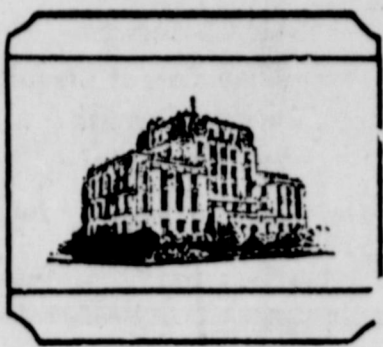

## School System Announces Appointment of 3 to Staff

The Eastland Independent School District Board of Trustees has announced the addition of three new faculty members for the 1973-74 school year.

Mrs. Lois Marshall has been named as a member of the Senior High School faculty to teach Junior and Senior English. She formerly taught in the Eastland Schools for twelve years before accepting a position as English teacher at Cisco Junior College where she has taught for the last two years. Mrs. Marshall received her B.A. Degree from Texas State College for Women at Denton and the Masters Degree from The University of Texas at Austin.

## Kindergarten Program Nears With New Building

The building for housing the new Kindergarten Program is nearing completion and will be ready for occupancy when school begins on August 20th. It is located on the elementary school site just east of the present structure.

All children who will be 5 years of age by September 1st of this year will be eligible to attend either the first or second semester.

Children who will be five years and 6 months old by September 1, 1973 will be admitted to the first semester of 90 days, and children who will be between five years and five years and 6 months old by September 1st, 1973 will attend the second semester of 90 days. The first session of 90 days is scheduled to end on January 9, 1974. The second group of Kindergarten children will begin on the 10th of January

and end their 90 days on May 21st.

Kindergarten children will attend school from 8:15 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. each day.

All children who will be eligible to attend Kindergarten and who plan to attend this year are urged to register at the Elementary School between 2 and 7 p.m. on Friday August 10th. Parents of Kindergarten and 1st Grade children are reminded that they must have the required Health Immunizations prior to school, and should present certification from their Doctors at the time of registration that they have been immunized for Polio, Measles, Rubella, Diphtheria, Tetanus and Pertussis as provided in this State Law.

Proof of Birth will also be required of all Kindergarten and 1st Grade Students who are Registered on August 10th.

## Instant Listing Service Launched by CofC Here

## New County Lines To Result in Mileage Shuffle

Re-drawing of the county commissioner precinct lines will naturally re-structure the total road mileage in each precinct to be maintained by the respective commissioners.

Biggest change will be evident in Precinct Two and Three. Shuffle will put the designation

Precinct One (Eastland and Olden) presently has about 162 miles and will have 133 miles under the proposed new plan. This precinct did comprise part of Lake Leon which will be moved to No. Two.

Precinct Two which did comprise Gorman, Carbon and Desdemona did register 204 miles. Two will become Ranger and Lake Leon with 204 miles.

Precinct Three will include the south part of the county and made up of Desdemona, Gorman, Carbon and Rising Star with a total of 279 miles. It formerly included Desdemona.

Precinct Four (Cisco) will gain a few miles south but remain virtually unchanged; mileage up from 149 to 181 miles.

It is presumed that under the new plan, the maintenance dollars will be prorated to the various precincts based on a formula taking into consideration the total number of road miles to be maintained in each.

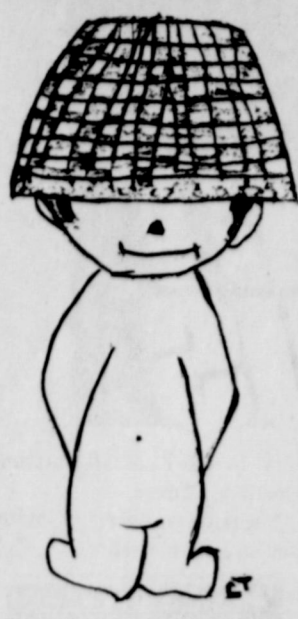


Locals' Kin In Palo Duro 'Texas'

Don Griffin, Chapter Advisor, will attend the three-day meeting of representatives of over 800 FFA Chapters from throughout the State which will include the awarding of advanced degrees, scholarships and awards to outstanding members of the organization. Higher Benefits For Veterans

Higher benefits are in the offing for 191,400 veterans who incurred service-connected disabilities during peacetime military service. Jack Coker, Regional Office Director, said August checks will reflect the increases brought about by legislation that equalized compensation rates for peacetime and wartime disabilities. Before the law was enacted, peacetime veterans were paid 80 percent of rates allowed wartime veterans. As of May, 2.2 million veterans, including the 191,400 peacetime veterans, were on VA compensation rolls, Coker said. Compensation is paid on a sliding scale ranging from \$28 monthly for disabilities rated 10 percent, to \$495 for total disability. Some veterans with certain severe disabilities receive additional payments which run as high as \$1,232 monthly, plus allowances for dependents. Pvt. Bert T. Herridge II, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Herridge of Eastland, was chosen advanced individual training soldier of the month for the 1st advanced individual training brigade in the army Field artillery school at Fort Sill, Okla., for the month of April. Pvt. Herridge is a graduate of Cisco Jr. College and a 1972 graduate of Texas A & M. He holds a degree in physical education. He is married to the former Marsha Manna.

