THE TRUE FACTS ABOUT OLD RIP

Inasmuch as there has been so much and so many reports regarding this famous horned frog, and I was a witness to the whole episode, I have been asked to write a true report of the whole affair exactly as I was it. Hence the following:

When I was transferred to Eastland in 1921, I rented a dwelling from Mr. Ernest E. Woods, who later became Justice of the Peace for that precinct. He told me that when the Court House, then being used, was built in 1897 that he placed a live horned frog in this cornerstone. He was severely censured by the Humane Society for his act. He, like myself and other folks, had always heard that a frog would live 100 years or more if confined in an airtight space. So when it was decided to build a new Court House in 1928 there was much conjecture and discussion regarding the legend.

Hundreds of folks were discussing the pros and cons of same. When the Old Court House was being torn down and the contractors reached the corner in the cornerstone was embedded, hundreds of folks had come to town to see the results of the opening of same and verify the old legend. This was on February 28, 1928 (please note date). The contractor had left the corner where the cornerstone was embedded in a pyramid shape some 10 feet high. The officers, one Mr. Bob Hammett and others, had the crowd to get back several feet from the stone. Mr. Harry Woods (the son of Ernest Woods) had a truck with a winch on it and he placed a cable around the pyramid and pulled it down, but the stone not yet being exposed, a man with a pinch bar prized the bricks down to the stone. The opening of same was covered with lead seal about 1/2" thick and fitted tightly over the opening, covered with cement mortar, making it airtight.

After the seal was removed Bob Hammett asked the Rev. Frank E. Singleton, pastor of First Methodist Church in Eastland, to take out the contents. Although it was a cold day he removed his coat, rolled up his sleeves, and took out the contents. They were old newspapers, a bible, some coins, and other things. The paper being rotten, fell to pieces, and he then lifted out

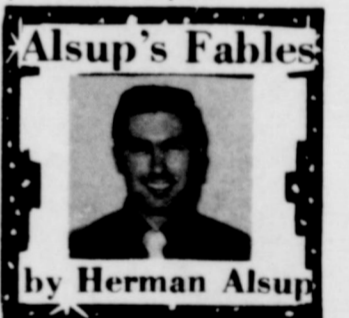

The Texas Department of Public Safety is seeking applicants to fill the ranks of its uniform services. A training school for cadet patrolmen will begin June 27, 1972. This announcement was made by Major E.K. Browning, Jr., Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety for this area.

QUALIFICATIONS

Applicants must be males between the ages of 20 and 35; a height of not less than 68 inches nor more than 76 inches; a weight of not less than two pounds nor more than three and one half pounds per inch of height; visual acuity no less than 20 - 40 correctable to 20 - 20; have at least fifteen college hours; in excellent physical condition; good moral character; and a citizen of the United States.

EMPLOYMENT

The Texas Department of Public Safety is an Equal Opportunity Employer. Interested young men are urged to contact any Texas Department of Public Safety office or patrolman for an application. After completing the application take it to the nearest regional, district or sub-district Texas Department of Public Safety office for verification and certification. If all is in order then the written test will be administered which will qualify or disqualify the applicant for further consideration. Successful applicants will be given an agility test, a character investigation and a physical examination. Those accepted for employment will be notified prior to the beginning date of the next training school.

TRAINING

Cadet patrolmen will be assigned to the Texas Department of Public Safety Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, Texas for a 17-week training period. The cadet will receive some 800 hours of intensive classroom work and supervised study. The training is designed to equip the cadet to handle any of the various situations he may encounter as a patrolman. The training of a patrolman is a test of an individual's intellectual, emotional and physical stamina. It is also an educational process which prepares him for a rewarding career in law enforcement.

In addition to classroom work the cadet is taught self-protection by means of judo, boxing, wrestling, and other police - protection methods.

The salary during training is \$560 per month. Room and board while at the academy will cost the cadet approximately \$55 per month.

BENEFITS

Upon being commissioned a patrolman, the salary is automatically raised to \$696 per month. Patrolmen receive additional longevity pay for each five years of service to a maximum of 25 years. Uniforms, vehicles, weapons, ammunition and necessary equipment are furnished. They are also granted a monthly uniform cleaning allowance, and receive travel expenses when away from their assigned station. Group life and hospitalization insurance is provided for the employee. The patrolmen become members of the Texas Employees Retirement System and the Social Security System.

Vacation, holidays, and sick leave are also provided for the patrolmen.

