

Personal Tax Suits Planned By City Dads

The City of Eastland will go to court to collect delinquent personal taxes.

City Commissioners Thursday night voted to take the step after a lengthy discussion. Under plans worked out the City will file claims in Justice of the Peace J. R. Boggus' small claims court. It is estimated that about half of the city's delinquent taxes are personal taxes, mostly small taxes assessed against automobiles.

Before filing suit the City will notify each citizen by mail that such a step will be taken. That plan was reached by commissioners in order to give delinquents a chance to settle out of court and save court costs.

In other action at the regular monthly meeting of the commission approval was granted. City Manager Jimmy Young to purchase a three-fourth ton air conditioner for the City Hall.

Purchase of a used street sweeper, costing \$1500, was also approved.

Ranger Women Escape Serious Wreck Injury

Two Ranger women escaped serious injury on Highway 80 in front of Wheat's Welding Shop in Ranger, about 5:30 p.m. Thursday when the 1950 Chevrolet in which they were riding apparently went out of control and crashed into a light pole, knocked over two mail boxes, uprooted a gas meter and turned over several times before coming to a stop 93 feet away from the point where the breaks were first applied.

Mrs. Donald Ray Wells was driving the car towards town when the accident occurred and Miss Nancy Graham was in the front seat with her, according to investigating officer Barney Wheat.

Mrs. Wells was only slightly injured, but Miss Graham was carried in a Killingsworth ambulance to West Texas Clinic where she remained unconscious for about three hours, according to Dr. P. M. Kuykendall. Dr. Kuykendall said she also had a cut place on the back of her head but it was not big enough to require stitches. The doctor said she suffered no shock of any kind and he expected to release her Friday afternoon.

Mrs. Leola Crabb, a nurse for West Texas Clinic, said she happened to be at her home at the time of the accident and saw the car hit the telephone pole, throwing Miss Graham through the air for 25 or 30 feet before she landed on her face on the pavement.

Finis Wheat said the impact was so terrific the vibration knocked his master electric switch loose, disconnecting his electricity. Sound of the crash was heard six blocks

Here Is Proof... Fire Does Burn

Three 17-year-old Eastland boys have paid a big price for a "bonfire" they set in Eastland City Park recently.

City commissioners Thursday night approved a plan worked out by City Manager Jimmy Young and County Attorney Joe Nuecesle whereby the youths will pay for damages to the City-owned band stand caused by a fire the trio admitted they set.

The three will share a bill of \$1143, making each boy have to pay \$381. By paying the cost of repairing the band stand, the youths will escape criminal prosecution.

The announcement at the commission meeting was the first official word that the fire was not accidental. It was common knowledge around town, however, that the stand had a little help in catching fire.

The stand will be rebuilt.

City Deeds Over Acreage to Posse

Eastland City Commissioners agreed Thursday night to deed over 25 acres of land fronting Eastland Lake to the Eastland County Sheriff's Posse and the Eastland County Livestock Growers Association.

The action came after months of offers and counter-offers between the City and the two organizations.

The organizations plan to construct a rodeo arena, loading docks and other similar structures, according to Bill Hoffman, who served as spokesman for the groups at the Thursday meeting.

The City reserved all mineral rights and a reversion was included in the agreement reached. Under the lease the land can be used only by the organizations. The land cannot be used "by any individual or individuals for his or their private gain or profit."

Necessity Church Wins Achievement Award in Area

The Necessity Baptist Church near Eastland has been named winner of the Town and Country Achievement Award sponsored by the Cisco Baptist Association, spokes said in Dallas.

The church is now competing with other associational winners in District 17 of the Baptist General Convention of Texas. Both district and associational winners will be recognized at the annual state convention in Fort Worth, Nov. 5-7, when the first place state award will be made.

The Rev. H. K. Neely, Jr., is pastor of the Necessity church, one of 335 Texas Baptist towns and country churches participating in the competition this year.