**A. BEE, C's of insect bites...**  
 The stings of the wasp and bee, common injuries during the summer, can cause serious illness and, in some instances, death. Problems can occur if a person is sensitive or allergic to the insect, says Hollis S. Ingraham, M.D., New York State health commissioner.

If you have more than local swelling after a bee, wasp, or hornet sting, it may be a sign of allergy to insect bites. "If dizziness, headaches, abdominal cramps, nausea, or breathing difficulties occur, or if hives and swelling appear in an area other than the location of the sting," says Dr. Ingraham, "report it to your physician."

If you are stung, run cold, clean water over the bite or pack the area with ice to relieve pain and reduce swelling. Don't try to remove the stinger with your fingers — an innocent squeeze on the embedded stinger may release additional venom. Stingers should be lifted out with tweezers or the edge of a sterile knife.

Dr. Ingraham also recommends that people who know they are sensitive to insect stings consult their doctors for emergency first-aid medication to carry on summer outings. You can help keep the bees away, too. Don't wear bright colors outdoors and eliminate sweet, sticky foods from picnic menus — they'll only attract buzzing intruders.

**Pop right into your diet...**  
 with a handful of popcorn! That's right, the munchy crunchy stuff that lures you away from the movie and into the theater lobby needn't be the bane of your diet. In fact, it might help, if munch you must. (At least it might keep your mind off candy bars.)  
 According to Philip L. White, Sc.D., secretary of the American Medical Association's Council on Foods and Nutrition, one cup of plain, large kernel popped corn has only 25 calories. But stay away from the buttered variety. With butter, the same cup of corn yields 40 calories. And sugared corn is strictly taboo, with a whopping 135 calories. For a tasty change, sprinkle grated cheese on popped corn and broil for a minute — but add 25 calories for every tablespoon of cheese used.

# Commissioners Vote To Realign County Precincts

Exact county commissioner precinct lines are yet to be drawn, and the county could conceivably come up with another voting precinct as the result of action in the County Commissioners Court this week.

The Commissioners voted to realign the county's four commission precincts to bring them in line with court rulings to equalize the precincts on population, not area or roads. The new precincts, are within 300 of being equal in population.

It's possible, some report, that another voting precinct could be established at Lake Leon, bringing the county total to nine. Eastland County Commissioners voted Monday to realign the county's four precincts.

Commissioners voted 2-2 on the matter with Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey casting the tie-breaking vote in favor of the change. Commissioners Dick Foster of Gorman Precinct 2 and L.D. Owens, Rising Star Precinct 3, voted against the proposal.

Danny Woods, Eastland Precinct 1, and Clarence Dill, Cisco Precinct 4, voted in favor of the change. The motion was made by Woods and seconded by Dill.

Bailey said primary elections will be held next summer and commissioners will be chosen according to the new precinct lines. The new commissioners will take office Jan. 1, 1975.

The subject of changing the precinct lines to conform with federal guidelines under the "one-man, one-vote rule" came to light in November 1972, when a group for Ranger citizens appeared before the court asking that the lines be redrawn so that voters in the Ranger precinct would be more equally represented.

The group consisted of Mayor Lee Cantrell, attorney Dewey Cox, bank president Tom Dunn

and businessman Max Anderson, all of Ranger.

In January 1973, the commissioners court appointed a select committee comprised of eight Eastland County citizens, two from each precinct, to look into all aspects of redrawing the four precinct line.

Chairman of the group is James Reid of Eastland. Elected secretary is Gorman Postmaster Graydon Baze. Other members include Can-

trell, Guss Frossard, Gorman Precinct 2; Charles Rutherford, Rising Star banker and Harry Sone, both of Precinct 3; Arlin Bint, and Mrs. Audie Wagley, both of Cisco Precinct 4.

Before Monday's vote, county precincts were aligned as follows:

Precinct 1 with Woods of Olden as commissioner, encompassed Eastland, Olden and Ranger with an ap-

proximate voting strength of 4,235.

Precinct 2 was composed of Desdemona, Gorman and Carbon with Dick Foster of Gorman as commissioner, and a voting strength of 1,470.

Precinct 3 was composed of Rising Star only, with Owens as commissioner, and a voting strength of 1,200.

Precinct 4 was composed of Cisco only, with Dill as commissioner and a voting strength

of 2,500.

Under the new precinct lines announced Monday, Precinct 1 will consist of Eastland, extending west about four miles, south about five miles, north to Morton Valley and east to Olden, with an estimated voting strength of 2,400.

Precinct 2 will include Ranger, Olden, Lake Leon and Desdemona, with about 2,100 votes.

Precinct 3 will combine

Gorman Carbon and Rising Star with an estimated 2,400 votes.

Precinct 4 will remain unchanged, consisting of Cisco and environs with an estimated 2,500 votes.

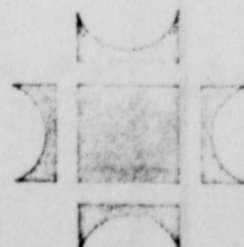