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MEDICAID TO EVICT PATIENTS IN MIDDLE OF HOSPITAL ILLNESS

Government interference has reached a new high. Now you are given an official length of time to be sick and if you do not cooperate, out of the hospital you go, sick or not—critical or not.

The doctors of Texas have been informed that as of April 1, 1972, all hospitalized Medicaid patients—and soon Medicare patients—must fit into a new schedule of illness called "Parameters". Two hundred eighty-nine illnesses are listed, along with the maximum length of hospital stay paid for by the welfare department (in Texas). The welfare department has told the doctors and hospitals that when time runs out all further costs incurred will be the responsibility of the hospital and doctor.

The Texas Welfare Department has made the problem simple by telling their recipients how many days of sickness the department will tolerate. This is ridiculous, of course, since the length of an illness can never be predicted in advance.

Do you believe the government should be allowed to jeopardize your health or life in such a ridiculous manner? Should it be allowed to tie your doctor's hands this way? Under the new regulation, a welfare patient may be forced out of the hospital prematurely, perhaps even in the critical stage of an illness and against your doctor's judgment. We believe health and life are too precious to be handled this way . . . don't you?

The welfare department also has reserved the power to review your hospital stay at a later date—as long as five years later—and may then over-rule your doctor's opinion as to the necessity for the hospitalization.

Can an extension be granted for additional care in an emergency? Well . . . yes and no. Another doctor on a review committee may grant approval for additional care. However, his decision is not official and can be overruled by the welfare department at any future time.

Will your doctor be willing to accept the responsibility for your health and life when he is placed under such restrictions? Not likely.

Who should be concerned about these problems? Everyone who values life, health, and personal dignity. If you are now covered by Medicaid the situation is urgent. If you are covered by Medicare you are in danger since these restrictions will be imposed on you also, perhaps as early as July of this year.

Do you have private insurance? If you do, these restrictions are very likely to be applied to you later in a similar way.

We cannot impress upon you too strongly how important it is for you to help solve this serious and urgent problem immediately. Write your state and federal representatives now about these restrictions, urging them to correct this administrative monster.

To make the regular honors list, a student must be enrolled for a minimum of 12 semester hours of course work, excluding physical education activities, and have at least an overall "B" average.

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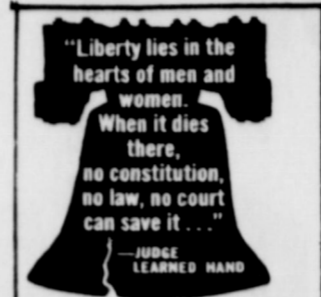

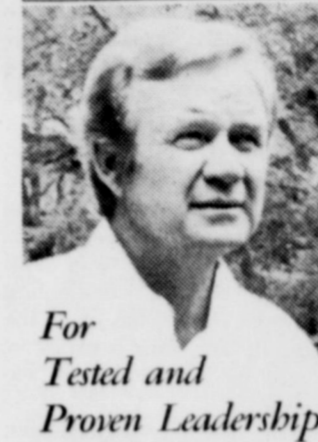

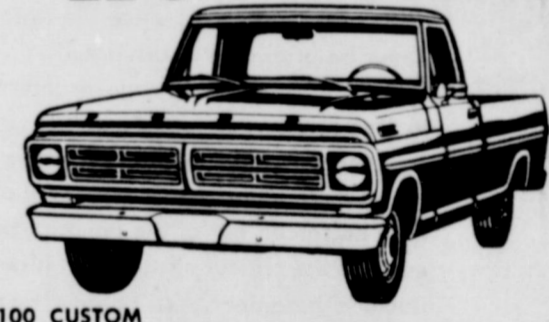

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Gordon pot

"Best thing that has happened in six months" is the way most people described the rain last week. It seems that about two inches of rain fell in all parts of the county. This moisture will help condition land for peanut planting. Several cattlemen were waiting for rain so they could continue sprigging coastal bermuda grass and planting other grasses. The rain was also badly needed for the established pastures and rangeland. In fact, I think the rain improved everyone's outlook.

It's too early to spray pecan trees for the pecan nut casebearer. We are getting calls everyday from people who want to know if it is time to spray pecan trees.

Some growers have been spraying pecans during the past two weeks. This is the pre-pollination application and is recommended as a good management practice, but it should not be confused with the casebearer spray application. The pre-pollination spray should include zinc sulfate and a fungicide for disease control.

