

weather, the over all yields of in the peanut field. "The thing" peanuts, grain, sorghum, was a special made peanut thrasher and was designed by Agricultural Engineers at Texas A&M. Its purpose was to thrash green peanuts from small plots immediately after

being dug.

We were harvesting a nut grass control demonstration northeast of Gorman. The thrasher is not one that peanut growers will want to buy. It does its job very slowly and requires about five men to operate. After each 30 foot, one row plot was harvested, the peanuts were put in a bag that identified its treatment. The peanuts were taken to Texas A&M where they will be dried, examined, cleaned, and weighed. The nuts will be checked for residues that might be left by the chemicals. Many of the chemicals used in the owners in the First State Bank demonstration tests are experimental and have not been cleared for commercial use.

> Nut grass is one of the most difficult grasses to control and it is becoming a major problem in peanut fields. While we didn't set any harvesting records, we hope this research work will help local peanut growers solve one of the many peanut production problems.



# Steven Zell To Be Featured

Mr. Steven Zell, organ virtuoso, will be presented in concert at Cisco Junior College on Tuesday evening, October 17, as the second program in the CJC 1972 - 73 ARTS AND HUMANITIES SERIES. Mr. Zell's concert, played on the college's Rockwell Memorial Organ, is set for 8:00 p.m. in the Harrell Fine Arts Auditorium, and there will be no charge for admission.

Mr. Zell, a new member of the music faculty of Cisco Junior College this year, is one of the country's very prominent young organists. He was a student of Earnest White at Butler University in Indiana, where he was a Magna cum Laude graduate (meaning graduated "with high honor"). Zell did his graduate work at Southern Methodist University where he studied under Dr. Robert Anderson. He won - - both for academics and musicianship - - including possible exception of the memberships in Blue Key, Phi Kappa Phi, and Pi Kappa Lambda. He holds two Masters

Degrees from SMU - - Master of Sacred Music and Master of Music Education. He had a two - year scholarship through the Perkins School of Theology awarded for academic excellence and he also received a

scholarship from Choristers' Guild for the study of church music

Even though he is only 24 years of age. Zell has been a featured concert organist on numerous occasions both in the Indianapolis area and in the Dallas area and also under the auspices of the American Guild of Organists. Some of his concerts have been church or cathedral recitals.

Professor Wyley Peebles, head of the Fine Arts Department of CJC, is in charge of arrangements for the concert. and the organ used will be the Rockwell Memorial Organ, a Baldwin C - 600 console valued at approximately \$20,000. which was a gift to the college in 1969 by the Rockwell Foundation in Houston Peebles stated that it was doubtful that instrument had ever been played to its full technical and musical potential since its installation, with the dedicatory concert given by Bene Hammil of the Baldwin company on December 8, 1969. "Mr. Zell will demonstrate the organ's versatility in practically every respect," Peebles said, "and all of us connected with the concert are looking forward to it with great ex-






