LITTLE NOTED, but important days ahead: Thursday, Nov. 9: on this date in 1921, the Unknown Soldier of World War I lay in state in the Capitol Rotunda; Saturday, Nov. 11, traditional Veteran's Day, on that date in 1918, WWI Armistice signed.

BEST STORY of the week, or year, perhaps:

That of an Eastland woman visiting in Austin. She and companions driving out of a residential drive enroute to a downtown Austin shopping site, accidentally ran over a cat. Woman - like and in a hurry, they decided to put the cat in a shopping bag that happened to be in the car, to be disposed of later.

Downtown and in a hurry to get to a particular sale, they rolled the car window down so the air stayed fresh and they would dispose of the bag and cat later.

Coincident No. One. Returning later from their shopping, they observed a woman near the car, and from a distance, actually saw her reach into the window and steal the shopping bag. Naturally they followed her a bit.

She went into a cafeteria, and since it was near noon anyway, they decided to have lunch and see what happened to their shopping bag. Seated and relatively near the bag snatcher, they watched as she oh-so-cautiously peeked into her loot. Well, the shock you can imagine, but it was more than that to the woman.

She fainted. Dead away, and not immediately revivable. The Eastland woman and friends watched as attendants worked with the woman. Finally an ambulance was called and the first aid experts carefully loaded the woman on a stretcher, and just as carefully placed the shopping bag, presumed to be her own special treasures, on top of her.

The last thing the locals saw was when the stretcher, woman, bag, cat and all went out the door and screamed away to an Austin hospital.

One can but imagine what happened later. At the hospital, suppose the admittance clerk asked: "Ma'am, may we check your belongings in the safe?"

County Votes Nixon, Tower, Hanna, Briscoe, 9 Amends

A total of 5,985 Eastland Counties marked ballots in the General Election Tuesday, and joined the Mainstream of America on most counts. A goodly number "went fishing" . . . With 9,374

registered, 3,389 didn't take the bother to cast votes. The percentage of qualified voters making the effort was 63.5 percent of the eligible. And it was shades of 1952, all over again.

President Nixon carried every box in the county, with a total vote of 4,106 to McGovern's 1,629. And the county joined the state in re-electing Sen. John Tower in every box, with the

exception of Rising Star, which carried by Sanders. Tower got 3,201 and Sanders, 2,563. In the state governor's race which was still in question statewide at press time, Eastland County collectively

went for Democrat Dolph Briscoe, who carried every box in the county. Briscoe got 3,186 and Grover, 2,395. HANNA RE - ELECTED Eastland County certainly helped State Rep. Joe Hanna be

re-elected, giving him 4,113 to Jack Hetzel's 1,706 in this county. Complete unofficial returns show the district returns. Palo Pinto: Hanna, 4,576; Hetzel, 1,729. Stephens: 2,443; 476. Jack: 1,523; 869. Montague: 2,380; 958. Eastland: 2,380; 1,706. Total: Hanna, 15,035; Hetzel, 5,738.

Rising Star, 709 voted; 1,210 registered. Gorman, 550 voted; 990 registered. Ranger, 840 voted; 1,593 registered. In the Primaries this past spring, 5,470 Democrats voted and 65 Democrats. In 1968, 6,293 voted and President Nixon won only in the Eastland and absentee boxes. In 1952, the late President Eisenhower carried 17 of the then 27 boxes in Eastland County for first election. His vice presidential running mate, Richard Nixon polled 4,518 votes.

Tied for second in District 9-AA, the Eastland Mavericks move out to improve their status in a clash with the Hamilton Bulldogs here in Maverick Stadium Friday.

Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m. Actually, whipping Hamilton will be more in the class of "maintaining" a posture, rather than necessarily improving it. The Mavericks whipped the Cisco Lobos last week, while league-leader Coleman was downing Clyde.

Cisco faces Clyde this Friday and Coleman takes on Comanche.

Both Hamilton and Comanche are down the district ladder, with Hamilton on the bottom of the ratings, but it is because of this hungeriness, that the Bulldogs could put together an exciting evening for the Mavericks. Coleman leads the pack and Eastland closes the season a week later in Clyde, so the district, as it does historically, can take some turns.

Consumers Report

At this time of the year most of us start thinking about our car's cooling system. Although there are some air cooled cars on the market, most are cooled by water.

