Thursday, September 21 City Closes 'Utility Session For Awhile, Hopefully

The Eastland City Commission hopefully put its public utility tramas behind it at the regular Monday evening a meeting and launched into \$1,100 projects for the future in-2,000 cluding development of new housing west of town

After a five - month discussion, the City passed on 1,000 second reading, an ordinance granting Lone Star Gas Co. permission to raise rates by eight percent. This will go into effect in 30 days and will result in an average increase of 57c per month to the average residential user, Local Manager D.L. May reports.

In other utility action, the commission "removed" the six months stipulation and gave a second reading to an ordinance asking for toll - free dialing between Cisco and - or Ranger. This will take some 18 months. Local Manager John McGowan reports. The measure has been given final approval in Cisco, but lacks passage in Ranger to become effective. Peanut Bowl meetings, buried the Rangers again Saturday night, this time by a 22-0

But the game itself was an unbelievable, sometimes comical, sometimes frustrating series of events which would defy the imagine of an imaginative fiction write.

When it was all over, the game had produced an amazng 14 turnovers - nine of em by the Rangers, who lost six of umpteen fumbles and threw away three more in the air. Cisco managed to hold it down to four fumbles and an interception.

In the bizarre first half the Rangers had 135 yards total offense to Cisco's 70. Ranger had a 51-yard punt return and several other plays that came within inches of breaking the distance. Still, the score was 15-0, Cisco. It takes a bit of head scratching to figure out how that happened.

You can start with the first four fumbles which the Rangers lost during the opening 30 minutes. This doesn't take into consideration several others which caused the Ranger offense to take several steps hackwards

At any rate, nothing came of it. Cisco had a 25-yard field goal stray to the right. Of course, it didn't go into the end zone. Ranger wound up with it at the seven - and promptly fumbled when Glenn Printers' halfback pass to Dorsey McGuire was good, only to be fumbled by Mc-Guire.

It didn't matter. Cisco fumbled it right back, and Ken Robinson recovered for Ranger. This just allowed the Rangers to sever another artery. On fourth down Jim Whitley's punt was blocked by Alvin Walker, plucked out of the air by Rickey Parr-who proceeded into the end zone for a touchdown with 55 seconds left

Mark Johnson, who had earlier kicked a 31-yard field goal, missed the PAT. It was 15-0, and that's the way it stayed until the second half.

Cisco scored its first three points at the 7:04 mark of the second quarter. Prior to that. Ranger had seen Dean Zachary's field goal attempt blocked from 27 yards out. Ranger then held Cisco only to fumble away a 43-yard punt when Joshua Thomas failed to hold on to the football.

Cisco responded, covering the football at the Ranger 20. After one first down the Rangers settled for Johnson's 31yard field goal.




