And it seems that Gorman folks rather resent having to have their commissio ner work very much in the lake area. Now Bennett didn't tell us this, but it's not hard to find out. As for Eastland and Ranger people, the folks who (with the exception of the Staff residents) are most concerned with roads in that area, what can they do? They have a million and a half dollars invested in an area that is controlled by Gorman voters.

Now we don't resent Gorman's attitude. Probably if Gorman had a lake in our precinct we wouldn't want Tip Arther out building roads around it either.

The entire thing gets back to something we mentioned a couple of times before. Road and bridge funds in this county are split four ways.
