Another improvement in the new bonds is higher interest paid o holders who find they have to ash their bonds prior to maturity. Both redemption values for the new E bonds and interest payments on the new H bonds are substantially increased for the arlier years.

For example, the redemption alue of a new E bond is increased o as to yield 3 percent at the end of 3 years, compared with 2 1-4 perrent heretofore, and to yield 3.20 percent at the end of 6 years, ompared with 2.64 percent here-

The improved rates apply autonatically to all E and H bonds ourchased on or after February 1 persons who have bought these onds since that date need not ake any further action to assure etting the improved terms. This true even though the E and H onds purchased since February 1 may have imprinted on them the ormer (and now obsolete) tabes of redemption values or interst payment scales. The law specifically requires the County Clerks to approve notary bonds. In Eastland County, Johnson Smith, county clerk, approves bonds.

Any person not now a notary public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk between May 1 and May 20. Application duract this period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of reappointing present notaries.

Secretary of State Steakley further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a notary public must be at lease 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.


