Such hospital would be required to assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care to needy inhabitants of those counties.

For a timely tribute to National Donut Month, observed in October, three doughnut variations suggested by Mrs. Jessie Cartwright, director of the Norge Home Institute, Chicago, are moasses doughnuts, raised doughouts, and frosted doughnuts.

Make them this way MOLASSES DOUGHNUTS

5 cups sifted flour

- 1-2 cup sugar 2 teaspoons baking powder
- teaspoon salt
- teaspoon baking soda 1-2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ginger 1 egg, well beaten
- cup molasses cup sour milk or buttermilk
- tablespoon melted shortening Sift the dry ingredients together three times. Beat the egg, and

add molasses, sour milk, and shortening and mix well. Add the sifted dry ingredients and blend thoroughly. Roll the dough out on a floured

board to one-fourth inch thick-ness. Cut the doughnuts with a floured doughnut cutter, and fry them a few at a time in hot deep fat until they are brown. Turn and brown them on the other side. Then drain them on absorbent pa-

The recipe makes three dozen doughnuts. They can be coated with granulated or confectioners'

RAISED DOUGHNUTS 1 1-4 cups milk, scalded

- 1-4 cup shortening 1-2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cake yeast
- 5 cups sifted flour
- 3 eggs
- 3-4 cup sugar 1 1-2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1-8 teaspoon mace 1-4 teaspoon nutmeg

Combine the milk, shortening, and salt and cool to lukewarm Add the crumbled yeast, and let stand for five minutes.

Then mix in 2 1-2 cups of sifted flour and beat until smooth, Cover and let rise until the mix-

- 2 eggs
- 4 cups sifted flour
- teaspoons baking powder 1-4 teaspoon salt

1-2 teaspoon cinnamon 1-2 teaspoon nutmeg 1 eup milk

Beat the eggs until they are light, and add sugar gradually, beating well. Blend in shortening. Sift the dry ingredients together and add alternately with the milk to the sugar mixture. Roll the dough one-fourth inch thick on a floured board. Cut with a doughnut cutter and fry a few at a time in hot deep fat, turning once. Drain on absorbent paper and spread with a creamy cocoa frost-

Make the frosting of one-fourth cup of butter blended with one teaspoon of vanilla. Sift three tablespoons of cocoa with three cups of sifted confectioners' sugar. Add this to the butter mixture, alternately with strong coffee. Use enough coffee to make the icing soft enough to spread. This will be about one-fourth cup.




