
Services For Kaleb **Musick Held Oct. 3**

Kaleb Musick, age 73, died October 1, in Hamilton following a sudden illness.



Texas Star is distributed by leading Texas Sunday newspapers and is seen by more than four million persons, so Eastland's uniquely beautiful, and beautifully unique Stamp Mural Window is now known from border to border, and will undoubtedly from now on, be a major attraction to visitors to this town.

Entitled "Stamping Out a Masterpiece", the article tells of Mrs. Johnson's labor of love in constructing the 6 by 10 foot stamp mural which contains 11,271 postage stamps at a cost of \$12,500. Value of the window today, as with any masterpiece of art, is incalculable

Certainly Democracy is doing its thing any time voters mark ballots.

The question comes now whether the City Commission might have been badgered into a precedent setting pattern that might not be in the best interests. Malingered though it may be, and perhaps too often labeled out - dated, Eastland's venerable charter, to those who are familiar with it, provides machinery for an orderly approach to such matters. This city's founders saw the wisdom in setting forth systems of order. They reasoned and so wrote that if one - third of the qualified voters in Eastland were so inclined to special issues of this type, then they must petition the commission for such election. The charter provides that when these qualifications are met, the commission SHALL, not may, call such an election.





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91st Jury Sentences Powers To 101 Years

An 11 - member 91st District Court Jury took 38 minutes to assess Harold Ray Powers 101 years punishment for murder. The trial began last week

when another jury ruled that Powers was sane and should stand trial. The 91st Courtroom with Judge Earl Conner Jr. presiding, was full of spectators during most of the week, with the conclusion Monday.

The jury returned its punishment sentence at 4:20 p.m. after receiving the case at 12:55 p.m. and returning its guilty verdict at 2:15 p.m. Powers, 25, was convicted of murdering Gordon G. Bengston, 42, of Far



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

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

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In fact, in many countries, dis enting opinions are simply not allowed. Once a majority decision is reached, dissenters are expected to keep their views to themselves.

But on our Supreme Court, public dissent has a long and respectable history. It has been a regular feature of the Court ever since 1806, when a holdout justice voiced his disagreement with Chief Justice John Marshall.

One great virtue of this right of dissent ("the only thing that makes life tolerable," said Justice William O. Douglas) is that it may help shape the law of the future. Major changes in the law, including even amendments to the Constitution, have had roots in earlier dissenting opinions from the Court. Still, dissents, if overdone, can


needlessly weaken both public understanding and public acceptance of a Court ruling. At least, say critics, a judge should not dissent merely because of minor disagreement or personal pride. Statistics do show that rela-

tively few of the dissenting opin-ions — even those of Oliver Wendell Holmes, the "Great Dissenter" - have ever become the law of the land.

Is it surprising that dissents occur so often? Not when one con-siders the kind of questions the Court must answer. Almost always, they are questions on which even the wisest and fairest of men may differ. The easy ones just never reach the Court at all.

A RESOLUTION AND ORDER by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Eastland, Texas, calling a bond election to be held within said City, making provision for the conduct of the election and other provisions incident and related to the purpose of this resolution and order; and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, this Board of Commissioners deems it advisable to call a bond election for the purpose hereinafter mentioned; and,

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners considers that it is to the best interest of the City and its inhabitants that the City provide funds for such \$215,000 COMMUNITY

purpose at the earliest possible date, thereby creating an emergency measure for the immediate preservation of the public peace, property, health and safety, and providing for the usual daily operation of a municipal department; now, therefore.

> BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 31st day of October, 1972, which date is not less than fifteen (15)-nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption hereof, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

PROPOSITION

"SHALL the Board of Commissioners of the City of Eastland, Texas, be authorized to issue TWO HUNDRED FIFTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$215,000) general obligation bonds of said City for the purpose of making permanent public improvements, to wit: the construction and equipment of a Community Center and Library Building: said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed forty (40) years from their date, to be issued and sold at any price or prices and to bear interest at any rate or rates as shall be determined within the discretion of the Board of Commissioners at the time of issuance; and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to creat a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

SECTION 2: That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with the V.A.T.S. Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid proposition which shall be set forth in substantially the following form:

PROPOSITION "THE ISSUANCE OF

Announcing

BUILDING GENERAL **OBLIGATION BONDS"** The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to

appear on the left of the proposition. A square shall be printed o the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAIN-ST", and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating

the way he wishes to vote.

SECTION 3: That said election shall be held at the CITY HALL, 416 South Seaman Street, in said City, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct for said election.

> SECTION 4: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the

election: MRS. MARCUS ODELL Presiding Judge MILTON UN-DERWOOD Alternate Presiding Judge

The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) nor more than six (6) qualified clerks to serve and assist in holding said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of the clerks.

On election day the polls shall be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00

Absentee voting shall be conducted at the City Clerk's office in the City Hall, in accordance with the provisions of V.A.T.S. Election Code, health and safety, and Chapter 5.

SECTION 5: All resident qualified electors of the City, including those who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be permitted to vote at said election. That at said election two separate ballot boxes shall be provided at the polling

place. In one box only resident qualified electors who own 1972. taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote. In another box all resident

CENTER AND LIBRARY qualified electors (who are otherwise qualified but do not own taxable property which has been duly rendered for taxation) shall be allowed to vote. The votes cast in each of said boxes shall be recorded, returned, and canvassed in such manner as will reflect separately the votes cast by the qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation from the votes cast by all qualified electors (including those who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the

same for taxation).

SECTION 6: That a substantial copy of this resolution and order shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice shall be posted in the election precinct or precincts and at the City Hall not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in said City, published therein, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

SECTION 7: That the public importance of this measure and the fact that it is to the best interest of the City to provide funds for the purpose of making said improvements in and for said City at the earliest possible date, create an emergency and an urgent public necessity for the immediate preservation of the public peace, property, providing for the usual daily operation of a municipal department, requiring that this resolution and order be

passed as an emergency measure, and such resolution and order is accordingly passed as an emergency measure, and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.




