Tubing Mill To Be Built at Leon Industrial Site

An industrial tubing mill will begin operations in Eastland County in approximately 60 days at the Eastland Industrial Foundation's Lake Leon Power Plant site, according to an announcement Wednesday.

Construction will begin immediately on a 130 by 150 foot

metal building to house the giant tubing mill to be brought here and installed.

The machine will produce 250 feet of tubing per minute at maximum production. The machine will take flat steel in 36" coils, split and form it into tubes from three quarter to two

and three eighths inches. Primarily used for gate manufacturing and construction, the finished product has wide marketing demand.

Principals in the firm are Eastland Countian A.P. Fambro of Cisco, owner and operator of Fambro

Gate Manufacturing Co., and Ancil King of Eastland, formerly operator of King Aggregate Co. Mr. Fambro is president of the new corporation.

The Cisco gate business will use approximately a million

Reid Succeeds Reid As Eastland Mayor Bell Gets 1st Reading

The Eastland City Commission re-organized, gave Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. a first reading on its rate increase and heard good news about a new plant here.

Eastland Drug Co. Owner Operator Durel Reid was elected mayor - chairman by the Commission, after he and Jay Staggs were sworn in. Durel Reid replaces James Reid (no kin) as mayor.

Retiring Mayor Reid was presented a beautiful plaque by the commission in appreciation of his eight years of service to the city.

With Mayor Pro - Tem W.Q. Verner presiding, Durel Reid was nominated by Staggs. Verner was re-elected mayor pro - tem; Dale Bakker, treasurer; and H.V. O'Brien, assistant treasurer.

Mr. Curry, owner of Tri - City Ready Mix attended and an agreement was reached that the commission to lease him four acres of land immediately east of the Texas Lightweight Aggregate plant for the installation of a new \$45,000 dust - free cement plant.

Mr. Curry reported that his existing plant in the east part of town will be dismantled. Installation of the new plant will take approximately three months, he said, and the old site will be cleaned after the new plant is in operation. His company will build new office facilities at the new site, with details of the lease agreement to be worked out.

John McGowan, district manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone, found luck in his third appearance before the commission, asking a rate increase, when Commissioner Staggs made the motion to give the rate hike approval on first

reading. Verner seconded and the vote was unanimous. The motion came following a lengthy discussion of the company's request.

Dr. Melvin Henexson appeared asking that the city give details on parking meter rental in connection with his chiropractic clinic. He was assured that the city would work with him as details are developed.

The commission okayed a salary increase for Employee Calvin Milligan in recognition of his attending special school in connection with sewer plant operation.

City Manager Lewis Tiner reported that he had delivered the audit and other materials necessary for making application to the state in regard to the city's new sewer plant. A deadline of May 15 looms for the application.

Staggs made a motion asking that an ordinance be adopted which would give the city the right to condemn buildings which are held to be dangerous and - or unsightly to the community. The motion passed and a sample ordinance of this nature is to be secured from the City of Snyder where an extensive program has been carried out.

9 Students Compete for Region Title In Odessa

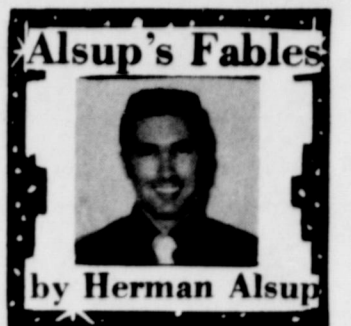

BURIED TUESDAY - Lt. Col. Louis J. Rochat Jr., Army Retired, well-known to many Eastland Countians in his capacity as liaison officer at Fort Wolters, was buried in services held there Tuesday. Col. Rochat, son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis J. Rochat Sr., well-known San Saba ranchers, was also known in his capacity as Fort Wolters representative to Eastland's annual Flag

Day Observance. He had attended and participated in this event here for the past five years. Col. Rochat made three tours of duty in Viet Nam, and had also spoken to many service clubs in this area. His death came accidentally Sunday morning as he was cleaning a hand gun at his home in Mineral Wells. Following retirement from the Army, he was devoting much time to Boy's Club Work.

