A, BEE, C's of insect bites . . The stings of the wasp and bee, common injuries during the sum mer, can cause serious illness and, in some instances, death, Problems can occur if a person is sensitive or allergic to the insect, says Hollis S. Ingraham, M.D., New York State health commis-

If you have more than local swelling after a bee, wasp, or horswelling after a bee, wasp, or nor-net sting, it may be a sign of al-lergy to insect bites. "If dizziness, headaches, abdominal cramps, nausea, or breathing difficulties occur, or if hives and swelling appear in an area other than the location of the sting," says Dr. Ingraham, "report it to your phy-

If you are stung, run cold, clean water over the bite or pack the area with ice to relieve pain and reduce swelling. Don't try to remove the stinger with your fing-ers — an innocent squeeze on the embedded stinger may release additional venom. Stingers should be lifted out with tweezers or the edge of a sterile knife.

Dr. Ingraham also recommends that people who know they are sensitive to insect stings consult their doctors for emergency firstaid medication to carry on

mer outings. You can help keep the bees away, too. Don't wear bright colors outdoors and eliminate sweet, sticky foods from picnic menus — they'll only attract buzzing intruders.

Pop right into your diet . . . with a handful of popcorn! That's right, the munchy crunchy stuff that lures you away from the movie and into the theater lobby needn't be the bane of your diet. In fact, it might help, if munch you must. (At least it might keep your mind off candy bars.)

According to Philip L. White, Sc.D., secretary of the American Medical Association's Council on Foods and Nutrition, one cup of plain, large kernel popped corn has only 25 calories. But stay away from the buttered variety. With butter, the same cup of corn yields 40 calories. And sugared corn is strickly taboo, with a whopping 135 calories. For a tasty change, sprinkle grated cheese on popped corn and broil for a minute — but add 25 calories for every tablespoon of

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

It's possible, some report, that another voting precinct could be established at Lake Leon, bringing the county total

Eastland County Commissioners voted Monday to realign the county's four precincts.

Commissioners voted 2- 2 on the matter with Eastland Couty Judge Scott Bailey casting the tie- breaking vote in favor of the change. Commissioners Dick Foster of Gorman Precinct 2 and L.D. Owens, Rising Star Precinct 3, voted against the proposal.

Danny Woods, Eastland Precint 1, and Clarence Dill, Cisco Precinct 4, voted in favor of the change. The motion was made by Woods and seconded

Bailey said primary elections will be held next summer and commissioners will be chosen according to the new precinct lines. The new commissioners will take office Jan. 1, 1975.

The subject of changing the precinct lines to conform with federal guidelines under the 'one- man one- vote rule" came to light in November 1972, when a group for Ranger citizens appeared before the court asking that the lines be redrawn so that voters in the Ranger precinct would be more equally represented

The group consisted of Mayor Lee Cantrell, attorney Dewey Cox, bank president Tom Dunn derson, all of Ranger.

In January 1973, the commissioners court appointed a select committee comprised of eight Eastland County citizens, two from each precinct, to look into all aspects of redrawing the four precinct line.

Chairman of the group is James Reid of Eastland.

Elected secretary is Gorman Postmaster Graydon Baze. Other members include CanPrecinct 2: Charles Rutherford, Rising Star banker and

Harry Sone, both of Precinct 3; Arlin Bint, and Mrs. Audie Wagley, both of Cisco Precinct

Before Monday's vote, county precincts were aligned as follows:

Precinct 1 with Woods of Olden as commissioner, encompassed Eastland, Olden. and Ranger with an ap-

trell, Guss Frossard, Gorman proximate voting strength

Precinct 2 was composed of Desdemona, Gorman and Carbon with Dick Foster of Gorman as commissioner, and a voring strength of 1,470.

Rising Star only, with Owens as strength of 2,400. commissioner, and a voting strength of 1.200.

Cisco only, with Dill as com- votes. missioner and a voting strength

Under the new precinct lines announced Monday, Precinct 1 will consist of Eastland, extending west about four miles, south about five miles, north to Morton Valley and east to Precinct 3 was composed of Olden, with an estimated voting

Precinct 2 will include Ranger, Olden, Lake Leon and Precinct 4 was composed of Desdemona, with about 2,100

Precinct 3 will combine

Gorman Carbon and Rising Star with an estimated 2,400

Precinct 4 will remain unchanged, consisting of Cisco and environs with an estimated 2,500 votes.

TWENTY-FOUR MONTH CERTIFICATES OF DEPOSIT

The rate on these 2- year certificates has been 5¾ percent. The new certificates will been 5¾ percent. The new certificates will bear interest at the rate of 6½ percent, but it is necessary to increase the term to 2½ years to comply with Federal Regulations. If you now own a 24- month Certificate, you should bring it in at its next maturity date if you wish to exchange it for a 2½ year, 6½ percent Certificate. If you do not wish to extend the term, the rate will automatically be increased at the next maturity to 6 be increased at the next maturity to 6 percent, the maximum for a two-year certificate.

PREMATURE CASHING OF CERTIFICATES OF DEPOSIT

The rules regarding premature cashing of a certificate of deposit have also been changed. They may now be cashed at any itme; however, if they are cashed prior to amaturity date, the interest received is lowered to the savings account rate, minus a penalty of three months interest.
