## Huckabay Asks Eastlanders To Visit Schools

L. E. Huckabay has been named as chairman of the Eastland Public Schools Week committee and Ray Laney and Aubrey Van-Hoy will be committee members, it was announced today.

Mr. Huckabay said that Public Schools Week in Texas will be held March 7-12. "Our objective is to acquaint all our people with program and accomplishments of our public educational system," he said.

"Texas Public Schools — Democracy in Action" will be the slogan this year.

Mr. Huckabay said that plans were being made to arrange for every adult who would care to visit the Eastland schools to do so during the week. Posters and car stickers have already been distributed here, and a proclamation by the Governor has been printed in the Telegram.

"Our forefathers, in their wisdom, recognizing the importance of education in the function and operation of a democracy, established the public school to make education available to all," Mr. Huckabay said. "The people of Texas declared, by the expressed terms of the State Constitution, 'a general diffusion of knowledge be essential to the preservation of the liberties and rights of the people, it shall be the duty of the Legislature of the State to establish and make suitable provision for the support and maintenance of an efficient system of public free schools.' The 1854 School Law provided for the first Public School System in Texas. As the years passed our laws were strengthened to make sure that all children of a school age shared in this opportunity for public education. Today the importance of education is not a debatable subject. Our job is to see that children of this generation get the best possible education we can give them. By visiting the schools and familiarizing ourselves with the problems of teachers and students, we become more competent to safeguard and advance the institution that is so American — the public school."

## Businesses Cautioned By Tax Expert

R. M. Smith of the Eastland Internal Revenue Office said today that the Internal Revenue Service has cautioned area businesses about a new penalty provision of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954.

The 1954 Code provides a penalty on business taxpayers who fail to comply with the depositary receipt system unless reasonable cause can be established. This penalty is one percent of the amount of the underpayment of the deposit for each month or part of a month during which the underpayment continues.

However, the penalty does not exceed six percent in the aggregate. The penalty also will not be imposed for any period after the date prescribed for filing the return (without regard to any extension of time) or the date the tax is paid, whichever is earlier.

Under the new instructions taxpayers subject to filing returns on Forms 941 or 720 or both whose reportable taxes in either category total more than \$100 for any month except the third month of a quarter are required to make deposits. These deposits must be made on or before the fifteenth day of the succeeding month for taxes reported on Form 941. Deposits must be made on or before the last day of the succeeding month for taxes reported on Form 720. In every case the taxpayers must secure validated depositary receipts for submission with the quarterly return.

Depositary receipts can be obtained from any Federal Reserve Bank or from a local bank authorized as a government depositary.

Davenport, vice chairman of the Board of Directors of the Eastland County Chapter, thinks it is a question that you would be interested in having answered.

Judge Davenport gave this resume of how the money Eastland Counties donated was spent:

- One among every 10 servicemen was given Red Cross help at camp or hospital each month.
- One among every 44 families in the United States received some kind of Red Cross training or assistance.
- One among every 78 persons in the United States received instruction in Red Cross training courses.
- One person in every 59 United States families received instruction in Red Cross first aid.
- One person in every 192 United States families received instruction in Red Cross home nursing.
- One among every three civilian hospitals received Red Cross volunteer service for their patients.
- One among every three blood donations to Red Cross was provided for national defense.
- One among every 2,600 persons in the United States was given Red Cross emergency mass care following disaster.
- One among every 5,600 United States families was given Red Cross rehabilitation aid following injuries or losses through disaster.

in Texas

HABEAS CORPUS  
Produce the body!  
That in effect is what a writ of "habeas corpus" demands of a sheriff or jailor. That means: Bring the prisoner to court on a valid charge or turn him loose. Habeas corpus has long been a standby of the "who - done - it" writer, but it has been a standby for us and our liberties for a much longer time.

In old times, the king or tyrant could jail you on a whim, with no chance of a day in court. No one in 1216 the English barons had taken all they could from King John. They demanded his written guarantee of their rights—the Magna Carta. Among their rights, they wanted the right to a day in court.

The English Petition of Rights asked for habeas corpus in 1628. It said, "no man should be put in jail or held without cause shown to which he may answer according to law."

