Liquor Petition Asking All But Mixed Drinks Here

"FOR the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages except mixed beverages." and "AGAINST the legal sale of

all alcoholic beverages except mixed beverages." That's the proposition as set forth in the application for

petitions, calling for a local option election. As stated, such a proposition, if passed, would permit the

sale of all alcoholic beverages, and would permit package store operations and by-the-bottle sales to be drunk at

counters or tables - but not mixed drinks. Out-of-county reports have stated that the application asks for "off-premise consumption" but such is not the case. The only restriction on the application is no mixed drinks.

A dozen petitions are being circulated in Eastland and Olden seeking signers interested in holding an election for the legalization of the sale of all alcoholic beverages except mixed beverages in Justice Precinct One. Mr. H.A. Werley, 67, was

issued the petitions Tuesday morning after he presented his application Monday containing 14 signatures - four more than the required 10 - asking for the petitions. Each petition contains two pages and provides spaces for 40 signatures.

Mr. Werley by law has up to 30 days from Tuesday to return the petitions.

A minimum of 392 qualified signatures will be required.

If the petitions are returned in time, if the signatures are certified, the County Clerk will present them to the County Commissioners Court. Under state law, the court at its next regular session after receiving the petitions must then call for an election to settle the issue within 20 days and not more than 30 days.

Out-of-county publicity has been misleading in having stated that the proposition is "for off-premise consumption". There is no such designation on the application, indicating that the proponents of the effort are seeking an open-saloon result.

THERE IS rhyme and reason in those "little green posts" by the side of Interstate highways, you know. We'd thought they were mile posts, and they are, but we couldn't figure out from where to where. According to the Texas Highway Dept., the key directions are "south and west" - the mileposts are numbered in increasing order from the SOUTHERN and WESTERN ends of Interstate highways in Texas. The familiar little green signs with the white numbers can help a driver if his car breaks down or runs out of gas. The motorist can report the nearest milepost to a service station or garage. The Highway Patrol use the markers to pinpoint accidents and to describe accident locations - and the Department uses the reports to analyze highway hazards.

Milepost "O" on IH 35 is at the center of the Rio Grande at Laredo. The last milepost on IH 35 would be near the south end of the Red River Bridge north of Gainesville on the Texas-Oklahoma line, 504.33 miles from the Rio Grande.

IH 10 mileposts are numbered from the Texas-New Mexico state line near Anthony, north of El Paso. Mile 880.52 is in the center of the Sabine River Bridge near Orange at the Texas-Louisiana state line.

New markers will have "mile" written at the top with mileage numbers placed horizontally below. Current markers have only numbers. It is hoped that the addition of the word mile will ease the confusion as to what those "little green signs" mean.

Milepost markers will be coordinated with the new exit signs. New exit signs for the first time will carry exit numbers based on milepost numbers.

enter if they will be eight by Jan. 21, but those boys who will be 14 on Jan. 21 may not enter, he said. Proof of age will be necessary.

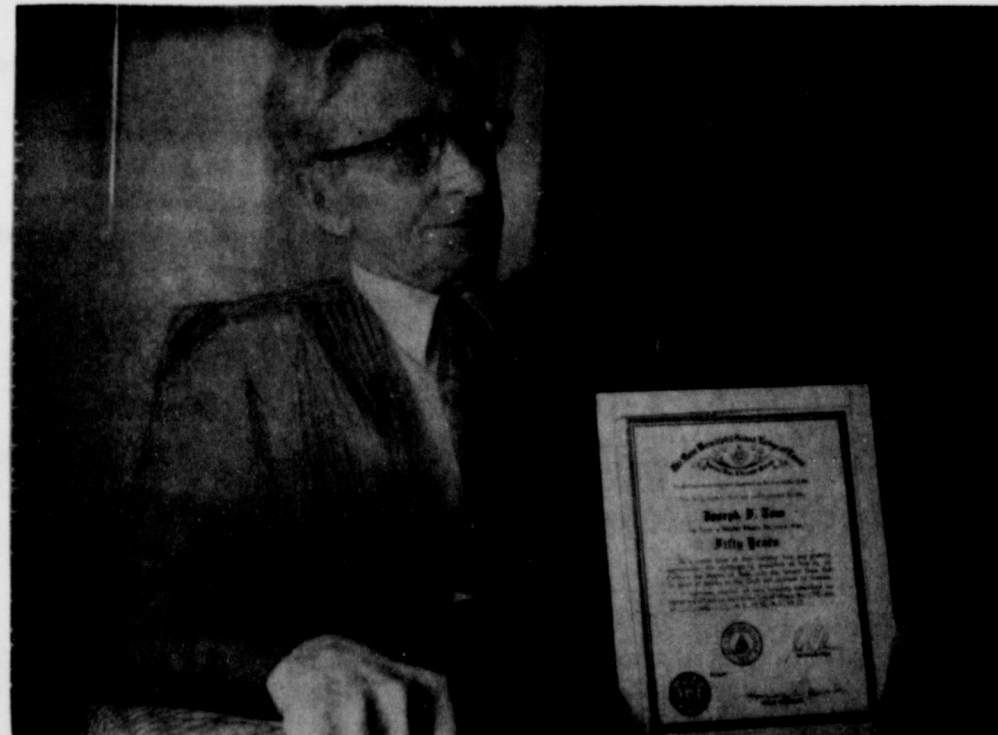

A new set of faces will storm Maverick Stadium Friday night when the Mavericks play host to the Olney Cubs in another non-conference grid tilt.

