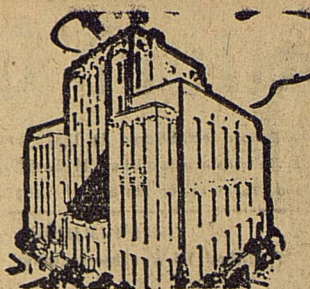

That's an average of 4.2 yards a try, which is mighty healthy considering the times Quarterback Clint Humphreys waded Go Saul, go, in the last ear. Larry Hollis had the best average for the night. Hollis put his hands on the ball just six times, but picked up 61 yards in doing it. That gave him an average of 10.1 yards a try. Shooting Claimed Accident

A young Fort Worth man was seriously injured Tuesday night in a shooting in Eastland which he claimed was accidental.

Rodney Lee Hale was treated at Eastland Memorial Hospital for a shot wound in the leg. He was later transferred to a Fort Worth hospital. Fort Worth police said Hale's mother reported to them that the shooting was accidental.

The man was shot with an 18 1/2 inch sawed off shotgun, however. Sheriff J. B. Williams described the weapon as illegal and is holding it. Williams said both Hale and two other men who were witnesses to the shooting said it was accidental. He said they claimed the trio was riding in their car on Highway 80 near Eastland when the shotgun, which was in the front floorboard of the car, accidentally discharged. Hale was rushed to the hospital in Eastland.

Sheriff Williams is holding one of the men who was in the car on an AWOL charge. He is Homer Rice, believed to be of Stephenville.

Mavs to Host Dublin In Second AA Outing

Eastland Is Slight Favorite In Game Probable Line-Ups

An Eastland Maverick team that got a good smell of victory last week before watching Cisco drag off the win will host the Dublin Lions here Friday night at Maverick Stadium. Kickoff time is 8 p.m.

In the Lions the Mavericks will be facing their second Class AA opponents in as many weeks. Last Friday Dublin posted the Alvarado Indians, 25-0, while Eastland was taking a 21-18 setback at the hands of the Lobos.

Eastland, with the home field advantage, will be favored in the game, but the Lions, remembering what the Mavericks did to them last year may want some sweet revenge.

Superintendent Reminds Drivers Of Special Law

Three state agencies joined today in urging the continuation of a state wide program to acquaint the public with the Texas law requiring all vehicles to stop when approaching a school bus loading or unloading children, according to County School Supt. H. R. (Pop) Garrett.

The Texas Education Agency, the Texas Highway Department, and the Texas Department of Public Safety are making a joint request that school superintendents, newspapers, radio stations, and television stations participate in efforts to acquaint drivers with the school bus law.

"Superintendents and news editors performed an outstanding public service in this safety campaign last year," said J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education. "Yet 7 lives were lost during the school year in collisions involving school buses. There is a continuing need for a program of safety education."

There were two more fatalities during 1956-57 than were reported to the Department of Public Safety in 1955-56. The total number of accidents reported declined however, from 379 to 335. (During the past year the Highway erected signs on all major roads warning motorists of the safety measure.)

The law says in effect, that upon meeting or overtaking a school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging children, the driver of any vehicle shall stop immediately before passing. After coming to a stop the driver of the vehicle can proceed (Continued on Page Two)

Against Alvarado the Lions did a lot of passing, although not with much success. Eastland Coach Carol Shelton says they have a good passer, but the receivers were not doing a good job. Seven fumbles also hurt Dublin in their opening game.

Coaches Shelton and Jon Tate have done some re-arranging in the Mav starting line-up. Kenneth Watson is listed as the starting offensive center this week in the place of Freddie Tucker and Charles Thompson is down at end in place of Stanley Reed. The offensive Mav line shown above in the probable line-up box.

Shelton says he will probably start Johnny McMahan and Butch Martin or Marvin Agnew at ends on defense. Tucker and Wayne Dodson will get the call at the tackle slots and three of four boys Larry Aldredge, Knick Arther, Kenneth Watson and Martin will start as linebackers.

Saul Pullman and Ronald Robertson will get the call as outside linebackers and Larry Hollis and Bill Norwood will round out the secondary. Another lad due to see a lot of secondary defense action this week is Truman Lane.

Shelton also revealed that he may snift Ronald Robertson, Co-captain, from halfback to offensive end during the game.

The teams are equally matched as far as weights go. The Mavs average starting team will average out just over 159 pounds a man and the Lion's starters average just a fraction under 159 pounds a man. In the line Eastland's average will be 164 pounds a man, compared to 161 for Dublin, but in the backfield the Mavs will average out to just 151 pounds a man compared to 155 for Dublin.

Cisco Police On False Alarm As Robberies Occur

Eastland County Sheriff's officers and Cisco city police today were still investigating a wave of burglaries which took place in Cisco early Tuesday morning while Cisco police were out of the downtown area on a false burglary alarm.

More than \$5000 in cash and jewelry was taken as daring burglars hit four business houses in Cisco. Hardest hit was Levee-Jewelry, where about \$5000 in diamonds, diamond rings and watches were stolen.