Cecil Shultz

Cecil Gaines Shultz, 76, long-time Rising Star business and civic leader, died in West Texas Medical Center in Abilene at 8:40 a.m. Tuesday, April 18.

He had suffered a stroke last December and had been confined to hospitals and Twilight Acres Nursing Home in Rising Star since that time.

Monday when his condition worsened he was transferred to the Abilene Medical Center.

Funeral services will be held at the Rising Star Church of Christ at 2:30 p.m. Thursday, April 20 with Minister James Honey officiating. Burial will be in Rising Star Cemetery under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home.

Mr. Shultz was born Sept. 9, 1895 at Okra, the son of Columbus G. and Ellen Scott Shultz. Except for military service in World War I, he had spent all of his life in Eastland County where he was a successful businessman, rancher and farmer.

He was married to Ruby Lowery whom he met when she came to Rising Star to teach in the public schools, on March 8, 1921. They have one son, Bob Shultz, who was a partner with his father in the Shultz Implement Co. and their ranching interests, six miles north of Rising Star, where both families have their home.

Mr. Shultz began his business career with Higginbotham as manager of the company's Rising Star mortuary department. He later went into the grocery business for himself and for many years, operated a Piggly-Wiggly store here. During that period he laid the foundation for his ranching enterprises. Shortly after World War II, he went into the farm implement sales and services in which he was joined by his son and together they operated one of the largest dealerships of their kind in West Central Texas, a business in which the son continues.

Mr. Shultz' civic career includes terms as president of the chamber of commerce - which honored him last February by dedicating its annual banquet in tribute to him - and leadership in many other community enterprises in which he expressed his deep affection and ambition for the community he loved. Among his most notable contributions were his prominent part in the organization of the Rising Star Community Hospital, the Upper Leon Soil and Water District and the Sabanno Watershed Association. He was a member of the American Expedition Force in World War I.

Besides his wife and son, both of Rising Star, he is survived by a brother, O.R. (Dutch) Shultz of Rising Star; four sisters, Mrs. Irene Mayfield, Mrs. Ruby Bellew, Mrs. Willie Lee Grey, all of Rising Star; and Mrs. Mary Conkling of Abilene; and two grandchildren.

He was a member of the Rising Star Church of Christ.

