## House Bill Would Increase Size Of 91st District Court

Representatives Paul Brashear of Cisco and Mack Allison of Mineral Wells have introduced House Bill 32 which would add Callahan County to the 91st District Court.

The Bill would also make a full-time Taylor County court out of the 42nd District Court, and would add Shackelford County to the 90th District Court. At present the 91st District Court is made up of only Eastland County, the 42nd District Court is made up of Taylor, Callahan and Shackelford counties and the 90th of Stephens and Young counties.

Judge Turner Collier of the 91st District Court has expressed support of Mr. Brashear's plan. He cited the growth of Abilene and the expected growth of Taylor County to 100,000 in the immediate future, as reason for making the 42nd fulltime in Taylor County.

Judge Collier said the arrangement is "able to all judges affected... 90 percent of the attorneys in the five counties." Mr. Brashear has already requested a hearing on the re-districting bill, but none has been set yet. He said he expects the date to wait on general judicial re-districting bill, H. P. 536, which has been introduced. Hearings on that are expected by sections of the state. Mr. Brashear expects hearing on his bill to come when that section of the general bill is set for hearing.

A companion bill introduced by Rep. Brashear—one which he said he would not push until and unless the re-districting bill is approved—would trim the powers of the county court of Callahan County, putting regular county, civil and criminal cases in the district court. That would put the county on the same setup Eastland County now operates under.

## National Guard Sets Weekend Training Period

The Cisco unit of the National Guard will not have its regular Thursday night drill this week; but will have a week-end training period Saturday and Sunday.

The unit is required to have six 8-hour drills each year to stress field training and marksmanship. This weekend will be the second such period for this battery and the last to be held in the immediate area. The next one will be scheduled sometime in May and conducted at battalion level on the Camp Bowie reservation at Brownwood.

# 150 Eastland Students May Get Polio Vaccine

## BREAKDOWN IS GIVEN OF ALL COUNTY TOWNS

A breakdown of Eastland County school children who will be eligible to receive the Salk polio vaccine in April if tests prove successful was made Thursday by Dr. L. C. Brown, county health officer.

Dr. Brown released figures showing just how many students in each county town will be eligible to take the tests if their parents agree.

A breakdown shows the following (all are first and second grade students):

Eastland: 74 first graders, 63 second graders and 13 Negro students; total 150.

Ranger: 95 first graders and 99 second graders. Total: 194.

Scranton: 25 students.

Carbon: 21 first graders and 20 second graders. Total: 41.

Desdemona: seven first graders and nine second graders. Total: 16.

Cisco: 72 first graders and 118 second graders. Total: 190.

Gorman: 28 first graders and 30 second graders. Total: 58.

Rising Star: 40 first graders and 41 second graders. Total: 81.

Olden: 12 first graders and 11 second graders. Total: 23.

## For Peanut Planting

# Farmers Face Seed Shortage

Eastland County peanut farmers still faced with a critical seed shortage for spring planting.

"The shortage is critical enough that some farmers are going to have to do without seeds," T. C. Wylie, owner of Ranger Peanut Co., said today.

Wylie said that shellers who were holding seed for future planting were selling their supply to confection and peanut butter buyers because of the prices that had been created by the demand.

This supply was visible at the time of last year's harvest and was expected to be held over for planting this spring when a seed shortage had already been predicted.

The sale of the seed supply only magnified the problem. Wylie said that he expected seeds to go as high as 35 cents per pound.

Even with the shortage in nuts here, the government has flatly stated that acreage allotments will not be increased this year. However, the president last week issued a proclamation allowing the importation of 51 million pounds of nuts from foreign countries.

The government has put a deadline of June 30 on delivery in the U. S. Most of these will come from Mexico and a minor portion from India.

Greatest percent allotted importation has been contracted and it is not expected to have any appreciable effect on the present price structure.

Those that are imported from foreign countries are not suitable for planting here as they are not adapted to climates in the United States.

Despite the importation the peanut industry is experiencing a severe strain on supply and the critical demand for seeds.

Even with the shortage on seeds, a large crop of peanuts is expected to be planted over the county as well as the entire south-west this year as it will be the last year that the nuts will draw 87 1/2 percent parity. In 1956 parity will be limited to 75 percent and decreased every year thereafter.

The large planting acreage is expected despite the amount of inferior seeds that will have to be utilized. Wylie said that nearly all seeds would be inferior to those of previous years because of the drought conditions that have prevailed here for the past few years.

Wylie warned that most shellers are having to dispose of their seeds on a first-come-first-served basis because of the limited supply, and that farmers who will need seeds later should book their orders with their seed dealers.

# County Gets Two New Oil Strikes

Two new oil strikes were reported in Eastland County this week. One strike was posted six miles northeast of Cisco and the other five miles northwest of Okra.

T. A. Kirk & H. L. Neeb, operating from Abilene, have a prospective discovery from a Strawn sand six miles northeast of Cisco in Eastland County.

It is their No. 1 Alvin Kinkaid, Section 52, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

No. 1 Kinkaid has been swabbing and flowing eight barrels of oil per hour from an open hole at 1,766-71 feet. It is being completed natural.

Potential has been taken at a discovery from a Strawn sand five miles northwest of Okra. It is Gilchrist Drilling Co., Abilene, No. 1 O. G. Joiner, Section 35, John Sayers Survey.

The well has been placed in Eastland County Regular Field for proration purposes.

No. 1 Joiner has a daily potential of 48.72 barrels of 41 gravity oil and 5 per cent water. Flow was through a 14-64 inch choke with packer set on the casing and 110

pounds tubing pressure. Production is from 40 perforations at 1,456-61 feet. Having a gas-oil ratio of 370-1, the well is bottomed at 1,583 feet.

An oil discovery from the Mississippi has been potentialized seven miles northwest of Gorman in Eastland County. It is J. E. Conally & Earnest Callahan of Abilene No. 2 S. L. Snider, B. F. Smith Survey, A-567.