The award is designed to stimulate interest in small-church work, to recognize outstanding achievements by pastors and churches and to help Texas Baptists broaden their concept of Christian responsibility.

Achievement competition is divided into three categories with points given for projects which help build a better church, community and world.

The association is one of 122 geographical areas in which the BGCT promotes such work each year. The denomination includes one out of every six persons in the state, with 3,754 churches and 1,524,000 members in Texas.

Approximately two-thirds of the churches are classified as town country congregations.

Winning pastors in each district will receive a parchment scroll and the church a metal plaque which may be displayed in a prominent position outside the building.

Top state award last year went to Pastor Robert Wimpey and the Taylor's Valley Baptist Church in Bell County.

annual county livestock show will be held at the new location. The Posse also hopes to sponsor an annual rodeo, calf roping and horse shows in addition.

In the past, the livestock show has been held at the airport. Conflicting interests at the location made the organizations seek another location.

No fences will be built to keep the public from using the lakefront, and the organizations will be a public road to the water front so that fishermen and picnickers will not be refused the use of the land.

Under the reversion clause the land will revert back to the City if a rodeo is not held every two years, in the case of the Posse, or if a livestock show isn't held at least every other year, in the case of the Livestock Association.

Speed Limits On Highway Thru City Unchanged

What's the speed limit on Highway 80 and Highway 6 in Eastland? That's a good question, but one which is rather hard to answer.

In July Eastland Commissioners adopted a new set of limits on the two highways, accepting recommendations of the State Highway Dept., except in a few instances. The Highway Dept., however, refused to go along, telling the City to accept all of their recommendations or none.

Commissioners Cyrus Frost, at the August meeting of the commission, made a motion that the

The play came on fourth down and ended a 54 yard drive. A 15 yard gainer by Larry Hollis was the longest run in the drive. Watson found his mark this time to give the Mavs' their first successful extra point conversion

Oscar Cook

Came to the county in 1872, and in the organization he held the election at Jewell. He writes: "I had to take the ballot to Bill McCough's (12 miles) and then Bill carries it to Palo Pinto to be counted. I was on the first Grand Jury of the first Court—which was held at Schmick School House. Then we held Court on the Colony Fork at Barny Bartholomew's and next at Eastland. It took nearly all of us boys to hold Court."

"I had to go to Comanche (30 miles) for blacksmithing and for bread. Thomas Mansker, Mr. Justice, Simp Evans, Will Thainish, Thomas March, Calvin Waddins, and my self were all who lived on the Sabanno then. Our nearest neighbors were six and 12 miles. The Indians took our horses from us twice before we felt skittish when out cutting poles to fence with, plowing, or going to mill. But after the county was organized it settled up rapidly."

John Thomas Townsend

Who was born in May, 1830, was married to Miss Mary Josephine Jenkins in Kentucky, in 1854. Mrs. Townsend's father, Charles Jenkins, who was delegate to the National Convention that nominated James K. Polk for President of the United States, died in Eastland four years ago at the age of 87.

County Hunting Paradise During Days Of Pioneers

Mr. Townsend, with his brother, Ira Townsend, and others, located five miles west of Eastland City in 1872. The nearest neighbor (W. C. McCough) was 10 miles away; supplies were hauled from Dallas, 150 miles; and the buffalo and antelope were still roaming the prairie lands. Fifty wolves in one bunch, turkeys so thick on the trees the limb would break, and encounters with the Mexican lion are some of the experiences of this pioneer.

The unbounded hospitality of the Townsend Ranch was typical of the frontiersmen, and was the chief means for the dissemination of local news and from the world's "back east."

No fences disturbed the freedom of the cattle in these days. Grass and water were plentiful, and cattle were cheap. Lands which are now worth from \$25 to \$30 an acre could have been purchased then, at most, for 50 or 75 cents an acre.