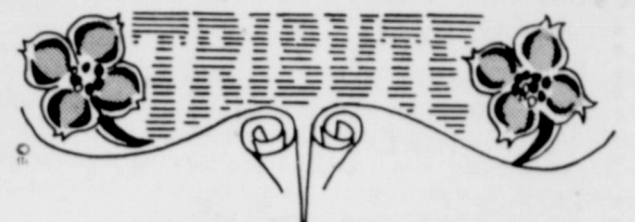

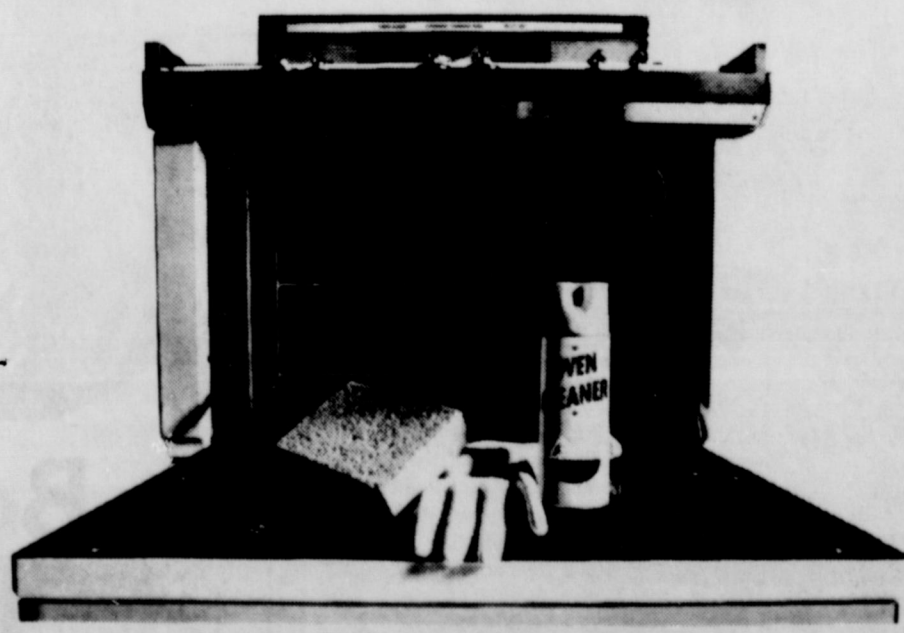

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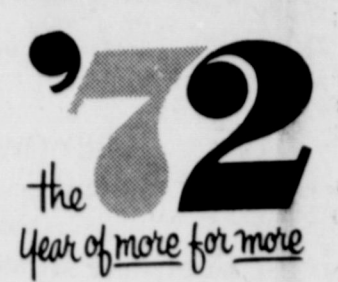

Congressman Burleson

Congressman Omar Burleson has formally announced his candidacy for re-election to Congress, subject to the Democratic Primary on May 6 and the General Election in November. The 17th Congressional District, which he represents, is composed of 31 Counties, covering approximately 30,000 square miles. Within this area live about 468,000 people.

Burleson says, "During my tenure of office I have followed two guiding principles: First to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our District, our State and our Nation.

Burleson termed his approach to Government as one of service. "I have tried to see that the people's tax money is spent as wisely and as judiciously as you would have spent it had you been in my place," he said.

"The record will show that a greater part of the time I have found myself in the minority in opposing the vast spending programs of doubtful value which have been put into effect in recent years. In every Session of the Congress the record will show my votes for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department and far less than actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense," Burleson said. He continued, "Without meaning to appear boastful, if the Congress had followed those of us who have 'common sense,' gained through the years of public voted consistently over the years for fiscal responsibility, our financial affairs would not be in the shape they are today."

"In areas providing for the defense of our Country, I have always supported those things

to make and keep our Nation stronger than any other in the world," he said.

"I have been discerning in separating those activities which the Federal Government was not designed to do, from those which are truly its responsibility," he said.

Burleson stated that activities of State and local governments, in accordance with the Constitution, should not be infringed and encroached upon by the Federal Government.

"The Federal Government does have specific missions," he said. He gave as examples the conservation of our natural resources, the defense of the Country and its general welfare.

"At the same time," he said, "the Federal Government can not and should not try to take care of everything from Washington. The Federal Government has grown to colossal proportions and centralized power in Washington has increased," Burleson pointed out. "To this, I am opposed and my record is clear in this respect."

Burleson is among the senior members of the U.S. House of Representatives in point of service. He was elected to the 80th Congress from the 17th District and has been re-elected to each succeeding Congress. He is a member of the Ways and Means Committee, considered to be the most powerful and prestigious in the Congress.

Burleson is a former County Attorney and County Judge of Jones County. He was appointed an FBI Agent, and served in a number of assignments of the U.S. He resigned from the FBI to join the Navy in World War II, and saw duty in both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

Burleson ended his formal announcement by saying, "Although not having opposition in this year's election, it is my hope to visit my constituency as opportunity affords. The Congress being in session at this time and expected to be long after the Primary Election, there will be little time to leave duties in Washington. I expect, however, to get back home at short intervals to do the best I can

