YOU'LL WANT to be sure to make plans to attend the dedication ceremony Sunday at 2 p.m., when the Connellee House at 515 S. Lamar St., Eastland is officially dedicated as a historical Eastland site. Sharon and Melinda McCloud, daughters of Judge and Mrs. Austin McCloud (the home's present residence) will do the unveiling honors. County Historical Committee Chairman Mike Collins will give the dedicatory address. The Rev. Cecil Ellis, pastor First Methodist Church, will give the invocation.

The Historical Medallion with Plate will read: THE CONNELLEE HOUSE - Home of Charles U. Connellee (1851-1930), who opened much of West Texas to settlement. Coming as a surveyor from Kentucky in 1874, he platted town of Eastland and promoted it as county seat.

He built lower story of his home in 1876, of lumber hauled from Dallas by oxwagon, and kept open house for all of West Texas.

Second story was added in 1924. Further remodeled in 1956, 1963, 1971. The structure is preserved by Judge and Mrs. Austin McCloud.

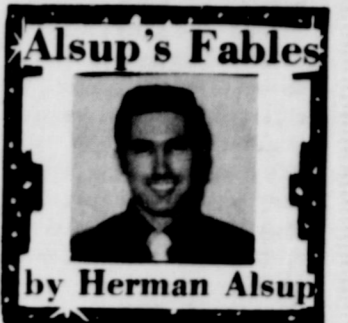
"THAT'S MY COUSIN" by Kurtz Gordon

Coach Evatt Tells Philosophy, Plans

Eastland is the "top spot" in the State of Texas to be coaching, says New Head Coach Clyde Evatt.

A 11-year coaching veteran from Class A to AAAA, Evatt, an Eastland High School graduate, told members of the Eastland Lions Club at noon Tuesday, that he's mighty proud to be back. He comes to Eastland from San Antonio and said he plans to raise his four children here.

Introduced by Supt. Wendell Siebert, the new coach outlined his talk for the Lions in three phases: his philosophy; the program he plans here; and guidelines for winners.

"If ever self-discipline is needed by individuals, it's needed now," he said, as he explained that is his basic philosophy of coaching. He explained that he plans to strive for an over-all athletic program at EHS, not by cutting back on football, but by expanding the basketball and track activities.

He said that he and his assistant coaches, Doug Dallas and Don Adair, will all work with the youth from the Seventh Grade up, in an effort to achieve and maintain a long term athletic program.

Evatt was especially complimentary of the dedicated athletes at EHS now. "They are the finest group of boys I've ever seen," he said. Acknowledging that everyone cannot be an athlete, he said that his efforts will be toward developing the best there is in each youngster.

"We can measure a lot of things: weight, time, etc.; but we can't measure an athlete's heart, and that's where winners are made. I'm very enthusiastic, he said, and next fall, you're going to really think I'm extra enthusiastic, but I believe that's the way to inspire enthusiasm in athletes.

Each of the three coaches will train and teach in a specific area in each sport with all ages from the Seventh Graders up he explained.

President De Gordon presided and conducted the formal election of officers for the coming year, with Clint Bray elected to serve as president beginning with the next club year.

Tip Arthur will be in charge of the program next week.

Evatt told the Lions that it was 16 years ago that he last spoke to the Eastland Lions "about this time of year" and told them of his plans to go to Texas Tech, and learn to be a coach.

It Has Been

Before the advent of telephones in the young town of Rising Star, citizens of town and country delivered messages by slow mail service. In case of serious illness or death, messages were delivered by members of families or neighbors who rode fast running horses.

The first telephone system for the rapidly growing Rising Star was established by W.A. (Will) Bucy during the year 1896, in a furniture store owned and operated by himself and his father Capt. W.P. Bucy.

At first only local service was available. Lines ran over the entire community, on wire fences. As many as a dozen or more families were on many of these make shift lines. Some near riots occurred because of listening in on conversations, carried over party lines.

As new people moved into the town and community and the town grew, toll service was demanded, and Mr. Bucy installed toll lines and furnished long distance calls.

Among switchboard operators for the Bucy Telephone Company were Miss Annie Bucy, young sister of Will Bucy (now Mrs. Annie Haley, a widow living in Dallas) and Miss Nellie Venable, the late Mrs. H.S. Childress.

In 1906 Mr. Bucy sold the system to A.L. Toombs who moved to Rising Star from Scranton. Under new management the office was moved into a small two-room frame building that stood over the ditch just south of the present F.D. Boggs Service Station. Operators for this system were Ellen Barnes and Bink McCarley. A son of Mr. Toombs was on duty as night operator.

A.J. Rhone, a merchant in Rising Star, purchased the business from Mr. Toombs during the year of 1910.

