
4-H Dress Revue Winners Announced

Country NYC Project On For Summer

Wash and slice cucumbers in to 1/4 inch thick sticks. Add lime to 1 gallon of water and mix well. Soak cucumbers in lime water for 24 hours. Rinse well. Soak cucumbers in clear water for 2 hours, changing water every 30 minutes. Drain; cover with pickle solution made of spices tied in bag, 6 cups sugar, vinegar and 1 quart of water. Simmer 30 minutes.

Let stand 2 days; drain off pickkle solution. Add to it remaining 4 cups of sugar and reheat. Pour again over pickels. Simmer 10 minutes. Let stand 2 days. Pack cucumbers into hot jars. Fill jars to 12 inch of top with boiling pickle solution; close. Process 5 minutes in boiling water bath. Start to count processing times as soon as iars are placed in water bath.