Sheriff J. B. Williams said the burglars entered through the front door of all of the places. Besides the jewelry store Paul's Recreation Hall, Thompson's Garage and Gurney Motor Co. were entered. Burglars took \$30 in cash from a cigarette machine, \$10 from a cold drink box and \$5 from the cash register at the recreation hall, but nothing was missing from the other two business houses.

Sheriff Williams said Cisco police got a telephone call just before the actual burglaries took place, saying a place was being entered into on Avenue D, several blocks from the downtown section of Cisco. Officers converged on the area, and while they left the downtown area unguarded, the burglars entered the business houses, one of which is just around the corner from the police station. No arrests had been made this morning.

EASTLAND COUNTY HISTORY REVIEW

More Pioneers Mentioned

(Editor's Note: This is the 16th in a series of articles taken from the book, "A History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langston in 1904.)

Five Generations

The accompanying illustration represents five generations. Captain J. J. Keith, born in Alabama in 1822, and Miss Isabel Ely, born in Virginia in 1823, were married in Arkansas, March 8, 1839, and emigrated to Titus County, Texas, in 1844, thus becoming citizens of the Republic of Texas. While here, on December 10, 1846, their oldest son, T. E., was born. In 1860, while living in Trath County, this family with the O'Neals and others, fortified themselves at Dublin (this found the name of the settlement) and remained there until April, 1863. They finally located at Mansker Lake, where Mr. Keith engaged in stock-raising. His daughter, Ellen, Mrs. Derrington of Saban-

no, who was the first girl baby born in the county. While residing in Erath Mr. Keith raised a company of Rangers and was made their Captain.

This venerable couple have lived for the last twelve years at Curtis with their daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth Pressley, and have more than one hundred descendants. On the 8th of March, 1904, they will have been married 65 years. Out of their thirteen children eight are still living.

Their oldest son, T. E. Keith, has been prominently connected with the history of Eastland since 1863, when he "scouted for Indians." On July 4, 1864, he was married at Mansker Lake to Miss Caroline J. Arthur, daughter of William J. Arthur, and now lives near Curtis. "Uncle Tom," as he is familiarly called, has served the county as Commissioner and Justice of the Peace many times. When he realized that he needed the education that he had been deprived of, he began being born and reared on the frontier, he set to work with rare energy and tenacity of purpose to remedy the defect, and at the age of fifty-four was admitted to the bar after satisfactory examination. Honor to such persistent effort!

H. S. Sebmielk

The first Sheriff of Eastland was born in Arkansas, December 28, 1842. He enlisted in the Confederate Army (1861) as First Lieutenant in the 7th Arkansas Regiment, and served until the surrender in 1865.

In 1868 he came to Eastland and engaged in the cattle business. When the County was organized in 1873, he held the office of Sheriff for eight consecutive years. He has been merchandizing since his term of office expired. He is a member of the Christian Church.

The Stockton Family
In 1868, Ike and Tom Stockton accompanied by their two sisters, Amanda and Sallie Kila, emigrated to Eastland and finding a desirable place near De-demona.