The Habeas Corpus Act became law 51 years later.

Our national Constitution says that "the privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, unless when in cases of rebellion or invasion the public safety may require it."

Let's see how habeas corpus works.

Suppose a policeman arrests and puts you in jail. You have the right to be brought to court for a hearing. In court the judge should tell you of the charges against you and your rights to counsel and a fair trial.

hearing — in a reasonable time? Then somebody is unlawfully taking away your freedom. Consequently, your lawyer may go into court and get a writ of habeas corpus on your behalf.

The writ commands your jailor to "produce the body." Your jailor must show that he holds you lawfully or turn you loose. In court, the judge looks into the charges against you. He may hear witnesses. If he cannot find that you are held lawfully, he will order you turned loose. If he finds cause, you can ask for reasonable bail.

**New Boon for Home Dyers**



You need no longer tolerate faded plastic shower curtains. The same all-fabric dyes used for clothing will freshen the color of plastic curtains, including those that have printed designs. The Tintex Home Economics Bureau reports.

Many articles made of plastic—slipcovers, drapes, raincoats, eyeglass frames, synthetic pearls—can be given new color with all-fabric dyes. These require no boiling.

Dyeing will restore the basic color of printed plastic curtains, at the same time retaining much of the original print colors.

The washing machine is recommended for dyeing plastic curtains and other bulky articles. Use the hottest water available in the washer. Pour the dye, after dissolving it in a quart of very hot water, into the machine as soon as it is filled with water.

**San Angelo Gains Basketball Crown**

For the second straight year, San Angelo's Rams rule as basketball champions of the Pioneer Junior College Athletic Conference. They clinched a clear title Saturday night by thumping Arlington State, 82-58, at San Angelo to end their conference schedule with a 7-1 won-lost record and a full game lead over second-place Schreiner Institute.

The decision at San Angelo never was in doubt after the second half got under way. But the first half was close, with the score tied at 31-all less than two minutes before the recess.

Third place in Conference standings is up for grabs Tuesday night when traditional rivals Tarleton State and Arlington State meet at Arlington. Both have identical 2-5 won-lost records, and the tilt will be the last for both teams. The loser will share the cellar with Ranger. The Tarleton crew topped ASC's Rebels at Stephenville, 75-69, earlier in the season.

### Farm Leader Asserts Farmers Not To Blame For High Cost of Foods

"Farmers are not to blame for the continued high food costs," A. Z. Myrick of Cisco, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, has asserted at a recent meeting of the local organization. Myrick pointed out that food costs have remained at a comparatively high level while farm prices have declined steadily over the past few years, and the housewife has not benefited from the drop in farm prices, he said.

"The farmer's share of the consumer's food dollar is down to 43 cents, a drop of 10 cents from the 1948 high of 53 cents," Myrick said.

The County farm leader said that Nov., 1954 figures, from data

supplied by the Bureau of Agriculture Economics, showed that \$967 is spent yearly for food by the average American family. This is based on average quantities of farm food products purchased for home consumption by urban wage-earners and clerical worker families.

"Of this amount, the farmer received \$411 and the marketing margin amounted to \$556. Consumer prices did not follow the decline in farm prices for several reasons," he said. "One of these is the 'built-in' service' demanded by the modern housewife. It costs more to process and distribute ready-cooked meals and frozen foods, but of course this is progress, and in the long run, will benefit the housewife and everyone in the food industry."

Another reason for the continued high cost of food, despite lower farm prices, is the fact that labor costs have increased over the same period that the farmer was receiving less for his produce.

President Myrick praised the efficiency in the nation's food distribution system, pointing out that his has been an important factor in preventing the spread between farm prices and consumer prices from becoming wider than it already is.

"However, this efficiency trend has not kept pace in some food manufacturing and processing plants" he said, "although modern methods of merchandising and distribution have enabled retail grocers to sell food cheaper to the American housewives," he said in conclusion.

