

available. The Carbon Methodist Church dates back to 1890, Rev. I.N. Reeves, grandfather of Mr. W.R. Ussery was the founder of the group called ' Methodist". It is reported that they first met in the home of Mr. W.R. Ussery. Later they met in the General Store, and, then, in the school building, the land for the school being donated by the Katy Railroad.

The church has been afflicted by the forces of nature. The first church building was destroyed by a tornado before it was completed. A new church was completed in 1898.

This church building was a credit to any community. It was one large room with choir and pulpit, a tall steeple with a bell which was rung every Sunday morning. Nice pews and a piano gave this building a modern look (modern at that

In 1924 this building was torn down and the material used to build a larger building. But disaster struck again and the church was destroyed by fire shortly after it was erected. The present building was erected in the early 30's and was an exact replica of the one that was burned.

The church continues to be battered by the forces of nature. Three years ago the roof was destroyed by hail. A new roof was placed on the building. Conservation Essay

MAN AND THE SOIL David Walker

In the sweat of thy face shalt thou eat bread, till thou return anto the ground; for out of it wast thou taken: dust for thou art, and unto dust shalt thou

Genesis 3:10

Our country may be compared to a high school football team. Often the team which has the largest number of men "out" on the squad wins the most games. We sometimes refer to this as the team with the greatest reserve strength. When we compare our country with other countries of the world, we like to think of it as being the biggest, strongest, and the most progressive. The reason we can boast of all this is that players our country has a large number of natural resources upon which it can draw. These reserves are stores which have been set

aside by nature for us to use when it becomes necessary.

Countries which have used all their natural resources, or did not have them in the first place. cannot boast as we in America

"Natural resources" simply means what nature gave us and what she wanted us to use. They are one of the gifts or rewards that were given to the people who live in the United States. These natural resources are something we inherited from our fathers forefathers. The word "conservation" may seem to be just another one of the big words that you hear older people use. To gain a better understanding, let us first define it. Conservation simply means "wise use" of these things which every citizen inherited from nature." These are the soils, forests. grasslands, fish and wildlife, and fuels and minerals of the

United States.

To anyone approaching the subject for the first time, the term "soil conservation" is not sufficiently descriptive. It is inadequate to express the scope of the subject it is meant to cover. Soil conservation is a science, a system of remedial practices, and a social movement. As such it may be described as a division of ecology, which Webster's New International Dictionary defines as "the branch of biology which deals with the mutual relations between organisms and their environment." Most of the physical measure of soil conservation are very old. Horizontal or contour plowing, to mention but one, was referred to by the agricultural writers of ancient Rome.

Soil Conservation Service lists 59 standard physical practices, but as many of these are simply variations from and modifications of others, it will suffice here to name and describe briefly the basic ones. In the control of water erosion. all measures have the dual purpose of (1) reducing the amount of run - off to the minimum and pose (2) controlling the irreducible ninimum so as to cause the least possible soil loss

The subordinate factors are:

- (1) Vegetative cover
- (2) Rotation
- (3) Fertilization (4) Contour cultivation
- (5) Strip cropping (6) Terracing
- (7) Listing
- (8) Subsurface Farming (9) Sub Soil Tillage
- (10) Shelter Belting
- (11) Irrigation
- (12) Drainage

White men have been in this country for about 200 years. It hardly seems possible that during this period of time:

- 1. We have ruined approximately 40 million acres of cropland for further practical cultivation
- 2. An additional 50,000,000 acres are near ruin. 3. Another 100,000,000 acres
- are being affected by erosion. 4. On yet another 100,000,000

acres, erosion is actively un derway

Approximately 5,500,000,000 tons of soil are lost annually. 6. The Mississippi River alone annually pours some

730,000,000 tons of soil into the Gulf of Mexico 7. One hundred years ago there were 800,000,000 acres of

virgin forests 8. On the North American continent 42 different kinds of wildlife have either completely or practically disappeared

owing to man's actions

9. The estimated annual cost is \$3,844,000,000 in damage and repairs to our resources.

Now that you understand the neaning of "Conservation of Natural Resources," what are the types and kinds of natural resources? These may be divided into two large groups. The first are called "renewable resources" and include all those which are able to reproduce and or replace themselves if they are used wisely by man. Most of these are alive. The living renewable resources are forests. rangelands and plants, wildlife and fisheries, and soils. The 'dead' renewable resources are air, sunlight, and water.

The second group are called 'non renewable resources.' and include those which are not living and are not able to reproduce themselves. They were created by nature, and it takes many millions of years to develop them. The coal that you see being burned is at least 10,000,000 years old. The metals which go into the making of iron and steel are several hundred millions of years old. Man has not yet found a way to speed up nature's process of creating these resources. We of the United States must use them wisely because when they are gone we must either do without or find a substitute.

Our resources are not unlimited, and must be used wisely, but only if you and I use them properly

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
