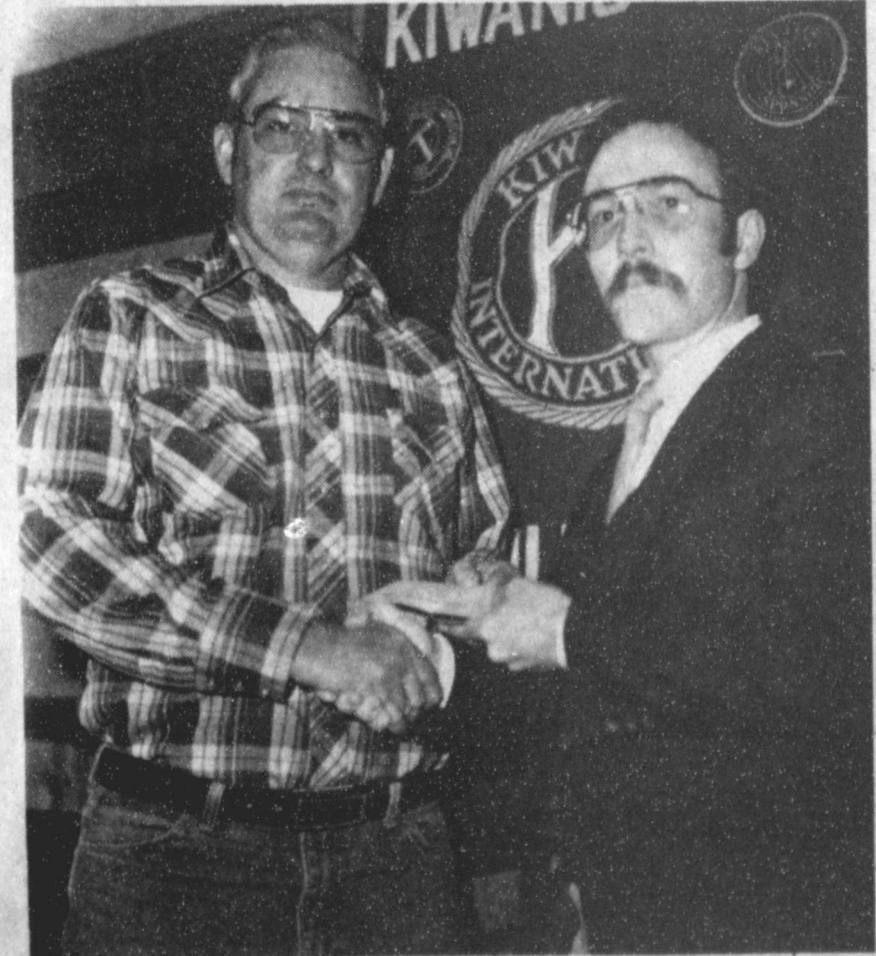

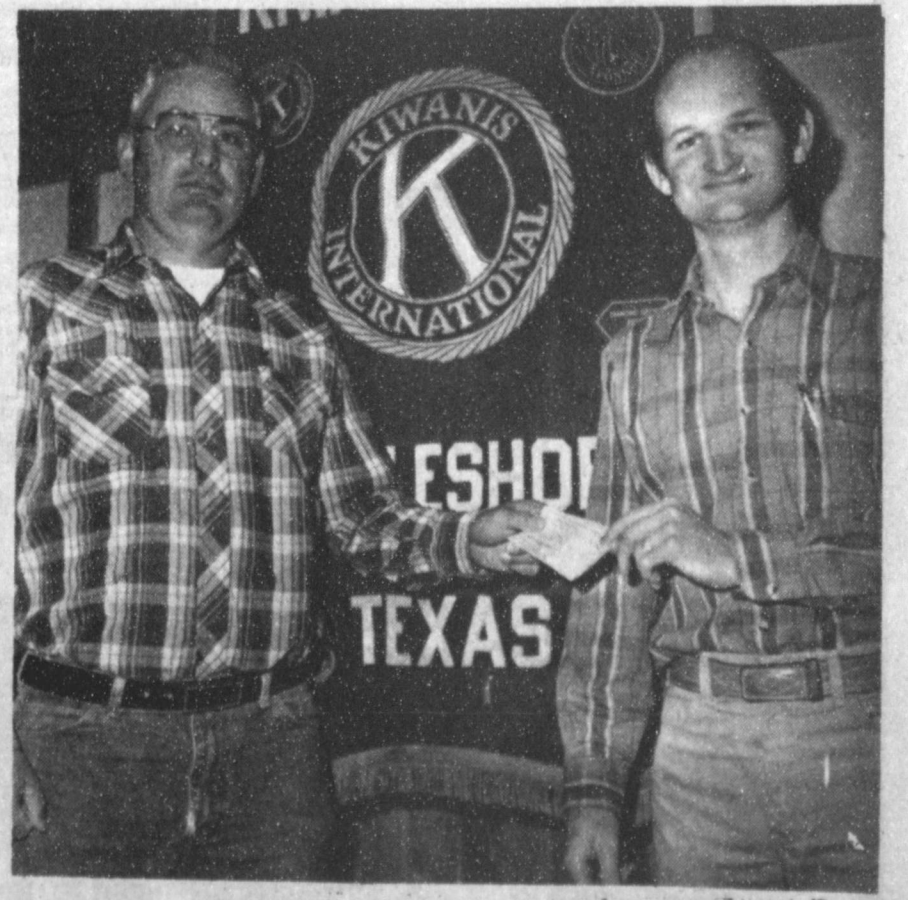

Control Winter Moisture In Your House

Water, frost or ice on the inside of windows is a chore to clean up and can produce conditions for the growth of mildew in your home, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service housing specialist.

Homeowners may not realize that it takes only four to six pints of water to raise the relative humidity of a 1000 square foot house from 15 to 60 percent, says Dr. Peggy Owens.

For example, a person breathing produces 1/8 pint of moisture per hour and mopping a 150 square foot floor will release 4 1/2 pints of moisture into the air, she explains.

In addition to normally generated moisture, certain heating methods can contribute to moisture in the home, Owens says. In very tightly sealed homes with good insulation and storm windows, the use of an unvented kerosene space heater can double the amount of moisture vapor generated in the house each day.

