Mavericks Shellac Bulldogs, 36-0. Face DeLeon Here Next Friday

The Eastland Mavericks went on a rampage in Bulldog Stadium Friday night to defeat the Ranger Bulldogs 36 to 0 in a non-conference grid match.

The Mavs received the opening kick-off to score on their first play of the game on a 67 yard scamper by tailback Tony Thomas for the first touchdown of the evening for the Big Red. Thomas took the ball from quarterback John Jimenez on the Mav 34 yard line and hit the middle of the Bulldog line like a Sherman tank and found running room to be credited with the longest run of the night for the Mavs. Thomas again took the ball from Jimenez and hit the right side of the line for two extra points to give the Mavs a quick 8-0 lead.

The Bulldogs were unable to move the ball on their first series of plays and were forced to punt to the Mavs. Eastland took the ball on their own 28 yard line and moved the ball back into Ranger territory with all-state Howard King carrying the ball eight times. Thomas and Larry Boles each handling the ball once to put the ball inside the Ranger five yard line before Howard fumbled to stop the powerful scoring attack.

Ranger again was held with no gain and booted the ball back to the Mavs on the 42-yard line where Thomas picked up 21 yards for Eastland down inside the 20 that gave the Mavs time for one more play before the first quarter ended.

On the second play of the second quarter the Mavs were in excellent scoring position with a first and goal from the nine yard line as Jimenez, on a keeper play, hit the right side of the Bulldog line and raced in for the score. Thomas, on a pitch-out from Jimenez also hit the right side for two extra points to give the Mavs a 16 point lead.

The Bulldogs took possession of the ball on their 33 yard line and moved down to the Mav's 8 before losing the ball on an attempted screen pass.

Eastland took the ball on their 15 yard line with King and Thomas exchanging plays to place the ball on the Bulldog 30 yard line. Jimenez hit Larry Barnes with a 17 yard line to move the Mavs farther down the field and connected on a 16 yard aerial to Garry Barnes to set the Mavs up once again in scoring territory. Jimenez hit the right side of the Bulldog line for 15 more yards then called on King for nine more yards in two plays to set up a third and goal situation from the Dog five yard line. From that point King hit the right side of the Bulldog line again for the touchdown. King again hit the right side for two extra points to end the scoring of the first half.

Following a scoreless third quarter the Mavs were in scoring position with a second and goal from the two yard line and took two plays to score as quarterback Terry Ensor gave the ball to Larry Boles for the scoring chores. A two point pass attempt failed.

With 3:48 remaining in the game Ensor called on tailback Russell Smith for an 18 yard run for the final score of the night for the Mavs. The point after attempt by Thomas failed.

The Bulldogs took possession on their own 35 yard line and moved the ball to the Mav 20

where quarter David Graham hit the airways only to have his pass intercepted in the end zone by a Mav defender to stop a Bulldog drive.

Outstanding defensive players for the Mavs were Rex Boney, Ralph Harrison and Leo Gaeta. Playing outstanding defensively for the Bulldogs were Mike Myers, Randy Fambro, James Battles and Wendell Tipton.

Next week the Bulldogs will be playing the Dublin Lions in Dublin. Game time is set for 8 p.m.

It was a brand new outlook in Ranger Friday night as the powerful Eastland Mavericks put themselves back into the winning columns where they belong, by downing the hapless Bulldogs, 36-0.

Coach Clyde Evatt played every suited Maverick in the scoring marathon that saw touchdowns in three quarters, and gave the Mavericks their much-needed feel of being on the winning side again.

It was a practice workout for the Mavericks as Coach Evatt and Assistants Doug Dallas and Don Adair moved players around to test the best combinations.

Starting was Quarterback John Jimenez. Back-Up man Terry Ensor came on in the second to call the signals.

It was a jolting bolt to the Ranger fans when their Bulldogs kicked off to the Mavericks, only to see Eastland might in the first play of their opening series. Tailback Tony Thomas, a threat in anybody's book, took and scampered 67 yards for the first score on the initial play. Extra-point run was good, for 8-0 in the first stanza.

It was a shut-out in store for Ranger.

Gordon pot

Peach production offers a good potential income for Eastland County land owners. Texas growers produced a large crop of peaches this year, but they did not supply the demand for peach in Texas. Out of - State peaches are brought into Texas each year to

help supply the demand. We have excellent soil and climate for peach production in Eastland County. Someone interested in fruit production could supplement their income by planting fruit orchards. A good start in this direction would be to attend the annual

conference of the Texas Peach and Plum Growers Association. It will be held September 26th and 27th at Texas A&M University in the Memorial Student Center.