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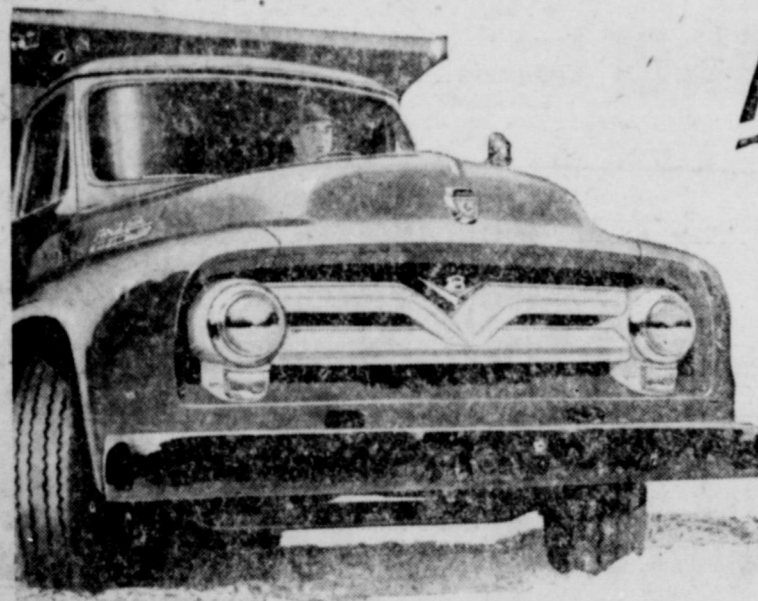
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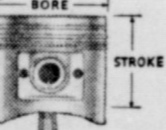

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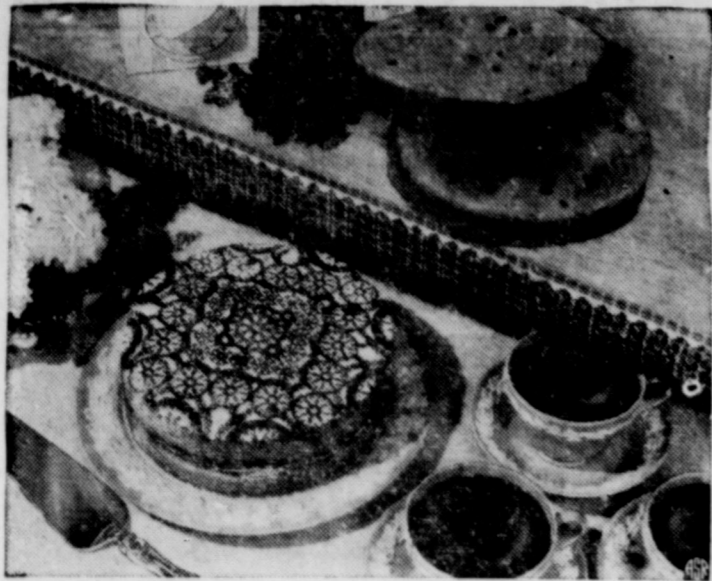

In concluding this series, Tuley again calls attention to a provision in the amended law which affect survivors of workers who died before September 1, 1950, without having acquired enough covered employment to become insured under the old law. "If you are the surviving aged widow, child, widowed mother with minor children or aged parent of a worker who died between 1939 and September 1, 1950, and you were not eligible for survivor's benefits before," Tuley said, "the new law may make it possible for you to get payments. If the deceased breadwinner in your family had at least 1 1/2 years of covered work between January 1937 and September 1950, you should come to or write the Abilene, Texas, Social Security Office, 308 Post Office Building, and inquire about your survivor's insurance benefit rights."