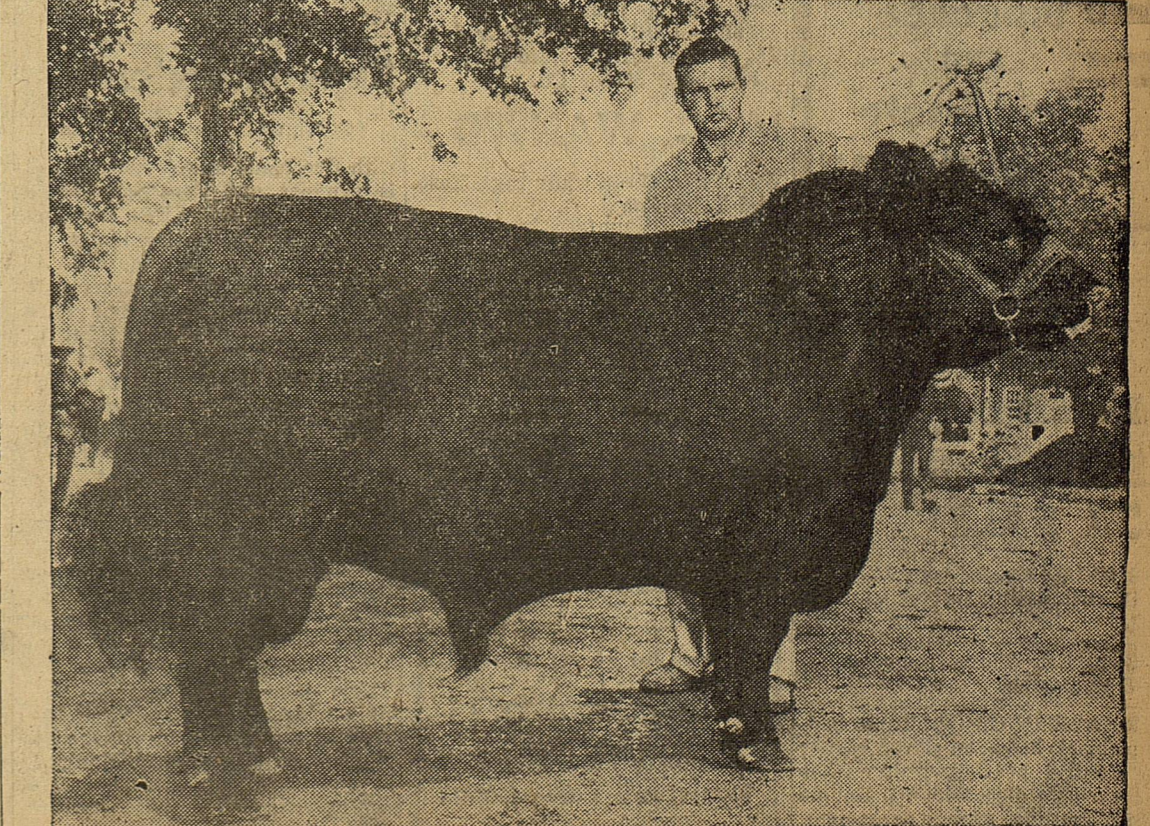

with due caution at a speed which is prudent and does not exceed ten miles per hour. The law does not apply within city limits.

Vehicles are not required to stop on highways with separate roadways when the bus is on a different roadway from that of a passing vehicle. Vehicles are not required to stop if the school bus is stopped in a loading zone which is a part of or adjacent to a controlled-access highway and where pedestrians are not permitted to cross the roadways.

All public school buses are painted yellow and have "School Bus" painted in large letters on the front and rear of each bus.

They are equipped with flasher lights usually mounted high on the front and rear of the bus. These flashing lights are used only when the bus is in the process of stopping or is stopped to receive or discharge children.

from the highway in a swamp, and, or course the only accessible route through the brush and woods was down the seis line. Our jag hustlers and brush cutters, all from Ville Platte, Turkey, Mamou, Chatagnier, and Lone Pine, La., quickly started picking up cable and seices—288 in all—so the path out of the woods would be clear for the truck driven by E. Walsworth of Winfield, La. In the meanwhile—even as a rifle while as it was Gene Glasner and driller Art Mills of Anaheim, Calif., started the snake bite treatment, faithfully following the directions in the safety manual.

Jo Bob Van Meter, from Caster, Wyo., was dispatched on foot to locate a phone (five miles distant) to call Chris Elston party manager from Cordell, Okla., to meet the men in the truck to get Ed to the doctor as soon as possible. Bob ran the first three miles but began to catch his breath a bit when an alligator climbed out of the bayou beside him. Thus furnished with the required amount of "incentive" he ran the other two miles without stopping. He found a store with a phone, made a call, and allowed the obliging storekeeper to water and fan him back to normal. It took Bob a while to get the call through to Chris because the line was tied up but finally the emergency was explained and Chris passed the word to John Gardner, computer from Matoy, Okla., to arrange for a doctor to stand by to receive the bitten victim at the local hospital.

Then Chris, in high gear, dashed to his field driving 20 miles to meet the truck carrying Ed just as it came out of the woods. That alligator had really done Van Meter a favor when he "inspired" him to make that five-mile sprint in record time! Ed was transferred to Chirs' blue Olds, and Van Meter administered the continour first aid treatment.

By 11:30 a.m. Ed was comfortable in a hospital bed, out of immediate danger and ready to have 21 shots during the next 24 hours' treatment. He was released in A-1 shape. A blood test revealed that he had been bitten by a venomous snake. The doctor commended GSIers who gave the first aid treatment so quickly and correctly. Without their prompt and thorough help, Ed could not have left the hospital 24 hours later with no ill effects.



Senator Lyndon Johnson has been described as one of the most persuasive men in Washington has ever known. If you think the description exaggerated, here is an incident.

In 1948, Johnson was running for the Senate. It was the last day of the campaign. The race was close—(actually, the margin proved to be only 87 votes).

I was in the office of a San Antonio businessman who was very conservative. A friend of his had "extorted" a promise that he would meet Johnson at 4 o'clock in his hotel suit that afternoon. "I'm not going to vote for him," my acquaintance said, "but I'm stuck—I'll have to go or Jack—(the man who had phoned)—will be sore."

Then he said, "If you will be in the hotel lobby, I'll see you right after the visit with Johnson. I won't take long. Then we can talk about that subject you want to write about." Afterward, he told me about the interview with Johnson.

"I never met a man who was more pleasant, more alert, more dynamic, more eloquent—and, as I listed, I found he was expressing my views to perfection. I promised to vote for him and to get my friends to do so."

I knew something had happened because when the man got out of the elevator, he had an expression as though he had been hypnotized. He looked right at me without the slightest sign of recognition and walked on out.

Two hours later, he telephoned to apologize and explain.

Since that time, I have never questioned any statement as to Senator Johnson's ability to gain friends and influence people.

Ring Lardner once wrote about another author, Irvin S. Cobb: "Mr. Cobb is never as happy as when he is among his books - of which he has a complete set."

Theodore Roosevelt once spoke with pity for "those cold and timid souls who have known neither victory nor defeat."