A number of very interesting and educational topics will be discussed during the meeting. Topics will include trickle irrigation, fruit thinning, disease control, marketing or the wholesale and retail producers, a look at certain other promising fruits and several others. Much of the afternoon of the 26th will be devoted to viewing commercial exhibitors' equipment and

products.

Apples also offer a good income potential. This will also be discussed at the conference. Several apple orchards have been planted in the Texas Hill Country.

Although small grain planting time is just around the corner, there's still time to get a soil test on the land to be seeded.

Small grains cannot be expected to perform well when grown with inadequate amounts of plant nutrients.

Many producers apply nitrogen in the fall or as a

topdressing in the spring but do not consider other nutrients that small grain crops may need.

Small grains are very responsive to phosphorus and only a soil test can determine the amount to apply. Phosphorus stimulates rapid, early growth which is especially important in the crops are to be grazed. Phosphorus should be drilled at planting or broadcast and worked into the soil prior to seeding.

Some fields may also need potash which improves the standing ability of plants.

However, this plant nutrient is generally not needed as often as nitrogen and phosphorus.

A soil test is the best guide to a sound fertilization program for small grains. Soil samples may be submitted to soil testing laboratories run by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at College Station, Lubbock and Seymour.

Information sheets and instructions for collecting and mailing soil samples are available at the County Extension office.

Turkey producers have been mailed ballots to elect five

members to serve six year terms on the Texas Turkey Producers Board. If there are any turkey producers who did not receive a ballot they may pick up one in our office.

Pecan producers will soon be mailed ballots to decide if they want to have a check-off program to finance research, promotion and education. Producers of turkeys, peanuts, cotton, and grain sorghum already have the check-off program.

Tire Data You'd Like to Know Is Now Available

Washington, D.C. - A lot of information you always wanted to know about tires, but didn't know whom to ask, is now available from the Tire Industry Safety Council in a new edition of the Consumer Tire Guide.

The 16 - page Guide containing tips on tire care, selection, safety and mileage can be obtained free of charge by writing to: Tire Safety, Box 726, New York, New York 10010. Include a stamped, self-addressed envelope.

The recently revised Guide includes a reminder that new tire buyers should "be sure seller records your name, address and tire identification number as required by Federal law."

U.S. Department of Transportation regulations require that all tires made after May 22, 1971 be registered where they are sold.

The information enables manufacturers to contact buyers in case any safety defect is later discovered in tires of that production run.

Fully illustrated, the Guide describes the basic tire constructions, and explains the meaning of size designations and information listed on the sidewall.

The new orange and black edition also contains inflation and load tables for current domestic passenger tire sizes and most sizes on popular imported cars.

Safety information includes tips on checking tread depth, identifying abnormal tread wear, and avoiding tire injuries.

Diagrams are used in explaining the dangers of underinflation and overinflation, and the problems of excessive

heat buildup in tires. Guidelines for increasing tire life and adjusting properly to foul weather road conditions are also offered.

The Guide is published in cooperation with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, the American Automobile Association, the

