County Judge Scott Bailey perfectly sat the mood during dedication services Sunday when he said that the City and the County must maintain the spirit of the library which has come to pass as the result of the hard work of members of the Thursday Afternoon Club.

Everyone is welcome to come in and visit and see the new facilities, President Mrs. Dan Childress said. "But we felt that it would be better to let Librarian Mrs. Trudy Cushman be about her regular library duties."

The building housing the new library once housed a super-market and meat processing plant, and was purchased in November, 1972, by the Thursday Afternoon Study Club for conversion into a new library.

In his address, Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey traced the history of the library system in Eastland from its beginning in the basement of the old Texas State Bank, in the early boom days before 1920, then through its frugal years in the Woman's Club building beginning in 1925, to its present location.

Invocation for the services was given by the Rev. Haston Brewer, pastor of Eastland's First Baptist Church.

Mrs. Childress, in dedicating the building said, "Dreams do come true, in eleven short months we have found out you can make a silk purse out of a sow's ear."

James Reid, vice president and comptroller of the Eastland National Bank, and fund drive chairman for the volunteer project, has estimated the value of the library at more than \$100,000.

The Thursday Afternoon Club, founded in 1901 as The Hawthorne Club, first began the library as a "project" in the residence of Mrs. J.L. Johnson, who was also its first librarian.

In 1916, the Hawthorne Club changed its name to The Thursday Afternoon Club and became affiliated with the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs.

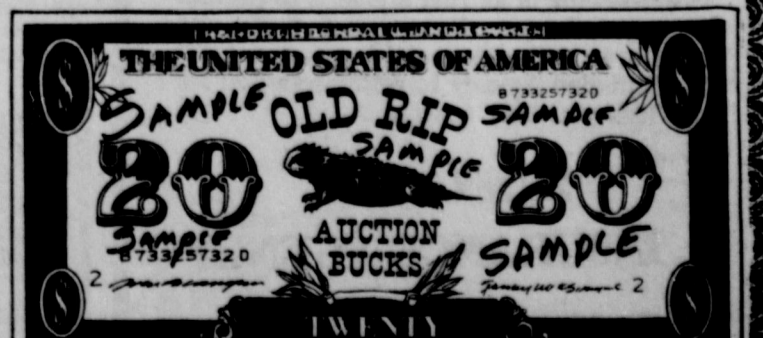

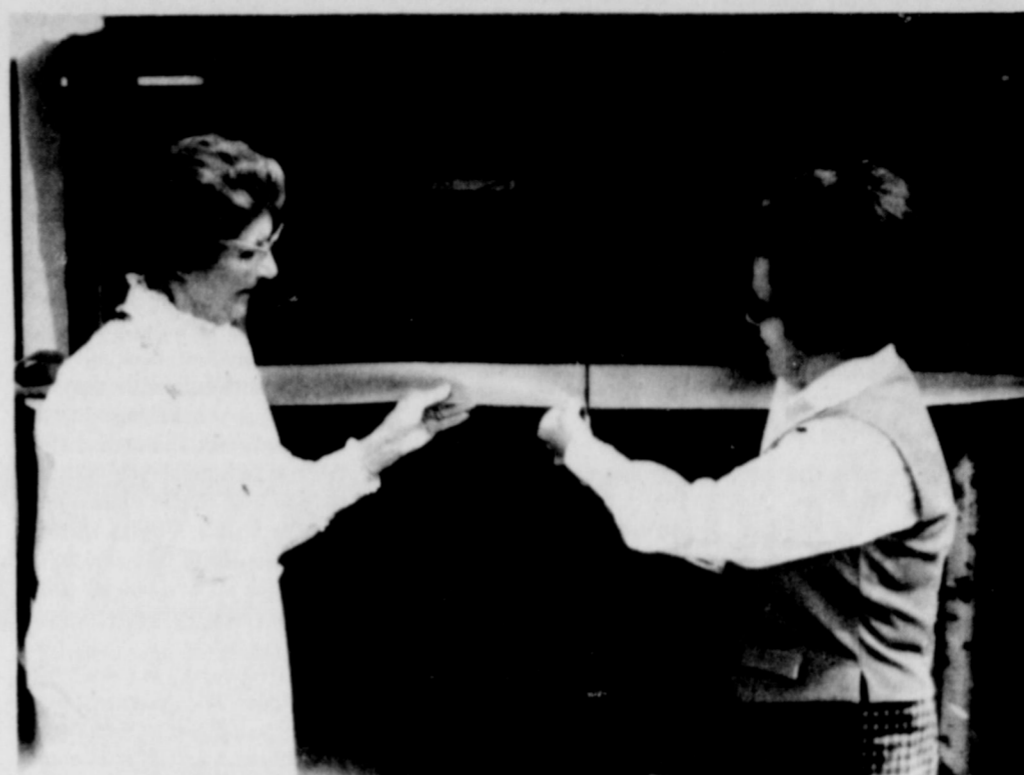

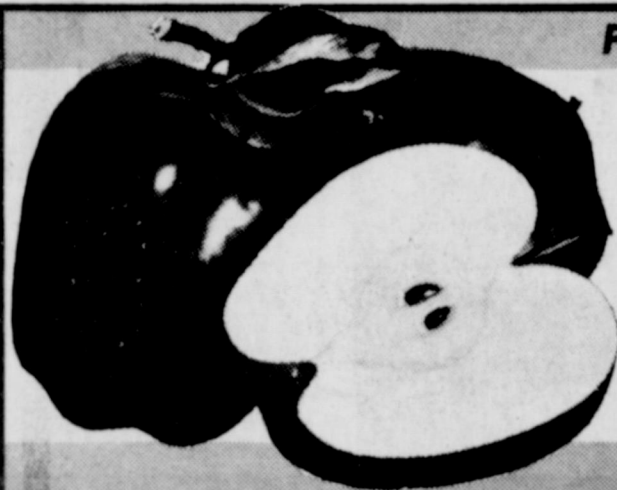

97 Counties Enter Food Stamp Program

The 97 Texas counties which converted to the Food Stamp Program on Oct. 1 represent the largest block of counties in one state to go into this U.S. Department of Agriculture food program at one time.

That's the report of Martin Garber, Dallas, West-Central regional administrator for USDA's Food and Nutrition Service. The Food Stamp Program is administered in Texas by the State Department of Public Welfare in cooperation with USDA.

The addition of these 97 counties brings the total number of Texas counties in the program to 139 - leaving 115 to enter the program on Nov. 1, at which time every county in the state will have food stamps available to its needy citizens. Eastland County begins the stamp program Nov. 1.

Under the food stamp plan, households spend a certain amount each month for food stamps, based on the number in the household, income,

resources and other factors. They then get additional stamps free of charge, increasing their food buying power.

Food stamps are then used like cash at local food stores, authorized by USDA to accept them.

Legislation recently passed by Congress will require this program to be operating in every "political subdivision" of a state by June 30, 1974.

DENVER, COLO. - - Dr. M.A. Treadwell attended the Annual Scientific Assembly of the American Academy of Family Physicians in Denver. The medical meeting began October 1 through October 4. More than 3,500 family doctors are participating in this once - a - year continuing education conclave.