The casebearer spray should be applied in about four weeks, but is too early to give a definite date now. In the past few years this spray date had been between May 25th and June 1st. Reports indicate that the development of this insect appears to be well ahead of the average pattern in South Texas.

The casebearers first emerge in South Texas and their reports are a good indication of the emergence pattern in this area. We also trap these insects in local orchards and observe their development. By studying all these factors we hope to be able to inform you a week or two in advance of the best time to spray your pecans.

Most peach trees have a heavy set of fruit. If this is true of your peach trees you should thin the fruit now. If your trees have a heavy set of fruit they need drastic reduction for peaches to reach desired size. Commercial peach growers attempt to space the peaches at least six inches apart on the limb. This will allow the peaches to grow so they will measure 2 1/2 to 3 inches in diameter.

A tree too heavily loaded will produce small peaches that measure only 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 inches in diameter. A large peach with good quality has a strong ready acceptance as a dessert type fruit. Besides, it takes less peaches to fill a market container when they are large; for example, it takes only 159 peaches which are 2 1/2 inches in diameter to fill a bushel basket, while it takes 293 if the diameter is only 2 inches.

We established a peach thinning demonstration in an orchard owned by Chester Marrs of the Chaney Community last week. A mechanical shaker was used to thin the peaches. It normally takes at least 40 minutes to hand thin a tree. The mechanical tree shaker did the same job in less than five seconds.

We weighed the fruit the shaker removed from one four-year-old tree. The shaker removed 47 pounds of green peaches. It took 24 peaches to weigh one pound which means we removed 1128 peaches from one tree and it still had too many peaches remaining on the tree.

This will give you an idea of how many peaches should be removed from your trees. Marrs said there is a good demand for large peaches, but he can hardly give the small peaches away. He has been hand thinning in the past, but the mechanical thinner may prove to be both faster and more economical.

