REDS BREACH NAZI LINES IN CENTRAL AREA

KUIBYSHEV, Russia, April 22. -Russian guards, supported by tanks and heavy artillery, have breached the German lines on the Central Front, and have captured 40 occupied places, the newspaper Pravda reported officially today. The break into the German line was made by a division of guards after several days of fighting, the report said, in reporting that the advance was continuing. The guards were reported to be under the command of General Siyzov. The Russian technique for fight ing tanks, the Moscow newspaper attempt to maneuver them in such cessful and effective that the Nazis now are covering tank advances with artillery barrages and attempt to meneuver them in such a way as to try to escape the Russian technique, without success.

"They are now on duty in Ice-land, Newfoundland, Puerto Rico, Trinidad, Aruba, Curacao, Ber-muda, Canal Zone, Ireland, Hawaii, Alaska, and several other spots which, for the time being, must remain geographically in-cognito," the article says.

The writer-Miss Lora Kelly, a veteran Red Cross worker who was decorated twice during World War' I-described these "task units" as follows: "a field supervisor, a field director, an assist-ant field director, and a recreation director to serve the ablebodied troops."

"Women are assigned to the station hospital, the minimum personnel being an assistant field di-, rictor who is a medical-social worker and a recreation worker who supervises medically approved entertainment. Secretaries complete the unit which is expanded, ed according to needs





THERE is no general agreement with the new name, War Bonds, which has been given to the government's promises to repay billions of dollars borrowed to finance the defense of Democracy. Some preferred the World War I title, Liberty Bonds. Others argued for reviving Victory Bond as a cognomen,

But the bitterest enders are glad that at last we have discarded the misnomer, Defense Bonds, a termitic fifth columnist which was doing more damage than a dozen Fritz Kuhns.

Technically, perhaps, and very fundamentally, we really are fighting a defensive war. That is, we aren't an aggressor nation. We aren't trying to seize by force another people's territory or trade. We aren't attempting to force our ideology, our form of government, our system of economics upon the rest of the world. We are merely refusing to permit Germany, Italy, and Japan to Nazify the world, including us, by force.

WE are defending democracy, but we know now that we can not preserve human rights by defensive methods. Having been forced to fight for what we treasure, we intend to take the offensive and to pursue it to the complete destruction of axis aggression.






