U. S. - BRITISH - SOVIET SECOND FRONT PROGRAM FOR 1942 IS APPROVED

American Forces Now Massing in Great Britian Are Presumably to be Used in Opening Second Front Against the Axis, Expected This Year.

The United States, Great Britain and Soviet Russia today a greed upon a framework of a master plan for a 1942 second front in Europe to destroy the Axis and for post-war system of maintaining peace and security.

The agreement was disclosed by official annuoncements in Wash ing and in London, where a 20 year mutual aid treaty between Russia and Great Britain was signed. The British-Russian pact calls for mutual aid in event of a gression on the part of any o the countries with which nations are now at war.

The most spectacular point in the announcement was the three way agreement on the urgent task of opening the second front against the Axis in Europe, in 1942, presumably with American armed forces now being massed in Grea Britian. These forces were assumed to have entered into the agreement for a second front

Mr. Larner states that he has just been notified by the Adjutant General of the Army that he is classified as a key employee of the Texas Electric Service Co. He wil therefore not be called to active duty in the rank which he holds as Major of Coast Artillery. The Texas Electric Service company has contracts to furnish power for a great many war projects in the Fort Worth area and West