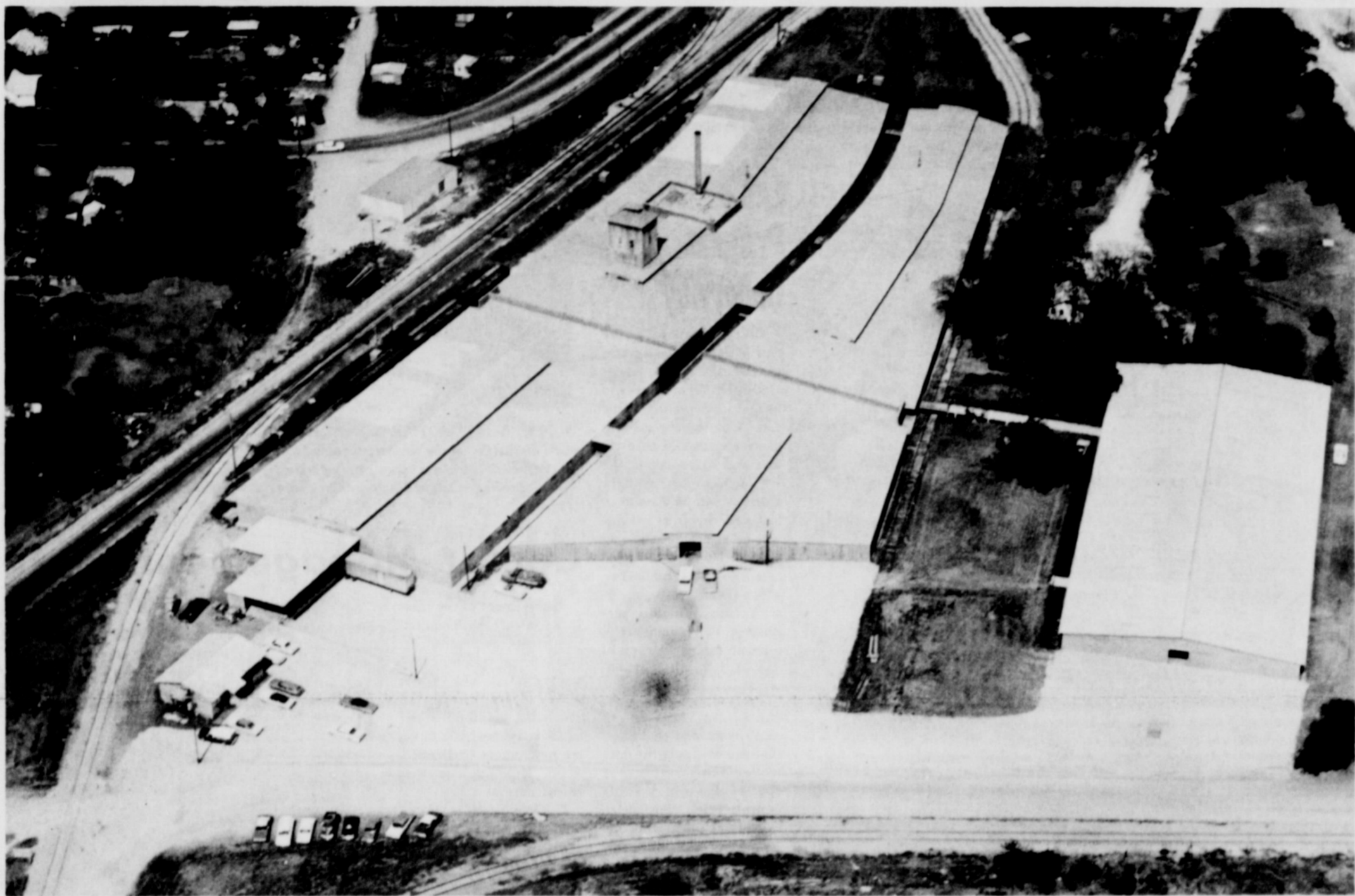

The center occupies over 75,000 square feet of floor space which is a portion of the multi-building complex formerly owned by the Brownwood Compress Company.

The prime purpose of opening the new facility is to cut out the middle man and bring to the public its grocery needs at a reduced price. Due to the strategic location of Brownwood transportation rates, both by rail and truck, are cheaper than in many areas of Texas. The building complex is completely sprinkled for the best fire protection, and the savings in insurance cost will bring about other price reductions.

Located in south Brownwood, the facility is bounded on the North by Main Street (Highway 377), on the East by Center Avenue, on the South by West 8th Street, and on the West by the Santa Fe tracks. It occupies an area of approximately 13½ acres with the main buildings occupying 151,552 square feet, which is nearly four city blocks. All buildings are insulated with Poly-urethane in order to maintain a year-round temperature.

Center on the traffic circle.

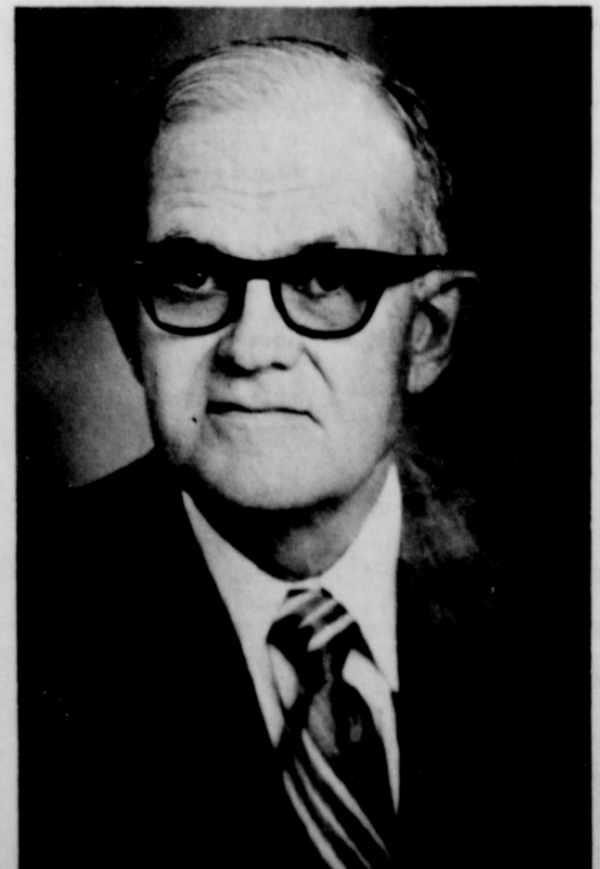

Beadel's duties are to assist Ratliff in the production and advertising of all meats handled by the JRB Super Markets.

Beadel was born in Brownwood and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James R. Beadel Sr. He is a graduate of Brownwood High School and a member of the Church of the Good Shepherd.

In addition to his work with JRB Super Markets, Beadel has been associated with the Rylander Food Stores, the 7-11 Food Stores and the Mimimax Food Stores, all in Austin.

"We want to make our JRB Super Markets comfortable places to shop,

with friendly employees, and competitive prices," Beadel said.