Dr. E. D. Townsend, a prominent physician of Llano, Texas, and Mrs. B. F. Kelley of Eastland, are Mrs. Townsend's living children. One son, Dr. W. H. Townsend, (Continued on Page Two)

Mav Ground Attack Downs Dublin Lions

Eastland Wins 25-7 In Hardfought Game

A steam-rolling Eastland ground game relentlessly beat a game Dublin eleven into submission here Friday night, with the Mavs coming out on top with a 25-7 victory.

The powerful Maverick attack ground out 419 yards that counted and an additional 152 that was called back because of clipping penalties. But while the Mavs had a lot to be pleased with on offense, they had worries all night with their defense. Dublin couldn't move on the ground, but the Lions threw eight successful passes against the winners.

The game was never in doubt. The Mavericks took the initial kickoff and marched 67 yards to yardline in just 10 plays. Big Saul

Humphrey came into his own in the game. Not only did the little Mav quarterback mix his plays well, but he did some nice running himself on rollout plays.

The Mav line limited Dublin to just 56 yards rushing, giving up inches instead of yards on most Lion tries. The visitors went to the air to avoid meeting that line finally, and met with good success on short aeriels. The long touch-down pass didn't work for Dublin, however.


A bright spot Friday night was the performance of Mav end Stanley Reed. Reed was plenty rough on defense as he made a great showing trying to re-earn his starting line-off position.

Charles Martin, Larry Alldredge, Kenneth Watson, Knick Arther, Wayne Dodson, Marvin Agnew and a number of other lads were the boys responsible for the Lions' short ground yardage.

Around the district, Albany looked like the team to beat as they smashed DeLeon, 34-7. DeLeon will host Eastland this coming week and a comparison between Eastland and Albany should be easy to make then.

Wylie, the other 10-A power, smashed the Rising Star Wildcats, 39-12, as Quarterback Joe Rex Schulle had a field day.

Some people are pretty good at guessing ages of both people and horses. Other people can't guess within a half dozen years of an animal's age. Others can't guess within 10 years or so of a man's age.

Onous Dick, the Horace Greely of Eastland County and Publisher of the Eastland Telegram, couldn't guess within 10 years of the all-American girl's age. If a beauty contest winner were to prance across the stage right in front of Dick in high heels and a bathing suit he couldn't guess within 10 years of her correct age.

Some people have a tendency to attract nicknames while other people don't seem to ever gather a nickname as they go through life. In Eastland, though, in the past there seems to be a tendency for young men of Our Town to attract nicknames to themselves. But one of the most unusual nicknames situations I can think of off hand is the two nicknames Raymond Querby attracted to himself in his boyhood. He was then known by both "Runt" and "Chilli."

Another thing that was unusual about Raymond was that he began to shave at a little earlier age than most of the boys of Our Town. He must have started shaving by the time he was old enough for the Boy Scouts, although he didn't have to shave every day at that early age.

Raymond was also one of the town's best baseball players, being both an outfielder and a corking good pitcher. He played with a gang of boys who later comprised most of the high school team that won the district and finally wound up as third in the state.

Along about the same time there was a group of boys playing baseball over in Olden who thought themselves to be pretty good. They were too. Their manager was none other than the future publisher of this paper, Onous Dick.

The Eastland boys and the Olden lads played each other almost every Saturday. Usually they hitchhiked to their games and the last team to play at home would be the one that was the visiting team the next week.

One morning the Eastland boys reported to Olden for a game at the Magnolia Oil Company's park with the Dick-managed club. On this particular Saturday Chilli Overby was scheduled to pitch his first game against the Olden boys.

Dick, not knowing Raymond, gave the Eastland pitcher a one-over. Noticing that Overby had apparently shaved in the past month, Dick challenged him on his age. No amount of arguing and explaining by the Eastland boys would satisfy Onous. He insisted that if Raymond shaved he must be a grown midget.

Seeing Dick looking at Raymond's teeth was one of the funniest sights ever witnessed in Magnolia Park.

Then, not content with his mouth inspection, Dick felt of Raymond's muscles like a fight manager inspecting his fighter.