"The presence of continuous condensation on windows is a good sign of excess moisture," Owens says. "If frost or ice forms on a glass or metal frame and sash and if paint peels and wood rots, there is certainly excess moisture."

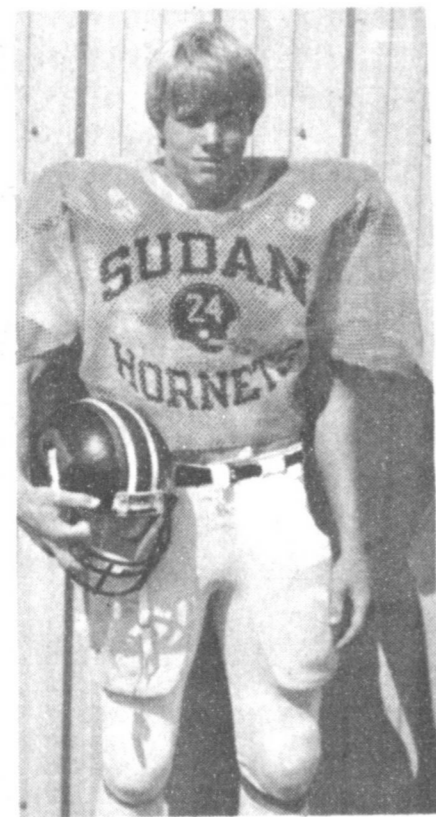
If a single pane of glass gets so cold that moisture condenses and runs down it in the winter, then double glass and/or heating vent located beneath the window can eliminate the problem, says the specialist.

But sometimes condensation will occur on windows even when the relative humidity in the house is low. In this case, condensation on windows results more from the cold window surface than from excessively high moisture in the room. Adding storm windows or

polyurethane film to the windows, or placing heated air vents can solve the problem, advises the specialist.

