EDITOR'S NOTE:

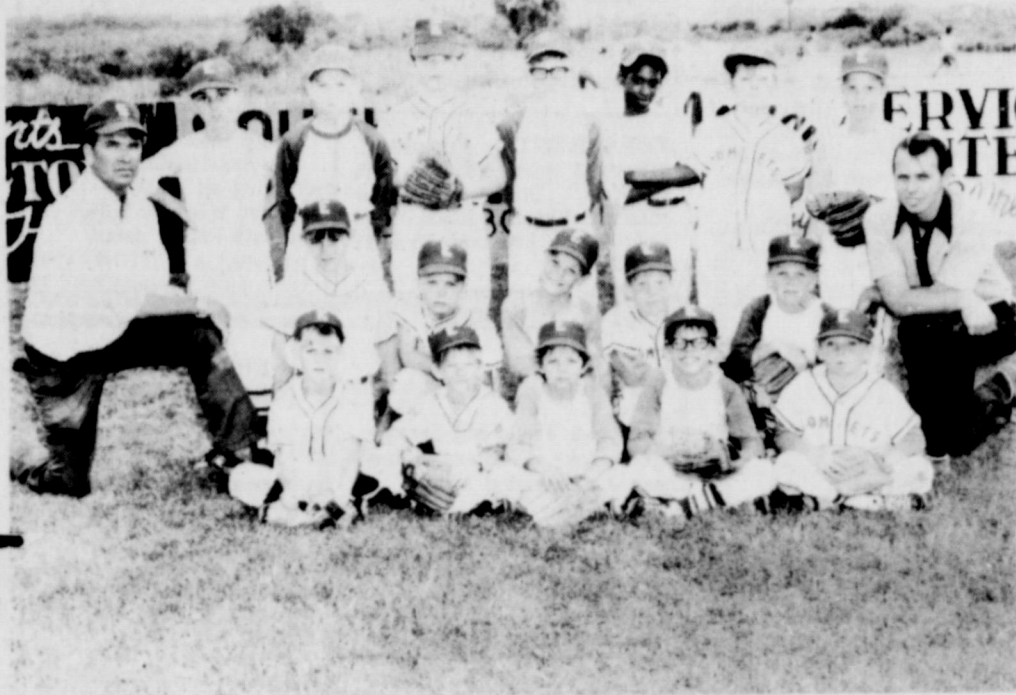

Lt. Hart To Go Into Pilot Training

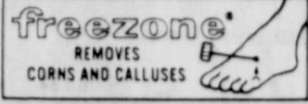

Retailers Need Stamp Okay

Food retailers in counties entering the Food Stamp Program will have to be authorized by the U.S. Department of Agriculture before they will be eligible to accept food stamp coupons.

This word came from Martin D. Garber, Dallas administrator of the West-Central regional office of USDA's Food and Nutrition Service.

Eastland County plans to go into the food stamp program this fall.

Under the Food Stamp Program, which is scheduled to be operating in all Texas counties by the end of the year, needy families are certified for the program by the State Department of Public Welfare.

Families then pay a certain amount of money, depending on income, resources and other factors, for food stamps, which they then use to purchase

eligible food at local stores authorized by USDA.

"Most grocers in a food stamp county apply for authorization," Garber stated, "since the program usually means a noticeable increase in business."

Food Retailers Need Authorization for Food Stamp Program.

USDA will conduct meetings in advance of the start of the program in each county to acquaint grocers with the food stamp operation, Garber added.

Although regulations are relatively simple, certain items cannot be bought with food stamps. These include all non-food items sold in the store, as well as most imported foods.

Grocers redeem the coupons through the local banks and the Federal Reserve System.

Reduction In Insurance Hoped For Car Owners

AUSTIN, TEX. - Annual public hearings to determine auto insurance rates were held here this week (July 10) amid predictions that premiums will drop again this year.

Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christie expressed hope that evidence will bring a reduction for insurance buyers in most of Texas' 40 statistical rating territories.

This year's hearing was conducted against a backdrop of new legislation and a price freeze which applies to insurance as well as the usual review of accident frequency, claim cost and inflationary factors.

Laws which must be considered are comparative negligence, repeal of the guest statute, personal injury protection and the new deviation or competitive rating plan.

Texas Safety Association will also ask additional credit for persons completing the defensive driving course.

Board rules now allow a 10 per cent reduction in auto insurance rates for those certified as having taken the course.

Meanwhile, House Insurance Committee Chairman Rep. Ben Bynum of Amarillo predicted the average premium will drop 10-15 per cent when new rates are set this fall.

Competitive rates may mean drops of as much as 20 to 30 per cent for drivers with good safety records, Bynum said.

"Nobody can definitely state what the final rates will be until the statistics and the impact of new insurance laws are weighed in detail after the hearing," said Christie.

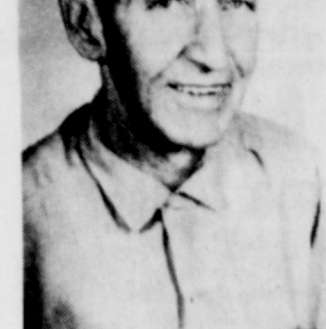

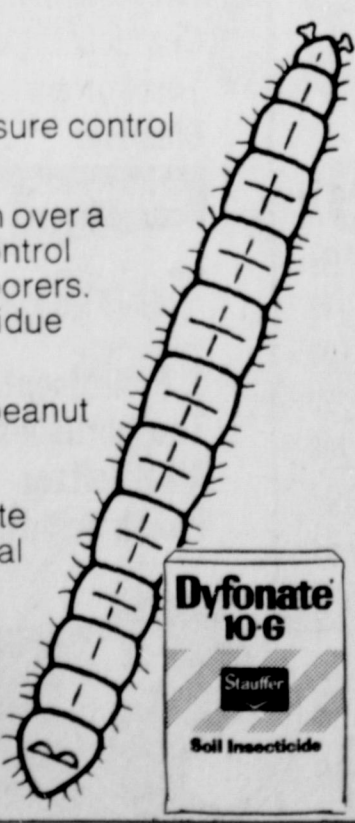
