery. When mixture begins to thicken, cover. Simmer for 15 minutes or longer until kidney slices are tender. Add sherry or lemon juice. Serve very hot on large squares of toast.

Tongue and brains are also low-cost high-nutrition meats and are important factors in our "home defense" menus.

Famous Painting Hangs In Club At Fort Bliss, Texas

EL PASO, Texas.—On the wall of the officers' club at Fort Bliss stretched to a wooden frame by ropes run through holes which once were the fasteners for a covered wagon hangs the original of the most famous drawing of life in the old west.

A. Custer was a member. Annually, members of the 7th Cavalry gather to hear the history and tradition of their famous regiment and to pay homage to the painting in an unusual ceremony.

The painting is nine feet, six inches wide and 16 feet, five inches in length.

Custer is the central figure. His sabre is run through an Indian's body. He holds his empty pistol by the barrel. White men are fallen with red warriors gloating over them. Indians throng to the foreground, exultant.

There is tremendous action in the old painting, bravery, despair, tragedy, the glee of savages.

The artist is believed to have been one Cassidy Adams. The story has it that he relied on a scout's report to depict the scene. He reportedly sold the picture to a St. Louis saloon proprietor. An art collector brought it in 1892 and presented it to the 7th Cavalry during the Spanish-American war. The regiment then was stationed at Fort Riley, Kansas, but since has been transferred to Fort Bliss.

The 7th Cavalry is one of the most colorful regiments in the

army. In its early days it was led by General Custer and was wiped out by Indians in the massacre of Little Big Horn, which inspired the painting.

An El Paso photographer reproduced the old painting after much work with lighting effects and camera. His reproduction brought out points observers of the original picture had never seen. Detail, expressions on faces and background of bare Dakota hills.

During saloon days a copy of the painting hung over almost every bar in the country. Even today it may be seen in many cafes of the nation.