Kickoff time is 8 p.m. and Head Coach Clyde Evatt says his Mavericks are in "pretty good" shape and ready to go, except for the loss of Center Rex Boney, who is out from a shoulder injury of last Friday night.

"Olney is good," Coach Evatt says, "and in many ways they're a lot like Haskell. Olney quarterback Mike Pace is to the Cubs, what Young is to the Haskell Indians.

"We regret losing Boney," the coach said, "because he was one of our hardest workers and a real bonus to our team."

Boney was released from the hospital Monday but advised by physicians to avoid football for a while. Boney was injured in the DeLeon game, and in what surely must be one of the most coincidental events in high school football, the DeLeon center, Buzzy Mahan received a broken leg just a few plays after Boney was injured. Whittaker Wins Bid

DALLAS, TEXAS - - Whittaker Pipeline Constructors in Houston has been given a contract for an undisclosed amount to construct some 118 miles of Lone Star Gas Company's 400-mile, 36-inch pipeline from the Delaware Basin in West Texas to Dallas.

There were nine bids submitted for the job which will involve spreads four and five. Booth Services Inc. of Houston was given a contract in August for the first three spreads comprising more than 180 miles, and work has been underway since early this month.

Whittaker will use one crew which will begin ditching early next month. Completion of the two spreads is expected by January 15, 1973, and the first three spreads will be finished a month earlier.

Invitations on the sixth and final spread will be mailed soon with replies expected by mid-October. The entire pipeline is scheduled for completion by March 1, 1973.

Warnings Issued On Will Probates

Thousands of Texans have received letters or legal appearing documents recently stating that the sender has in his possession a copy of a will on an estate under probate. Usually these originate from an out of state source.

Of course the deceased has the same last name as the recipient. While there is usually some disclaimer such as "we are not attempting to state that the provisions set forth in said will have a reflection to you", just the opposite is clearly implied by the correspondence.

Typically the amount of the estate is not set forth but the impression is given that it is large. All of this conjures up a vision of inheriting a large sum of money from some unknown rich relative.

Not long ago thousands of families throughout the nation named Kelly received offers to provide information which could assist them in establishing a claim to an estate of more than \$50,000 left by a Mary Kelly.

An investigation disclosed that every Kelly listed in certain telephone books received the same offer. And while the cost for the information was only \$10, it still was a long shot bet that any of the Kellys contacted would be entitled to any money.

Just as in the Kelly case, operators of schemes such as this normally sell information to literally thousands of families, usually selected at random, with no thought or intention that they may in fact be in line to inherit anything of value.

The cost of these worthless papers normally range from about \$6 to \$12. For this reason many unknowing people are willing to take a chance and then are reluctant to complain when they find they have been cheated.

Remember, judicial authorities make a thorough search to determine the whereabouts of true missing heirs. If you are approached on a missing heir scheme, resist the urge to get something for nothing. Don't send your money. Instead, forward the letter to my Consumer Protection Division at P.O. Box 12548, Austin, Texas, 78757.

Highways Means Employment

Many of us that travel by highway are aware that a certain number of people are employed to plan and build highways and that industries normally locate in the general vicinity of a major highway. Few of us realize, though, that for every \$1 invested in highway improvements, there is \$7 spent in the general economy. This 7 to 1 ratio is divided into three basic categories. (1) Actual road materials, equipment, general supplies, fuel, etc., (2) consumer products purchased by wage earners involved in the building of highways, and (3) new developments along highways. This includes items such as motels, shopping centers, etc. Analyzing the effect of each of these items we can readily see that this 7 to 1 ratio is probably a very conservative assumption.

In Texas, for example, there are approximately 150 contractors engaged in the business of building roads. A normal dirt-moving operation

easily requires an investment of \$3 or \$4 million in equipment. We look at some of the people that the road contractor is required to do business with which ultimately has a substantial impact on our total economy. We can start with his basic office requirements and his office staff ranging in personnel from 5 people on up to hundreds of people. Normal office expenses are utilized such as furnishings, space, office machines and equipment, etc. We next look at his major investment which is equipment. It's hard to realize that the average piece of equipment used in construction cost \$80,000. Multiply that by 8, 10, 50, or 100 pieces, and you can see not only the cost involved, but also the number of people required to manufacture this equipment.