The oil boom came in the early "twenties" and telephone

business skyrocketed, calling for a larger, better equipped system. At this time the office was moved to the second floor of Agnew and Gray Grocery Store building. Mr. Rhone successfully operated the system until late 1923. Switchboard operators included Jessie Alford, Vada Switzer, Hassie Montgomery, Annie Mae White, Fay Lockhart, Ruby Ervin and Blanche McGaughey. Night operators were teen age boys, Curtis Rhone, Dean Grimes and Jim Barnes.

Late in 1923, T.P. Bearden of Baird, Texas, became owner of the telephone system and added it to the Home Telephone Company with headquarters in Baird.

Later Mr. Bearden bought the former Commercial Hotel building located on the present Shults Implement display lot on West Pioneer Street.

New equipment was installed and service improved. Operators for the Home Telephone Company at different times were Vada Switzer, Hassie Montgomery, Elizabeth Pinkston, Minnie Bishop, Estelle McClure, Joe Ella Cox, Mrs. Retta Richardson, and others. Night shifts were handled by different young ladies.

Mr. Bearden continued in business in Rising Star until 1950, when E.O. Kizer of Fort Worth bought the system and made rapid improvement and expansion. A major improvement was the construction of miles of rural subscriber lines.

At a later date Mr. Kizer bought the former Frozen Locker building across the street, rebuilt and converted it to a modern telephone office, installing dial equipment that greatly improved service to a community that appreciated the improvement.

Some of the operators for this company were Mrs. John Joyce, Mrs. Vada Arnold,

Mrs. Wade Byrd, Mrs. Bill Richardson, Mrs. Tom Hardin, Mrs. Marion West and Mrs. Ralph Kizer.

A few years ago Mr. Kizer sold the Kizer Telephone business to the West Texas Telephone and Telegraph Co. the present owners.

Conservation Essay

MAN AND THE SOIL
 David Walker

In the sweat of thy face shalt
 thou eat bread, till thou return
 unto the ground; for out of it
 wast thou taken: dust for thou
 art, and unto dust shalt thou
 return.

Genesis 3: 10

Our country may be compared
 to a high school football team.
 Often the team which has the
 largest number of men "out"
 on the squad wins the most
 games. We sometimes refer to
 this as the team with the
 greatest reserve strength.
 When we compare our country
 with other countries of the
 world, we like to think of it as
 being the biggest, strongest,
 and the most progressive. The
 reason we can boast of all this
 is that players our country has
 a large number of natural
 resources upon which it can
 draw. These reserves are
 stores which have been set

aside by nature for us to use
 when it becomes necessary.
 Countries which have used all
 their natural resources, or did
 not have them in the first place,
 cannot boast as we in America
 do.

"Natural resources" simply
 means what nature gave us and
 what she wanted us to use.
 They are one of the gifts or
 rewards that were given to the
 people who live in the United
 States. These natural resources
 are something we inherited
 from our fathers and
 forefathers. The word "con-
 servation" may seem to be just
 another one of the big words
 that you hear older people use.
 To gain a better understanding,
 let us first define it. Con-
 servation simply means "wise
 use" of these things which
 every citizen inherited from
 nature." These are the soils,
 waters, forests, and
 grasslands, fish and wildlife,
 and fuels and minerals of the
 United States.

To anyone approaching the
 subject for the first time, the
 term "soil conservation" is not
 sufficiently descriptive. It is
 inadequate to express the scope
 of the subject it is meant to
 cover. Soil conservation is a
 science, a system of remedial
 practices, and a social
 movement. As such it may be
 described as a division of
 ecology, which Webster's New
 International Dictionary
 defines as "the branch of
 biology which deals with the
 mutual relations between
 organisms and their en-
 vironment." Most of the
 physical measure of soil con-
 servation are very old.
 Horizontal or contour plowing,
 to mention but one, was
 referred to by the agricultural
 writers of ancient Rome.

Soil Conservation Service
 lists 59 standard physical
 practices, but as many of these
 are simply variations from and
 modifications of others, it will
 suffice here to name and
 describe briefly the basic ones.
 In the control of water erosion,
 all measures have the dual
 purpose of (1) reducing the
 amount of run-off to the
 minimum and pose (2) con-
 trolling the irreducible
 minimum so as to cause the least
 possible soil loss.

The subordinate factors are:
 (1) Vegetative cover
 (2) Rotation
 (3) Fertilization
 (4) Contour cultivation
 (5) Strip cropping
 (6) Terracing
 (7) Listing
 (8) Subsurface Farming
 (9) Sub Soil Tillage
 (10) Shelter Belting
 (11) Irrigation
 (12) Drainage
