#### **Tire Sellers Must** Inventory All Of Their Used Tires

DALLAS- Southwestern tire ellers today were called upon by Max L. McCullough, region OPA administrator to report their inventories of all servicable tiresnew, used, retreaded and recapped-as of June 30.

The inventory figures sought, which are to be filed with local war price rationing boards forms now being mailed by OPA to all dealers in the country, will provide a vast amount of new information not heretofore available to help in charting the course of

"The reports, which are required under the terms of a new amendment to the revised tire rationing regulations, must be filed by all persons who sell or hold new or used tires and tubes for sale: Tire dealers, automobile supply companies, motor vehicle dealers and automobile finance companies," Mr. McCullough explained. "They are to show each seller's stocks of passenger car and truck tires and tubes, tractor and farm equipment tires and 'all other' tires, of whatever kind, not mounted on a vehicle. Used tires on the form if they are useable in their present condition or as basic carcasses for recapping or can be made serviceable by re-

A place is provided on the form to set down separately the numper of tires and tubes of the more popular sizes, so that OPA may determine how much of the stock is fast-selling and how much is in sizes not used on vehicles of the more recent models.

Used tires and tubes are also to be reported separately, not only to give those in charge of rationing a basis on which to calculate roughly the aggregate mileage in second-hand tires still in trade channels, but also to show how many recappable carcasses there are and where they are located.

At this moment we are going through one of our periods of gloom, as the result of a series of setbacks by the axis powers. We are inclined to feel that Saturday, the 166th pirthday of the United States of America, is the most critial since the first.

That is not a bad national psychology. Surely it is much etter than overconfidence.

A man who possesses real intestinal fortitude fights best when the odds seem against him. So does such a nation. With all our many faults, the people of the United States lave no rabbit blood in them.

But, on this birthday, let's not be too pessimistic. Let's emember that, actually, our forefathers passed through nany Fourths of July when there was more cause for cloom than we can find today.

Forget, if you choose, the entire period of the Revolution tself, when our citizen-soldiers suffered one disastrous lefeat after another, underwent privations such as we tolay can not comprehend, but kept their faith until by sheer orce of will power they won.

Remember 1814, when the nation's 38th birthday saw ur fortunes at so low an ebb that 51 days later invading hitish actually burned the White House in Washington. Pass on to 1861, when Independence Day found the Jorth stunned by the disaster of the first Bull Run.

In 1864 the Fourth of July saw Sherman completing his narch to the sea-a military achievement for the North, ut one of the saddest moments in American history as we ook back upon that deadly war of brother against brother.

In 1917, Germany had begun unrestricted submarine varfare and had forced us into the first World War, from which Russia's might had been withdrawn by the first evolution. In 1918 the allies had stopped Germany's march o Paris, and were holding on by their teeth, wondering whether another and this time irresistible blow might be truck before we could rush enough strength to France turn the tide. The French, without whom we were licked. vere all ready to collapse

These were truly critical Fourths of July in war times. a comparison, the misfortunes the United Nations have uffered during the past few weeks are negligible.