He is married and the couple has a daughter, Tracy Rene. They live at the Wayside Plaza apartments.

Beadel graduated from Texas Tech University in Lubbock and holds a bachelor of business administration degree in retailing. After graduating from Texas Tech, Beadel joined the Kroger Grocery Co. as manager trainee with Dallas operations.

He then returned to Lubbock with Shop-Rite Foods as assistant store manager. In 1963 he joined J. R. Beadel & Co. as manager of one of the

Brownwood stores.

A new store was built in Abilene and Beadel moved to Abilene accepting the post of co-manager of that store. For the past six years he has been with Century Papers Inc. of Houston. He has been division manager of their Beaumont operations for the past three years.

Beadel has served on the vestry and as Sunday school teacher and superintendent of St. Stephens Episcopal Church in Beaumont. He has been active in the Young Men's Christian Assn. Indian Guides program in Beaumont.

He is a member of the Bayou Din Country Club and has served on the board of that club's gold association for the past two years.

NEW CENTER REDUCES COSTS

Approximately 1100 feet of railway siding and docks surround the buildings which contribute to faster, more economical loading and unloading of both rail cars and trucks, and faster and more efficient deliveries to stores. Twenty freight cars can be docked along the buildings on the property owned side tracks.

Many modern innovations in equipment have been used in remodeling for the operation of the new center.

Modern steel shelving and racks are used to store merchandise on several levels. Each section is numbered to correspond with the merchandise in the stock record that is stored in that particular location.

Expansion Program Underway

Of special interest in the new J. R. Beadel and Company Distribution Center are the cold storage and frozen foods vaults. This area of the warehouse will be in operation at an early date and will occupy 10,000 square feet of floor space. It will be divided in half and the frozen foods will be kept at a temperature of 10 degrees below zero, while the other which will store vegetables, fruits and other perishables will maintain a constant temperature of 40 degrees.

Especially designed refrigerating equipment along with modern insulation will maintain the controlled temperatures. A special drive-in loading ramp is being constructed to facilitate the loading and unloading of the merchandise which is delivered to and from the center in specially designed refrigerated trucks and vans.

All racks, cartons and other equipment used in this division will be of the most modern design for the most efficient storage of the many cold storage items included in the shelves of well operated supermarkets.

Another room in the center will be especially air conditioned to maintain the proper temperature for candies and other similar items.

Fork lifts and pallets are employed both in receiving and storing, and filling store orders for distribution, while mechanical tuggers with numerous carts attached are used up and down the aisles to assist in loading vans for distribution.

An automatic sprinkler

system, outside lighting of buildings, night watch protection and burglar alarms are other devices employed to insure economic maintenance. A larger tractor with sweeping and suction, along with continued pest control help maintain a clean and healthy operation.

A new facility has been added to the warehouse building, an excavated loading ramp which will hold six large vans at dock level and a large housed-in dock which will make loading and unloading of vans with the mechanical devices possible in any kind of weather.

Center Management Tops

Management of the new J. R. Beadel Distribution Center will be handled by four efficient people, all of whom have had many years of experience in warehousing and other related businesses. All three are newcomers to Brownwood, although one was reared here as a boy.

C. A. Dacus is warehouse manager and has had extensive experience over a number of years in modern warehousing, and has kept abreast of the latest methods and equipment. A modern distribution center is a far cry from those of 25 years ago due to the multitudinous increase in available foods, mechanical improvements, scientific advancements and means of cheaper operation.

Arch Ratliff is general buyer for the center and it is his responsibility to accumulate food products from all parts of the country, and countless manufacturers, packers and producers. It is his responsibility to purchase merchandise at an advantageous price. He is widely known throughout the nation as a very astute buyer and is considered an expert in his field. He spent a part of his youth in Brownwood and is the son of the late Arch Ratliff, Sr. and Mrs. Ratliff.

Marshall Garner is in charge of purchasing health, beauty aids, and housewares for the center. He has had many years experience in this field and has been associated with the JRB Supermarkets for several years.

Morris Gillett has general supervision of the entire distribution center and his responsibility is to coordinate all the efforts of each department to see that they operate in an efficient and economic way. He has had a broad experience in selling and merchandising and is well equipped for his position. He is one of the vice-presidents of J. R. Beadel & Company.

Mrs. Lois O'Connell is receptionist and stock record keeper for the warehouse and she and the others in the office occupy a separate building in the

complex. The building has been remodeled into private offices and covers an area of approximately 2000 square feet.
