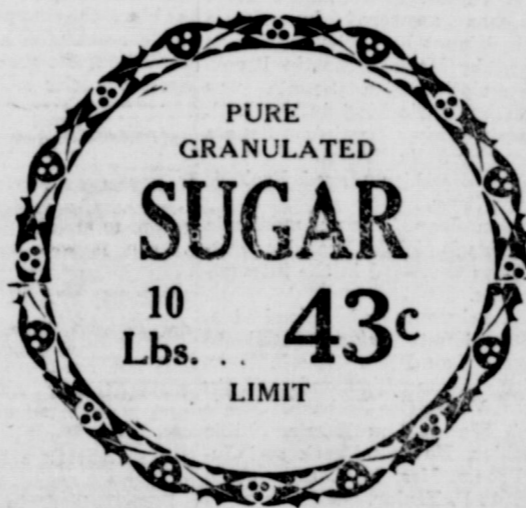

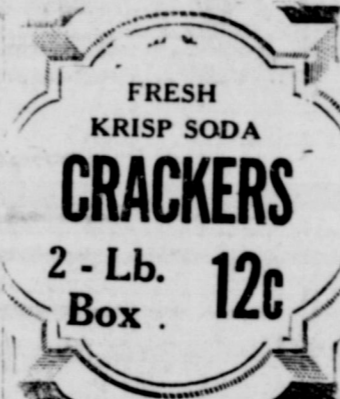

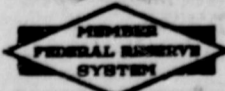

Planes To Remain As the Long Arm Of Artillery War

AUSTIN, Tex.—Pursuit planes and bombers—no matter how destructive they become—will continue to remain the "long arm" of the artillery in modern warfare, a University of Texas aeronautics authority believes.

Highly touted by its extensive use in the present war, the airplane is still just an advance guard to make the enemy vulnerable for attack from the ground, Dr. Milton J. Thompson, graduate aeronautics professor, declared.

Appointed this week to steer work for the University's new master's degree in aeronautical engineering, Dr. Thompson, who received his doctorate from the Warsaw Polytechnical School in Poland, comes from the University of Michigan faculty.

While a close comparison is not now possible, American aircraft—from the standpoint of engine durability and maneuverability—equal the world's best, the air dynamics expert said.
