Gives Rising Star 13-12 Win

MAVERICKS DROP DISTRICT TILT IN NIP-TUCK THRILLER

RISING STAR (TNS) — The good right arm of Quarterback Bert Agnew and the catching ability of Right End Howard Barton proved the undoing of the Eastland Mavericks here Friday night when that combination used a two yard pass for a point after touchdown to give Rising Star a 13-12 District 7-A victory.

Eastland saw one of their extra point tries blocked and another snapped short on a running play to fall by the wayside. End Leo Smith scored both Eastland touchdowns and played a whole of a defensive game to pace the hard-luck Mavs in their second district game.

The Mavs started off like a house-a-fire and scored on the 13th play of the game, with Quarterback Harvey Lewis passing to Smith for three yards and the score. Eastland drove from their own 28 to paydirt following the opening kickoff in convincing fashion to move ahead 6-0. Duard Turner passed to End Clyde Evert for 38 yards to the Rising Star 25 to cover much of the ground gained on the drive. From there, Billy Upchurch carried to the 16. Ben Cate lost back to the 20, the Mavs drew a penalty back to the 25. Lewis passed incomplete, then hit Upchurch in the left flat down to the 14. Cate carried to the eight, Upchurch to the six then to the three and then the pass from Lewis to Smith for the score.

Rising Star didn't waste any time getting back into the ball game, however. Following the Mav kickoff they moved 62 yards in 11 plays to tie things up, and then Agnew passed to Barton to put the Wildcats ahead 7-6. A series of short gains, with Halfback Eddie Harding doing most of the damage, carried the Cats to the 15. From that point, Wesley Moore, who also played fine offensive ball for Rising Star byvirt through a gapping hole in the left side of the line to go over practically untouched.

Rising Star moved ahead for keeps late in the second period of play when Harding blasted over from the one to climax a 75 yard drive. Howard Walker's extra point try was blocked.

Eastland's second tally came in the final period of play when Upchurch, guiding his team from Coach Carrol Shelton's version of the spread formation, passed to Smith for 41 yards and a TD. The extra point try failed when a bad center muffed the chance for a kick and Tackle Larry Tankersley, another standout for the Mavs all night, tried unsuccessfully to run over the point.

For Eastland it was a series of almost, but not enough, plays. In the second quarter they drove to the Rising Star 27, but a pass interception stopped the drive. And in the third quarter they drove to the 13, only to be pushed back to the 18 in four tries at the hard-fighting Cat line.

Rising Star's pass defense didn't stop, but did slow down Eastland's fine aerial game. The Cats managed just enough pass interceptions to seriously hurt Eastland's offense.

Benny Cate had his best night of the year, and Lupe Herrera, Neal Edwards, Charles Cook, Neil Pogue, Tankerley, Smith and Ed Evert all showed well on defense.

Rising Star outgained Eastland in total yardage 257 yards to 226 yards. The Mavs gained 103 yards in the first quarter alone.

Seed Shortage Looms For Next Peanut Season

Eastland County farmers were warned today of the impending shortage of peanut seeds that threatens next year's planting season.

T. C. Wylie, Ranger Peanut Co., said that between 17 and 18 thousand tons of seed are needed each year for the Southwest's planting and only 1,000 tons have been stored for next year's use.

The peanut crop being a low par in quality has sky-rocketed the farmer's selling price and most growers are selling their complete supply, as bonus prices continue, and disregarding the ever increasing problem of next year's planting seeds.

Now the shellers are buying the peanuts with a guarantee to the farmer that he may purchase the seed the following planting season for a price of not more than 26 cents per pound.

Never faced with this situation before, French South Africa is the only source of supply of the small Spanish peanut utilized in this area. With this, there has been no check surveys to determine it.

Eastland's B-Mavs roared back in the second half Thursday night for two touchdowns to break a 0-0 stalemate and take a 13-0 over the Dublin Bees.

It was a repeat victory for Coach Bobby Blair's charges, who dumped the Dubliners by the same score in Dublin earlier in the season. The Thursday night game was played in Eastland's Maverick Stadium.

Rising Star GI Helps Build Korean Chapel

I COI AS, KOREA (Spl.) — Pfc. Delton L. Childers, 24, whose wife, Betty, lives in Rising Star is a member of the 99th Field Artillery Battalion, which recently dedicated a stone chapel constructed to replace the tent formerly used by the battalion.

Built by Private First Class Childers and other members of the unit, the chapel will stand as a permanent monument to the free world's fight against Communism in Korea.

Children, a switchboard operator in Battery 1, entered the Army in December 1952 and has been overseas since last June. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. M. Childers, live on Route 1, Sipe Springs.

This is an amendment calling upon the voters of the entire state to grant permission to those in 94 counties to create, if they so desire, the office of assessor-collector in their own counties. Present constitutional provisions require...

The eleventh amendment would permit the creation of the office of tax assessor - collector in any county having less than 10,000 population, provided the commissioner's court should submit the question to the qualified property owning tax paying voters of the county at an election to be held for that purpose and provided that a majority of the voters should approve. Under the present constitution this duty is performed by the sheriff.

A member of the armed services stationed in Texas from other states would be disfranchised regardless of the length of his residence in this state. New non-military residents are permitted to vote as soon as they have lived in the state one year and six months in the county.

The danger of military control of local affairs would be removed by permitting the military personnel to vote only in the counties in which they resided when they entered the service.

The tenth amendment would permit all Texas service men and women to vote in the counties in which they resided when they entered the service. They would be required to pay their poll tax in order to vote.

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

Bankruptcy Proceeding Discharges Debts

There are always a certain number of families in the United States with serious financial troubles. At this time, the number is relatively few. To those few and to their creditors, this column should be of particular interest.

The principal reported causes which throw families into financial difficulties are: Inflation and high taxes, inability to resist "impulse" buying, combined with easy credit, illness or other emergencies, or just plain bad judgment and mismanagement.

Some people in financial difficulty, when threatened with legal proceedings to collect outstanding debts, seek the relief offered them by federal bankruptcy laws.

The purpose of bankruptcy laws is to permit an honest but unfortunate or weak debtor to surrender or account for all his property for the benefit of his creditors and

exchange be discharged of his debts.

Any adult who is insolvent may become a voluntary bankrupt by having his attorney prepare for him a bankruptcy petition, together with schedules of his assets and liabilities, and then file the same in the proper United States district court.

After the debtor is adjusted a bankrupt he is required to appear for examination as to his assets in the bankruptcy court, and if he fully accounts for his assets and has not violated any of the bankruptcy laws he will thereafter receive a discharge of his debts.

If he is granted a discharge of his debts, he has started a new financial life as of the date he filed bankruptcy. The assets which he thereafter acquires cannot be reached to satisfy the old debts, nor will creditors be permitted to sue him on the old debts.

Dishonest debtors sometimes endeavor to gain advantage for themselves not allowed by the bankruptcy laws. In these instances, upon objections to discharge by creditors, they not only will be denied a discharge of their debts, but the courts will be prone to deal harshly with the offenders if they have violated the criminal laws.

The head of a family is entitled to claim as exempt under Texas homestead laws, which in the ordinary case will be his home, household furniture, wearing apparel, the family automobile and tools of his trade or profession. However, if any of this property is covered by a mortgage or conditional sales contract he must pay any balance due thereon, or the owner of such mortgage or contract may repossess.

Bankruptcy has a lasting effect upon a person's future credit and in the usual case the creditors to lose their entire debt.

Many bankruptcies could be avoided if the "overloaded" debtor would make a timely effort to sit down with his creditors and work out plans for reduced payments over extended periods.