If moisture condenses between the permanent window and storm window, or polyurethane film and the window, the warm, moist air from inside the house is leaking to the airspace between the two. To correct this problem, says Owens, seal the leaking spaces or ventilate the two windows. Ventilate the windows by drilling two three-eighths inch holes at the top and bottom of the storm windows or loosening them slightly.

When mildew or dampness is present on the ceiling or on the outside walls near the ceiling, there is a possibility that the insulation is not properly installed. In this case Owens advises repositioning the insulation in order to prevent cold wind from chilling the area where vapor will condense in your house.

Minerals Needed In Diet

In addition to the multitude of vitamin supplements on the market, health-conscious consumers are also being urged to take minerals. But do we need to be concerned about our intake of minerals?

"Minerals are essential for good health and growth," says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist Dr. Alice Hunt. "It's also important that people get their minerals in just the right amounts," she adds.

Some minerals, such as calcium, phosphorus, sodium, chloride, potassium, magnesium and sulfur, are needed in relatively large amounts. In this case, a "large" amount ranges from milligrams to one gram.

Other minerals, called "trace minerals" are needed in small

amounts, Hunt says. Iron, manganese, copper, iodine, zinc, cobalt, flourine and selenium are included in trace minerals.

Minerals like lead, mercury and cadmium are actually harmful and can cause poisoning, cautions the nutritionist.

Other minerals can cause ill effects if you take as little as twice as much of the amount required for good health. Taking too much of one essential mineral may upset the balance and function of other minerals in the body, she observes.

"Excess mineral intake can reduce your ability to perform physical tasks and can contribute to health problems such as anemia, bone demineralization and breakage, neurological disease and fetal abnormalities," Hunt warns. The risks are greatest for very young, pregnant or lactating women, the elderly and those with inadequate diet or chronic disease, she explains.

Since minerals, like vitamins, are widely distributed in foods, healthy people can get what they need by eating a varied

diet that includes foods from all of the basic food groups, the nutritionist says.

Since minerals can be stored in the body and become toxic if too much accumulates, taking mineral supplements can be

risky, Hunt remarks. "If you choose to take mineral supplements, take them under the supervision of a physician, and don't use them in amounts in excess of what the body needs," she advises.

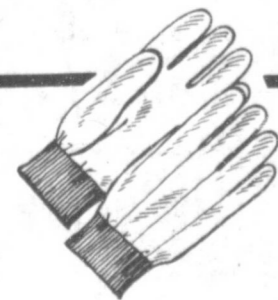

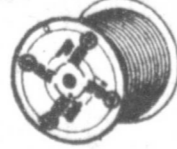


AVOID EXCESS MINERALS--

"The Lynchburg Mule Trades Association has asked Rep. Jim Cooper, a Democrat, to present a resolution to Congress declaring Oct. 26 as "Mule Appreciation Day U.S.A." because of the animal's contribution to U.S. history.

"On the same day 200 years ago, the first male donkeys arrived on American soil, a gift to George Washington from Spanish King Charles III. The first American Mules were a product of the Spanish donkeys and American mares.

"I don't think this country would be where it is today without the mule," said the association's Roger Brashears. "Before tractors if you didn't have a good mule you'd starve to death. They've been the backbone of the country."

"When most folks think of mules," all they think of is a cantankerous animal with big ears," he said, but he added that the animals has many finer qualities that aren't widely known.

"They're a lot smarter than a human," he said, "For one thing, you can't overfeed a mule. When he's had enough, he'll stop. You can't take a mule into a barn with a shaky floor either. If the floor won't hold him he won't walk on it."

Above is the story that appeared in the paper, and local folks started getting up in arms. Everyone in this part of the country knows that Mule Day on the second Saturday in August and is held in Muleshoe as a benefit for Girlstown, U.S.A.