The contractor has day to day business with his banker, insurance company, fuel supplier, construction and other material suppliers including aggregates, concrete, lumber, etc. If you were to walk down the main street of any city in the United States, you would find that either the highway contractor or his employees utilize every business at one time or another. This covers everything from hardware stores to baby shoe stores.

Our second category which was entitled consumer products purchased by those in construction and related in-

dustries, carries an astronomical effect on our economy. First we must understand that almost one out of every five jobs is in the field of highway transportation - a total of almost 13.3 million jobs (taken from Highway Users Fact Sheet). Let's use Texas as an example of what we are talking about. Our Texas Highway Department employs over 20,000 people. If we were to add to that the number of people from related state agencies serving the Highway Department, we would increase the figure by several thousand. Highway contractors employ approximately 23,000 employees. Granted, all of these employees are not used exclusively on highway work but a great majority are. If we analyze the work force of the highway contractor, we find it is one of the largest employment sources for minority workers. Over 50 percent of highway contractor employees are members of a minority group. The highway contractors have trained minority and non-minority people at their own expense, even before training and equal employment opportunity became fashionable. A recent survey conducted by the Federal Highway Administration revealed that the minorities working in highway construction were not confined to lower paying skills. In every area of Texas there is a substantially greater percentage of minorities working in the highest paid skills in highway construction than there is a percentage of minorities living in that area.

The Federal Highway Administration conducted a survey of 136 highway projects as of June 30, 1972, to determine the type of training being conducted by contractors. The survey revealed that of 484 trainees receiving training on these projects, 107 were Negro, 5 Indian, 150 Spanish surname American, and 222 other. As you can see, over 50 percent are minority. Many of the minority trainees are being trained as equipment operators, carpenters and instrument men. We find that during the same quarter ending June 30, 1972, 84 trainees graduated - 45 of whom were minority.

The average construction worker will earn between \$7,000 and \$10,000 per year.

His hourly rate usually is not as great as some industries but he will normally work 10 hours a day affording him an opportunity to earn overtime wages. We find that construction workers and their families have a tremendous buying power which, of course, supports both our local and national economies.

The third impact highways have on the economy deals with side effects such as industry location resulting from either highway betterment or new highways. If you analyze any city you can see that this economic factor has been true since the beginning of highways. If you use Austin as an example, you can easily note that the old highway between Austin and San Antonio was the main location of manufacturers, motels, restaurants and gasoline stations. When Interstate 35 to San Antonio was completed, we find that new motels were constructed as well as new industries, new apartment houses, new gasoline stations, restaurants, etc. One of the fears that many cities had when the interstate program became a reality was that the local business located on former major highways would be forced to close because of lack of activity. We find, however, that these business establishments continued to thrive and we enjoy the economic impact of the new business.

Land values adjacent to interstate highways in particular show remarkable appreciation. For instance, land values at Denton averaged \$2,750 per acre prior to the construction of the interstate highway. Six years later land similarly situated cost an average of \$11,500 per acre or an increase of 318 percent. Normal appreciation would have averaged about 30 percent in such a period.

One of the functions of the various trade associations is to keep its membership advised of the potential market. If you were to go to the American Trucking Association to determine their views on highways you would find that trucking employs approximately 675,000 Texans. You would also find that they serve every city and town in Texas and that there are 1716 communities or 61 1/2 percent of the total that depend entirely on trucks for shipping service. The trucking industry payroll reaches the 4.4 billion dollar mark and their annual cash outlay for 1969 for new buses, trucks, trailers, etc. in Texas was \$577 million.

If we were to ask the Automobile Manufacturers Association about the importance of highways, we would find that 8.4 million passenger cars were sold in the U.S. during 1970. You would also find that in 1970 there were 90 million cars and 19 million trucks and buses registered in the U.S. The special state and Federal motor vehicle taxes paid in 1970 amount to \$17 billion. The automobile industry could, of course, give the same ripple effect figures for their industry by showing that they use 20 percent of the nation's steel and that over 800,000 business establishments depend on motor vehicle use.

Our vacation spenders certainly affect our overall economy. Last year a total of \$40 billion was spent for vacations. \$37 billion was spent traveling by automobile. Tourism is a major item to the Texas economy. Not many are aware that 15 million out-of-state and foreign visitors toured Texas by automobile in 1970. These out-of-state auto visitors normally spend over \$1 billion annually. The average tourist dollar is divided accordingly: food, 27 cents; lodging, 25 cents; auto, 23 cents; entertainment, 12 cents and other, 13 cents.

There are people throughout this nation that constantly question the need for highways or a highway program. When you look at the statistics behind our highway program, we find no logical reason to question