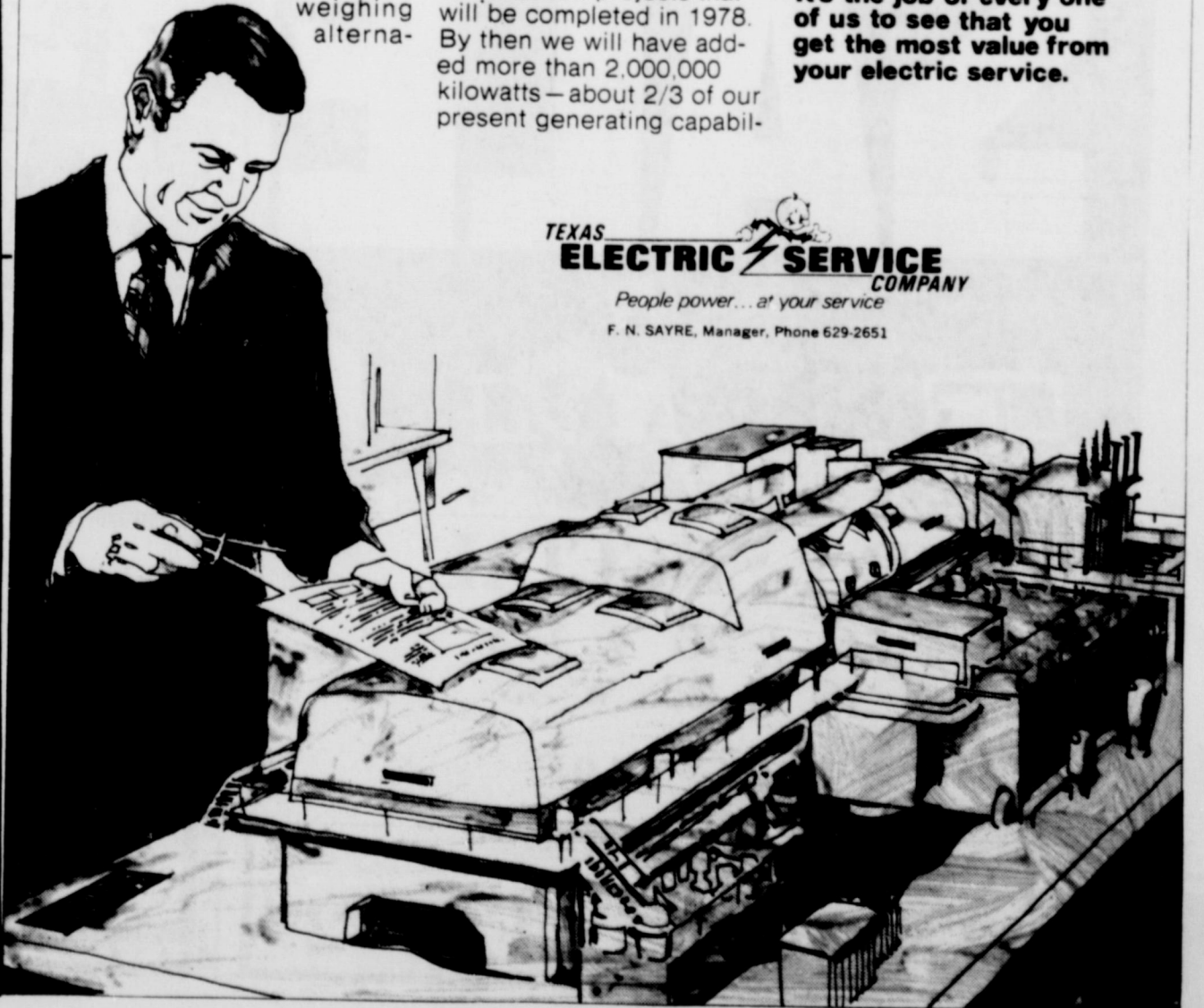

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS, ESTABLISHING PROCEDURES FOR THE ABATEMENT AND REMOVAL OF JUNKED VEHICLES OR PARTS THEREOF, AS PUBLIC NUISANCES, FROM PRIVATE PROPERTY OR PUBLIC PROPERTY; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE TO THE OWNER OR OCCUPANT OF THE PREMISES; PROVIDING FOR PUBLIC HEARING; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE TO TEXAS HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT, DESIGNATING EMPLOYEES ENTITLED TO ADMINISTER ORDINANCE; DESIGNATING VEHICLES TO WHICH ORDINANCE SHALL NOT APPLY; AND PROVIDING THAT VEHICLES SHALL NOT BE RECONSTRUCTED.

WHEREAS, the State of Texas has in House Bill 1181 declared certain junked vehicles to be a public nuisance, and

Eastland, Texas, in accordance with the provisions set out in Section 10 of such Bill desires to enact an ordinance establishing procedures for the abatement and removal of junked vehicles or parts thereof, as public nuisances, from private property or public property;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS:

Section 1. Notice. That notice stating the nature of the public nuisance shall be given by certified or registered mail with a 5 day return requested to the owner or the occupant of the premises whereupon such public nuisance exists. That such notice shall also state that such public nuisance must be removed and abated within 10 days of receipt of such notice and that any request for a public hearing thereon must be made before the expiration of such 10 day period. That if the notice is returned undelivered by the United States Post Office, official action to abate said nuisance shall be con-

tinued to a date not less than 10 days from the date of such return.

Section 2. Public Hearing. That when a public hearing is requested by the owner or occupant of the premises on which said vehicle is located within 10 days after the service of notice to abate said nuisance a public hearing shall be held before the City Commission or any other board, commission or official of the City, as designated by the City Commission prior to the removal of the vehicle or part thereof as a public nuisance. That any order created requiring the removal of the vehicle or part thereof shall include a description of the vehicle, and the correct identification number and license number of the vehicle, if available at the site.

Section 3. Notice to Texas Highway Department. That notice shall be given to the Texas Highway Department within 5 days after the date of removal of the vehicle or part thereof identifying the vehicle or part thereof in order that said Department can cancel the certificate of title to such vehicle.

Section 4. Employees Entitled to Administer Ordinance. That this ordinance may be administered by any regularly salaried, full time employees of the City of Eastland, except that the removal of the vehicle or parts thereof from property may be by any other duly authorized person.

Section 5. Nonapplicability of Ordinance. That this ordinance shall not apply to (1) a vehicle or part thereof which is completely enclosed within a building in a lawful manner where it is not visible from the

Section 6. Vehicle Not To Be Reconstructed. That after a vehicle has been removed it shall not be reconstructed or made operable.
