



### Traffic Jam on the Mercy Highway

The American people has always had a big heart. It has always been alert to spring to the relief of distress.

That is true today as in the past, and millions in money and goods have poured across the seas to a dozen lands where misery rules. But traffic is beginning to jam on that broad highway of mercy. Some 300 relief organizations are today registered with the State Department to furnish money, clothing, or other supplies to peoples abroad. They are beginning to get in each other's way, competing for funds among generous Americans already somewhat bedeviled by demands, competing for space in ships already overcrowded.

Secretary Hull, than whom there is no greater humanitarian in the country, has had to ask for traffic regulation on the mercy highway. In response to his request, the President has appointed a committee to look over the situation and see what can be done in the way of "priorities" in relief work.

So far as we have seen, there has been no move to prohibit solicitation by any reputable supporter of any cause. After all, it's a free country, and people have a right to give away their money to anyone they choose. But they have a right, also, to be able to find out what are the prospects of their aid effectively reaching the people for whom it is intended.

Secretary Hull was careful to point out that "all of these efforts are inspired by the finest human instincts," but after all, more is needed these days than a mere kind-, ly impulse. The Red Cross, for example, is the key American agency for relief work abroad, and Hull properly suggests that the work of all others be considered in its o'clock service at the First Methrelation to that of the Red Cross. There is the matter of seeing that they do not conflict with local welfare services, and that they do not attempt to furnish material not asked or needed, material that is already being supplied, or that cannot be shipped after it is collected.

There is also the unpleasant fact that during the World War many solicitations were organized that turned out to be plain fakes.

Not, then, in any sense of "censoring" causes which make claims on American generosity, but in a sense of coordinating efforts so that the most good can be accomplished with the least lost motion, the proposed survey may well supplement heart with head.





SUNDAY dinner should always be based on at least one particularly special dish. Chicken is a customary Sunday treat. Baked ham is popular. For the very low budget, the macaroni and peanut butter casserole given here provides nutrition, novelty, flavor and protein at minimum

Broilers and fryers are spring items. If your budget permits them, treat the family.

### SCALLOPED MACARONI AND PEANUT BUTTER

One cup elbow macaroni, 1 small onion, 1 stalk celery, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 cup milk, 3 tablespoons peanut butter, 1/4 cup dry bread crumbs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/8 teaspoon pepper. Cook macaroni in boiling salted

When tender drain and water. When tender drain and put in a buttered baking dish. Chop onion and celery and saute slightly in butter. Add milk, pea-nut butter and seasonings, heat and pour over macaroni. Sprinkle with bread crumbs and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 30 minutes.