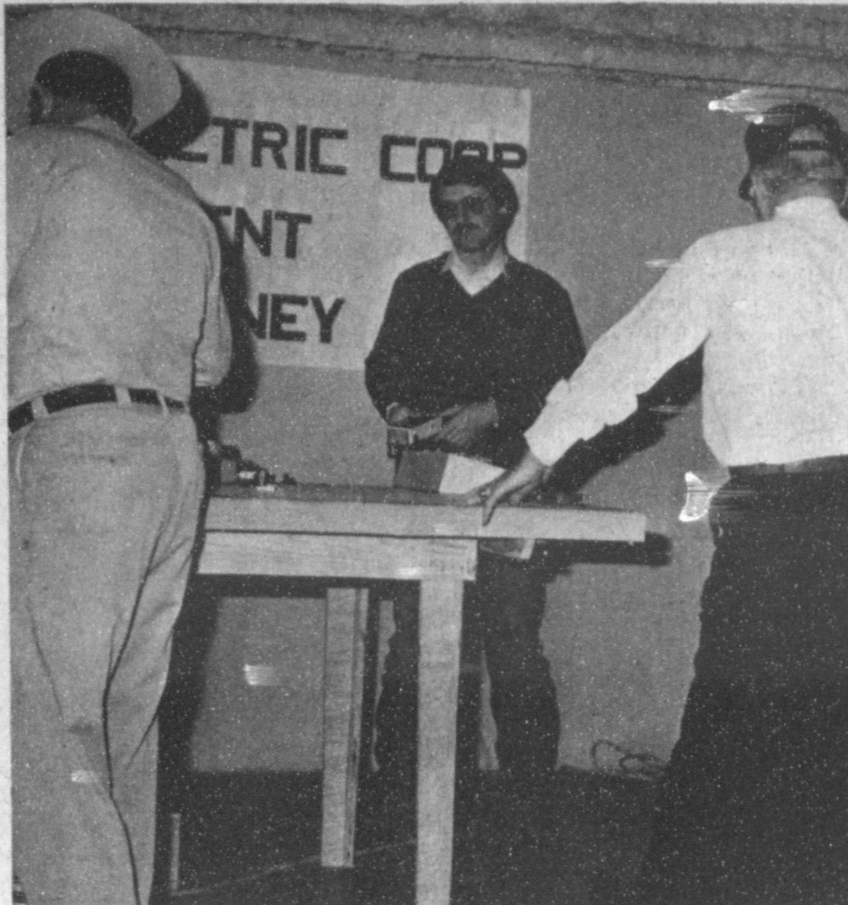
Also, Muleshoe has the only memorial to the mule, and is the only city in the United States to be named for the mule.

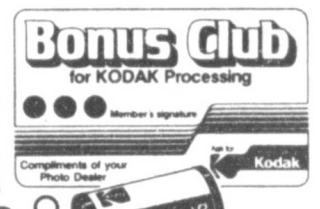

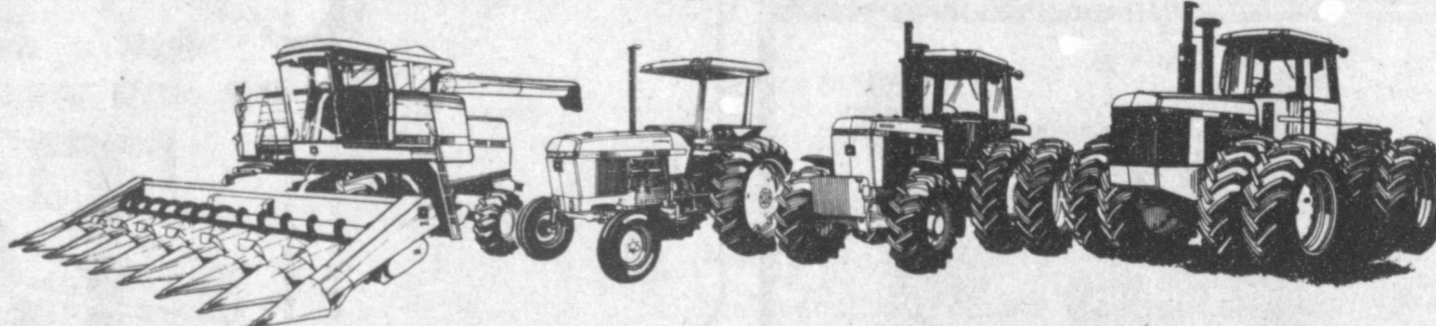
