Sweden Lets Nazzis Go Across Borders

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, June weden officially announced today that she had permitted one division of German troops to cross the Swedish territory from Norway to Finland, but she would remain neutral otherwise.

Adolf Hitler's blitzkrieg offen-sive in Russia met stubborn resist-ance today on the Southern Front, protecting the Soviet's rich Ikraine, but the Nazis claimed teady advances in Lithuania on he north wing and reported Finand's armed forces had joined in the war against the Soviet Red

Neither Moscow nor Berlin reported developments on the Central Front in Poland, but both sides claimed important successes in the air and the Nazi command said that great military successes were now expected to result in mile Eastern Front.

The air offensive resulted in a series of Russian attacks on Helsinki's airport and other Finnish towns, where the Finnish Government said that 20 Russian planes had been shot down after the bombardments had started fires, killed two civilians

wounded many others. The Finnish Parliament met in ecret session, presumably to declare a state of war with Russia. but dispatches from Helsinki did not confirm the German statenents that the Finns already were fighting with the Nazis.

The entry of Finland into the war-renewing the conflict won by Russia in 1940-emphasized the German determination to strike at the industrial city of Leningrad, which was indirectly reported heavily hit and fired by Nazi planes. 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'A Sacred Trust of Civilization'

The little ring of politicians at Vichy who now control such "freedom of action" as is left to France have issued some pretty resounding statements about defending the French Empire. Frenchmen in Syria are dying for that.

Is memory so short? Syrla is no part of the French Empire, and never was, and never was intended to be. Syria is supposed to be an independent country over which France was given a mandate by the Treaty of Versailles and the League of Nations. The theory of a mandate is that a country or a territory unaccustomed to political freedom, or unable to defend it by force, is given a sort of "big brother" nation to be its political adviser and physical defender until it is able to shift for itself.

That is the position of France-in Syria, that and nothing else. France accepted the mandate under the terms of Article 22 of the Treaty of Versailles, pledging herslf to consider the "well-being and development" of Syria "a sacred trust of civilization."

The people of Syria, long under Turkish domination and freed from that by the World War, wanted the United States to accept the mandate over them if they had to have a mandatory power.

President Wilson had insisted at the Peace Conference that the inhabitants of Syria and Palestine be consulted as to their future fate. He sent a mission, under Charles P. Crane, to find out what they wanted-and he was the only one who went even that far. What they wanted was independence, but if they had to have a mandate, they wanted the Unitd States.

In that, as in many other of his proposals, Wilson was overruled. The French got the mandate.



Loaded down with French civil and military brasshats, it never knew a moment's peace, and attempts at military revolt were ruthlessly crushed by the French, who never gave the slightest sign of ever getting

RAILWAY RANGS LABOR UNION DEMANOS WOULD CIST 900 Million Dollars

HE labor unions have made their demands upon the railways of the United States — and through the railways upon the PUBLIC. These demands are vastly larger in proportion than any they have ever made. The economical and efficient operation of the railways is vital to the nation's defense effort. Therefore, the Western Railways present to the public the following facts:

The labor unions representing engineers, firemen, conductors, brakemen and switchmen are demanding a 30 per cent increase in wages, amounting to 190 million dollars a yearalthough their present rates of pay are the highest in history.

Other unions representing a greater number of railway employees are demanding wage increases ranging as high as 95 per cent averaging 47 per cent—and amounting to 580 million dollars a year-although their present rates of pay also are the highest in history.

Thus the wage increases being demanded by the labor unions amount to 770 million dollars a year, an average increase in excess of 41 per cent.

In addition, certain of these labor unions have demanded advances in their pay not included in the above figures, and more rules for the creation of unnecessary jobs.

The situation, then, is this: The total cost of complying with all the demands made would be approximately 900 million dollars a year!

The average weekly earnings of railway employees are now 15 per cent higher than in the peak year 1929, while the cost of living is 12 per cent less.

The demands of the railway labor unions are being made when the entire nation has just been asked to make a supreme effort for National Defense.

The railways cannot meet these demands without a great increase in the cost of transportation. They exceed by more than 700 million dollars the income that the railways had left after paying their annual expenses, taxes and charges in 1940.

The railways have a vitally important job before them. They need all their resources to continue adequately to serve you and contribute effectively toward the National Defense Program.

Gradual melting of the ice eased the fuel containers safely to their underground base.



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