Finally, Dick announced to his Olden buddies that they wouldn't play if Overby played. He was convinced that Raymond was indeed too old and too mature to play with such young fellows as Onous Dick and his Magnolia Buds.

In order not to break up a good game, the Eastland lads consented to use another pitcher.

But the next Saturday morning Raymond showed up with a copy of his birth certificate and a statement from his teacher as to his birthday.

The Olden boys accepted him as one of their own and Raymond went on to give them a good lesson in how to pitch a game of baseball.

Needless to say, Onous Dick never did try to make a living judging ages. He went into the newspaper business.

New Producer, Offset Try Top County Oil News

Eastland County got another good producer this week and another try was spotted.

Magnolia Petroleum Co. completed No. 4 R. H. Dunning as a producer 5 1/2 miles southwest of Cisco in the Jo Kiel Caddo Field in Section 92, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

Daily potential was 88 barrels of 41.5 gravity oil, flowing through a 14-65-inch choke with 300 pounds of casing and 180 on tubing. Flow was from 24 perforations at 2838-42 feet. Pay was treated with 500 gallons of acid and casing was set at 2906 feet with hole plugged back from 2906 to 2865 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1970-1.

Staked five miles northeast of Pioneer was the No. 2 S. T. White. Location is 990 feet from the south and east lines of the southeast fourth of Section 23, ETRR Survey, 933 feet southwest of the No. 1 White, a recently completed Caddo discovery. Proposed depth is 3200 feet with rotary.

Phone Strike Is Not Likely To Affect Service

Eastland will not be affected on a local level if the nationwide strike of Western Electric employees, which is scheduled for Monday morning, comes off, Mrs. J. L. Anderson, chief operator, told the Telegram Friday.

Mrs. Anderson explained that only Western Electric employees who make and install telephone equipment, will be on strike. There are no Western Electric employees in Eastland so it is doubtful that picket lines would appear here.

A strike could possibly curtail some long distance service, however. If Western Electric Co. employees picket large plants, such as Abilene where 20 of their employees are stationed, it is likely that telephone operators, who are also members of the Communication Workers of America, will not cross their lines.

Carbon Is 6-0 Loser to Iredell In First Game

Carbon dropped a heartbreaker to Iredell Thursday night in the opening game of the year for the Wolverines. Final score in the game was 6-0.

A long pass won the game for the visitors in the final quarter. Carbon had a touchdown called back earlier in the game.

The Wolverines were without the aid of their starting quarterback, Larry Greer, who was sidelined because of flu. Sonny White, John Grace and Robert Norris were standouts for the Carbon team.

Next week the Carbon six man team is scheduled to play Gorman.

First Masonic Lodge In County Held At Alameda Prior to 1876

The first Masonic Lodge ever held in Eastland County was under a dispensation from the Grand Lodge of Texas and was held at Alameda, according to J. F. Donley, long-time member of the Masonic lodge.

According to Donley, who has done considerable work in tracing the history of the Masonic Lodge in Eastland County, said the first Lodge was known as Alameda Lodge, with the following officers: J. S. Bedford, Worshipful Master; J. M. Yandell, Senior Warden; N. L. Bartholomew, Junior Warden, and J. E. Garod, Secretary.

Other members of the Lodge were James N. Crisman, G. W. Colley, J. P. Davidson and James P. Smith. The dispensation was granted by Grand Master Thomas R. Bonner. The first candidate to be initiated, passed and raised by this Lodge was J. H. Calhoun, according to Donley's records.

The Lodge at Alameda operated under dispensation until December 15, 1876, after which Eastland Lodge No. 467 was chartered on December 16, 1876, with the same principal officers. The Alameda Lodge held its meetings in the upper story of Schmick's School House which stood about 100 yards east of the bridge across Mansker's Lake on the Desdemona Road. It was furnished with split log benches and tables covered with rough boards were used for the stations and for the secretary's desk.


