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### Debunking Defunct Funk Bunk

To do to the world what Germany is trying to do to it requires many kinds of men.

It requires street brawlers like Rudolf Hess to overawe physical opposition and beat helpless minority people into a bloody pulp. It requires wily intriguers like Von Pappen to beguile diplomats. It requires traitors to their countries, like Quisling. It requires masters of manipulation of the mass-mind, like Goebbels! It also requires at least one oily but respectable voice to assure everyone that all this is being done for their own good and for the good of all the

Such a voice is that of Dr. Walther Funk, the shrewd "economic brain" of the Reich. His mission is to appeal to business men throughout the world in an effort to assure them that all Germany wants is prosperity for all, and that dealing with the economic colossus she is trying to set up will be pleasant and profitable for the rest of the

So the plausible Dr. Funk is out with another of his frequent efforts to reassure an alarmed world. As usual, there is just enough truth in what he says to make it persuasive. And as usual the basis and the conclusions are as false as a shotglass in a clip-joint.

Excessive nationalism, extreme autarchy, border trade barriers, says Dr. Funk, were part of the cause of economic collapse before the war. Right. No use trying to reconstruct the world on the same principles that led to its collapse, he insinuates. Right.


With all due respect to a big-shot banker and a man who probably knows more about economics than we do, we are tempted to make a rude, derisive noise at this

What "co-operation"? What "equal partners"? The kind of "co-operation" that France and Italy and Bulgaria and Hungary and Rumania-yes, and Russia, are now giving Germany at gun point? The kind of "equal partners" that Mussolini and Hirohito and Quisling and Darlan and Franco and Michael and Boris and Pu Yi and Wang are to Hitler?

No, thank you. It may be, and it probably is necessary to remake the international economic mold of the world. But it is not going to be done at gun point, against the world's will, and exclusively according to the design of Adolf Hitler, or even that of Dr. Funk.

The eminently respectable Dr. Funk probably never clubbed a Jew in his life, probably never shot down a single man or woman standing in defense of their homes. But the economic blueprint extended in his immaculatelygloved hand is hard to read, somehow, smudged and smeared - Great Heavens, man look out there! That's



# South Texas Area Sees New Industry In Flower Growing

FRIO CITY, Tex.—It looks like his section of South Texas is going to have a brand new industry, a new money crop and the title of

The loamy soir that covers much of this area long has provided vegetables for Texas dinner tables but recent demands for flowers have been so insistent that it now appears marigolds, snapdragons and gladioli soon will replace spinach, potatoes and beans in the

affections of truck farmers here Five years ago a few of the Belgian truck farmers in this area experimented with flowers planting a few rows of gladioli, zinnias and marigolds among the beans and spinach.

The flowers found a ready market, bringing a good price from the "cemetery trade." Stands were set up along the San Antono-Castroville road and the flower tores soon numbered a dozen.

Vegetable-growing truck farmers were called upon to supply an ever-growing demand for blossoms and the marigolds and snapdragons soon had pushed the potato and carrot right off the farmer's planting schedule. He began to read flower and seed catalogue

Today it is estimated that 70 per cent of the acreage of truck farms in the South San Antonio area have been alloted to growing

The current crop includes gladoli, delphinium, zinnias, marigolds and snapdragons. Hundreds of bunches are cut daily. Gladioli are listed as the most valuable flower crop. This flower now is eing shipped in large quantities to Houston, Dallas and San Antonio where florists find it a favorite for corsages

Jones Boys Go to Work for Business As Commerce Secretary Reshapes Department

WASHINGTON.-Whether it works or not, give the Department of commerce credit for trying to reorganize some of the bureaucracy out of its system, particularly in the big Bureau of Foreign and Do-

In spite of the war, which has nearly wrecked our foreign commerce, and in spite of the defense effort which dictates that "business as usual" must go for the duration, the domestic commerce boys feel that they have a job to do in helping business wherever possible. Out of that idea has come the general reshuffling of the bureau. Center of the new idea will be 12 apostles to

spead the word from Washington. They will be called Regional Business Consultants and there will be one for each of the 12 sederal reserve districts. These 12 men, hand picked not only from the bureau but also from business and research staffs of several universities, will gather in Washington soon to begin a course of training.

Then, early in the fall, they will take up their jobs in Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Cleveland, Richmond, Atlanta, Chicago, St. Louis, Minneapolis Kansas City, Dallas and San Francisco. They will be backed up by 19 field officers already at work in other key cities,

and the entire 31 will be known as "The United States Department of Commerce Field Service." THE idea is that this new agency will work both ways. Field officers will report to Washington on business conditions in their districts and will be available as business consultants to trade associations, chambers of commerce, and individual business executives.

While this new field service is the one that will have the most direct contact with business men in every community, it is only one phase of the broader plan of Department of Commerce reorganization. Previously, the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce was erganized on what was called a vertical basis. That is, there was a separate division for every commodity or group of industries. There were bureau chiefs for chemicals, iron and steel, movies, machinery, tobacco, and so on. The tendency was for each division to consider that its particular pet and baby was the center of the world and that all other business revolved around it.

Under the reorganization, most of these division or commodity or industry chiefs-of-ection have been given the status of consultants, and their function hereafter will be to sit in with the new horizontal organization of five principal divisions. The Field Service unit out-lined previously becomes the Division of Regional Economy. There is a Division of International Economy, which is foreign trade. A Division of Industrial Economy, organized horizontally by units of merchandising, consumption, construction, durable goods, and sogon, Divisions of Research and Information complete the picture.

NOW all this may seem like a lot of governmental red tape organization which it probably is and you shouldn't be bothered by it It is illustrative, however, of the way these big government bureaus operate. You could wander for days through this Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce without meeting all the people or finding out what they do.

When the Department of Commerce Building was finished, it was dubbed Hoover's Folly and everybody wondered what on earth they would use to fill all the offices on all seven floors covering the equal of two big city blocks. Louis chased Pastor enough to get a verdict in 10 and knocked him out in 11 after he was spotted three knockdowns in Round One. Conn struck Pastor low repeatedly in knocking him out in 13.


Conn never was an amateur and Louis never appeared in a preliminary as a professional.

# Are Strengthened

BANGKOK. Thailand .- Burma is quietly arming for defense, according to travelers arriving here from Rangoon.

Burma already has an army of 20,000 men and is expecting more from India, it is reported.
