Acreage Reduction May Come To Reduce Surplus

The peanut program is getting in the same shape as the wheat and cotton programs, facing surplus problems which need to be solved in the near future, Ross Wilson told members of the Eastland Lions Club at their luncheon meeting Tuesday at Sledge's Restaurant.

About a third of the crop was surplus last year, he said, and this costs the American taxpayer some \$85 million, and one means of reducing this surplus is the voluntary reduction of

"This is a painful route, but perhaps the one we should be ttaking." Mr. Wilson said. "We're meeting in Dallas Thursday to consider the possibility of going to the Congress and requesting that assistance' be given in the voluntary reduction program." A 15 or so percent reduction would certainly help.

Another avenue being exfavorable to all is the distribution to Japan, West Germany and other European counties of surplus high quality peanuts. This country's peanut quality is the best in the world, he said, because we went into a voluntary quality control program several years ago.

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

Now Is Time To Control Casebearer

pecan nut casebearer in Eastland County.

Judging from the insect activity in pecan orchards and groves, County Agent, De Gordon predicts that May 17th through May 20th will be the best time to spray pecan trees.

Gordon emphasized that the insect development will vary from one place to another in the county. Growers should check their own trees for egg deposits and feeding of newly hatched larvae to determine the optimum time to spray. When one to two percent of the young nuts have been punctured by the casebearer it is time to spray, the agent said.

Gordon urged commercial pecan growers to have their sprayer and insecticides ready and make daily checks in the orchard or grove to observe egg deposits and feeding of the small worms.

Adult mothers deposit small eggs - barely visible to the naked eye on the tips of the pecans. Eggs hatch in four or five days and the young larvae migrate to buds below the nuts to feed. After a day or two, they enter the nuts at the base. The insecticide should be applied when a majority of the eggs are hatching and before the young worms enter the pecans.

The insecticides that can be used for the control of these casebearers are Guthion. Thiodan, Malathion, and Toxaphene. Use these insecticides according to directions given on the label of the container.

Through coverage is essential for the control of this insect. Be sure that the spray is

To get effective control a second spraying may be needed seven to ten days later.



By means of multimillion dollar transfers of State Deposits to Sharp's bank in the months preceding the loans to those involved in the bribery conspiracy, the State Treasurer put up what bankers refer to as the "compensating balances" for the loans.

'Almost the entire increase in total deposits at the Sharpstown State Bank as shown by that bank's Statement of Condition during the period preceding these political loans was attributable to the blatantly preferential treatment given Sharp by State Treasurer Jessie James.4

Throughout the period when Mutscher and the others borrowed hundreds of thousands from Sharp so that they could buy National Banker's Life Stock, Treasurer James maintained State Deposits at Sharp's suburban bank of \$10,034,875.00," Rep. Angly said

· Angly pointed out that these · deposits amounted to approximately one - seventh of the total deposits at the now defunct Sharpstown State

Ask any banker in Eastland County if he has ever heard of huge State Deposits and he will tell you that he hasn't ... no other bank in history ever received such preferential treatment from the State Treasurer of Texas.

'This sort of political preference in regards to State Deposits, in and of itself, is a gross abuse of discretion by Treasurer James.

"However, to most of us what is of more concern is that of James' mismanagement of State Deposits at Sharps bank the state lost over a million dollars in revenue.

'James deposited \$6,000,000 in the Sharpstown State Bank at 5 percent interest, but the balance, \$4,034,875, was left for well over two years sitting parked in a checking account earning no interest whatsoever.

The effective rate of interest James earned on State Deposits at Sharp's bank was only 2.93 percent when he could and should have earned the prevailing rate of 7 percent the difference amounts to over a \$1 million loss for the people of Texas," Rep. Angly said.

As your State Treasurer intend to put an end to such 'political preference' deposits of State Funds "All funds in excess of what is necessary to pay to our State's bills on a current basis should be in vested in interest bearing accounts earning revenue for the people of Texas.

Proper management of Treasury Deposits will produce an increase in state interest earnings of over \$10 million dollars a year...which means that we will need that much less in 1973." Rep. Angly concluded.
