State Rep. Joe Hanna of Breckenridge says he is extremely pleased that newsmen have scrutinized House expense allowances, but wishes the reporters had dug a little deeper in the files.

Hanna, discussing an Associated Press release from Austin which stated he had purchased an \$82 - six - volume biography of Abraham Lincoln on his expense account, said House records plainly reflect that he has been one of the lightest spending legislators in

As of Monday morning, Hanna said he had built up a reserve of \$8,777.19 in unspent money in his expense account.

"I haven't had an opportunity as yet to check expense account expenditures of all members of the Legislature," Hanna said, but of the 32 freshmen members of the House only one has spent less money than I have, and he is from Austin and makes local telephone calls while mine are long distance." Hanna said he had great admiration for Lincoln.

"I think Abraham Lincoln was about the best speech writer who ever lived and I have tried to pattern my speeches after his style. It may not be the professional way to develop oneself as a public speaker, but I feel that it has helped me.