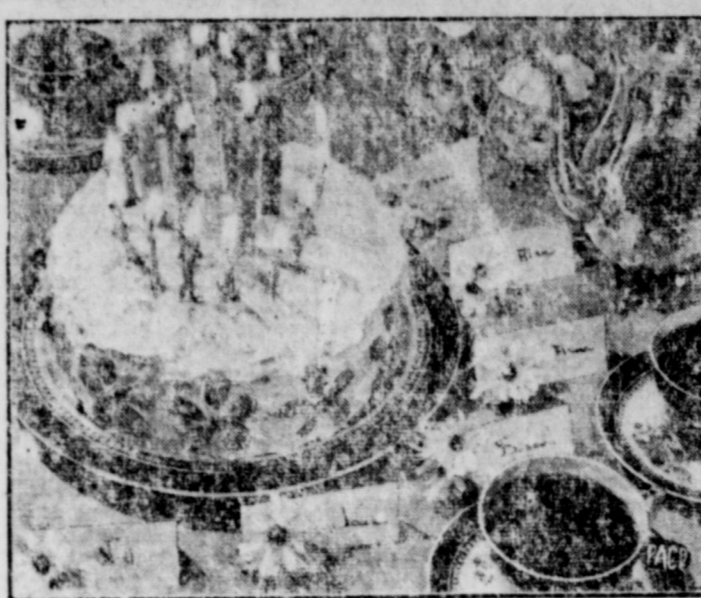
"It is especially significant," Tuley said, "that these 1954 amendments to the social security law preserve the contributory and self-sustaining principles of the old-age and survivors insurance system, as well as the principle that benefits are related to the level of the worker's earnings."

"All benefit payments and costs of administering the program are paid out of the special Trust Fund into which go the social security taxes paid by employees, employers, and the self-employed."

"The tax rate is now scheduled to reach a maximum of 4 percent each for employee and employer in 1975. It remains at the present 2 percent each until 1960, with intermediate steps between 1960 and 1975. Self-employed persons pay at 1 1/2 times the employee rate."

**In the Pink at the Birthday Party!**



HERE'S the pretty cake, all pale-pink, daisy-decked icing on the outside; all deep-dark chocolate chiffon richness on the inside. Here are the candles in varying shades of pink, graded in size and gathered into a mound of flickering light. The guest of honor cannot fail to blow them out with one big "whoosh." And here's the traditional coffee to wait its usual, fragrant, "Welcome to the party, everyone!"

Now, we don't say that this is the best cake in the world to make. It isn't! But you'll find it well worth the effort to produce. It's as pretty as a picture and light as a cloud—a chocolate cloud that's faintly permeated with the subtle flavor of almonds. And the texture, for all its lightness, pays a velvety tribute to the heap of good things that go into the cake's making.

When you serve a cake such as this, be sure that you have plenty of coffee in the pot for seconds—as maybe even thirds. It's going to take many an appreciative cup of the steaming brew to keep it company, right down to the very last, fingered-over crumb.

**Chocolate Chilled Birthday Cake**

- 2 eggs, separated
  - 1 1/2 cups sugar
  - 1/2 cup sifted cake flour
  - 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
  - 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
  - 1 cup buttermilk
  - 2 squares (2 oz.) unsweetened chocolate, melted
  - 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
- Heat oven to 350 F. (moderate).

Grease and flour two 8-inch layer cake pans at least 1 1/2 inches deep. Beat egg whites until frothy. Gradually beat in a half-cup of the sugar. Continue beating until very stiff and glossy. Sift remaining one cup of sugar, flour, baking soda and salt into another bowl. Add oil and half-cup buttermilk. Beat 1 minute at medium speed on mixer or 150 vigorous strokes by hand. Scrape sides and bottom of bowl constantly. Add remaining half-cup buttermilk, egg yolks, melted chocolate and flavoring. Beat one minute more, as above. Fold meringue thoroughly into batter, cutting down gently through batter, across bottom, up and over, turning bowl often. Pour into prepared pans. Bake 30 to 35 minutes. Cool on cake racks. Split each layer into two layers. Spread pink-tinted, almond-flavored 7-minute frosting between layers and on top and sides of cake. Garnish sides with "daisies" of salted almonds and semi-sweet chocolate pieces. Cluster candles in various shades of pink on top.

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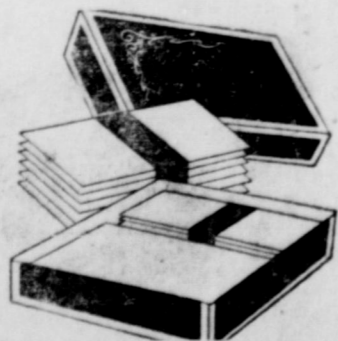
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**NATIONAL LEGION COMMANDER SETS TEXAS VISIT IN MARCH**