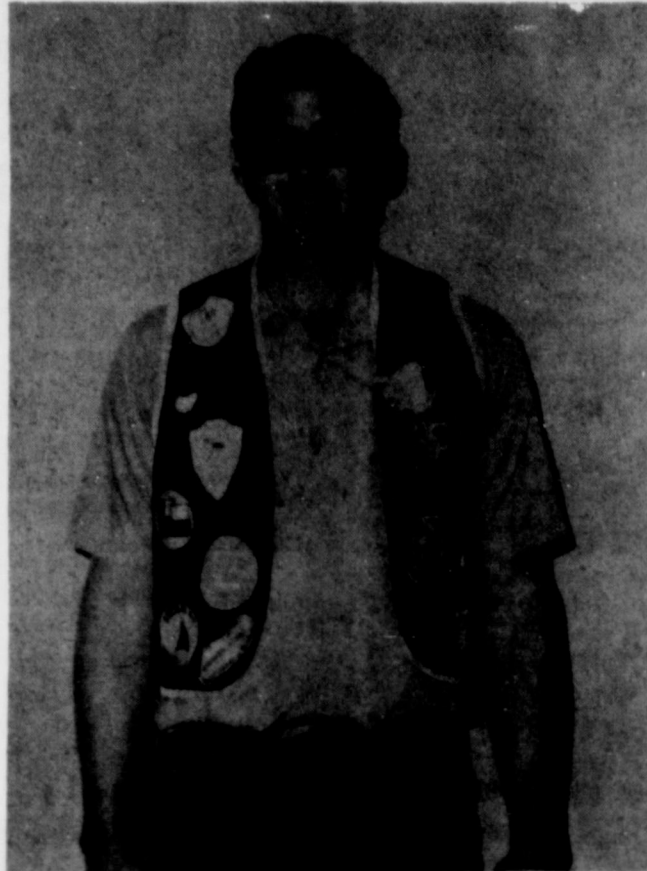

feet a year of the plant's output, with the some other nine million feet being marketed throughout the nation.

When the plant reaches full production, some 25 men will be employed permanently on three shifts a day operation, Mr. King, vice president and mill operator, reports.

The firm is F&K Tubing Inc. Mr. Fambro has been purchasing tubing for his gate business from as far as Shreveport and Chicago, and his gates are now marketed from Arizona to Florida.

The plant will cold roll the steel and welding will be by high frequency resistor welding, King said.

The company has a ten acre track out of the 34 acre industrial park, with the Eastland Industrial Foundation.

The tubing is also used for furniture manufacture, playground equipment and automobile exhaust pipes.

The mill proper will measure some ten feet wide, by ten feet high and some 58 feet long, with auxiliary welding, slitting, and other equipment.

The Cisco gate operation will be maintained there where from 15 to 20 men are presently employed, with no present plans for relocating, Mr. Fambro said.

The series will open on Saturday, May 27 with the traditional parade through the business district of Rising Star.

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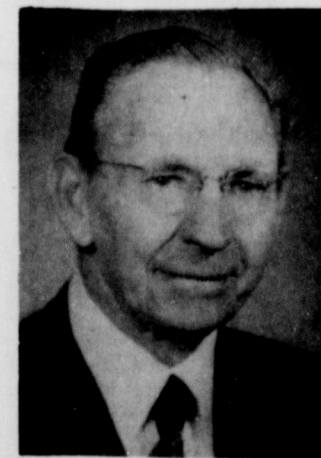

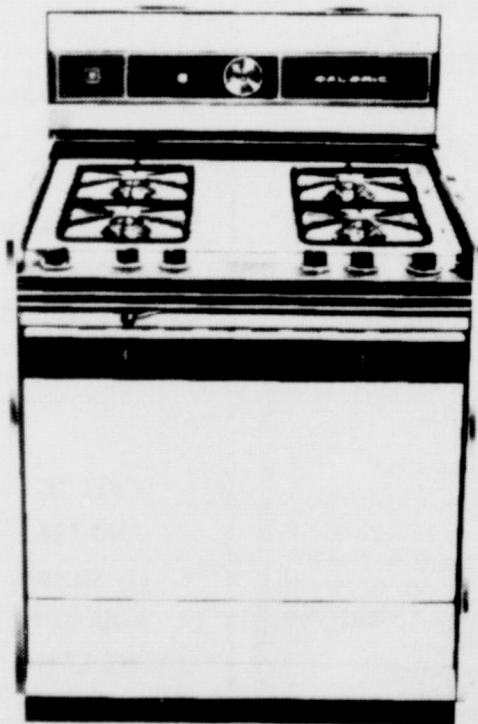

Waiting rooms, public toilets, dining facilities, recreation rooms, therapeutic rooms and room accommodations will be available without regard to race, color or national origin. This action will enable Eastland Memorial Hospital to continue receiving Federal funds necessary for operation.

The Board urges all public users and the employees of Eastland Memorial Hospital to cooperate in this program so that the transition will be smooth and we can continue our mission of serving the ill of our community.