While water is an effective agent for cooling the engine of these cars, and certainly it is cheap enough, it has several disadvantages as a coolant. Water contributes to rusting and corrosion of the metal parts with which it comes in contact. The freezing temperature of water is relatively high, 32 degrees, and it boils at comparatively low temperatures, 212 degrees.

Because water freezes so easily, we add an antifreeze solution to the water. This solution should do three things. It should prevent ice from forming in the cooling system during freezing weather. It should raise the boiling point of the coolant in your engine and it should help reduce rusting and corrosion in the cooling system.

There are two main types of antifreeze products. Methyl alcohol is generally composed of 90 percent or more methyl alcohol. The balance of the solution is water, dye and, normally, corrosion inhibitors. If you mix one-half methyl alcohol and one-half water your coolant has a freezing point of 51 degrees below zero but the boiling point of the radiator fluid is lowered from 212 degrees to 173 degrees. It is apparent that a mixture such as this will boil away rapidly in the cooling systems of most modern automobiles.

Ethylene glycol is composed of about 93 percent ethylene glycol, 4 percent water, 3 percent rust and corrosion inhibitors and dye. In addition, some brands have anti-leak material. If your radiator contains one-half ethylene glycol and one-half water, your coolant has a freezing point of 34 degrees below zero but the boiling point is raised to about 265 degrees. Since this boiling point is high enough to prevent ethylene glycol from boiling away at usual engine operating temperatures, such a

solution should last for thousands of miles of driving.

How can you tell which is the best quality of antifreeze? The best way is by reading the label on the container. The label will show the number of quarts of antifreeze coolant needed in your car's cooling system to prevent freezing at different temperatures. If a solution of one-half ethylene glycol and one-half water does not provide protection against freezing down to 34 degrees below zero, the product probably is below standard.

If for some reason you need greater protection against freezing, you simply add a larger percentage of ethylene glycol antifreeze. For example, a solution of 70 percent ethylene glycol and 30 percent water protects from freezing to 85 degrees below zero and also raises the boiling point of the cooling system to about 275 degrees.

Of course, before putting in a new supply of antifreeze you should prepare your car's cooling system by draining and cleaning it thoroughly. Also check all hoses for leaks. To be sure you do this job properly, refer to the car owner's manual. If you use a cleaning solution, be sure to follow the labeled directions exactly and thoroughly flush your cooling system following cleaning. To be sure that you have not lost your protection, you should check your coolant solution from time to time throughout the winter.

A good booklet on antifreeze coolants is available from the Superintendent of Public Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402. It is Consumer Information Series No. 7 and costs only 20 cents. If you have questions in this area, it might be to your advantage to secure a copy of this publication.

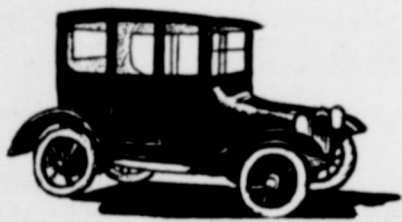

Love, Adoption Broadened Lives Of H.S. Lewis Family

How would you like to have thirteen people drop in for dinner at any given moment? That's what happened over the last weekend to the H.S. (Hub) Lewises, of 302 N. Oak St., in Eastland.

The Lewises are long time

residents of Eastland. Lewis is a transmission line supervisor with Texas Electric Service Company. The family is composed of two daughters, both graduates of Eastland High School, Mrs. Wesley Goheen (Louelle, class of '55). She and her husband live in Houston where Goheen is employed as an air traffic controller at the Wm. P. Hobby International Airport. Mrs. J.B. Scott (Judy, class of '63) and her husband live in Dallas. Scott is employed by Jack's Meat Company.

The love of children on the part of both young families has

increased their own "broods" over and above what they were blessed with naturally. Louelle and Wesley Goheen have one natural son, Steve, 13, and have adopted three other children, under unusual circumstances. The oldest of the group of three is Stacie, 9. The Goheens got Stacie from the Volunteers of America, an agency in Fort Worth run by the Salvation Army. Stacie was four weeks old at the time of her adoption. Later, the family considers themselves lucky to have been able to adopt Melody, now 2½, from a welfare agency in Houston. Melody was the child of an unfortunate Houston mother who was a victim of heroin and LSD. The Goheens were allowed to have Melody only after exhaustive tests had been run on the child, both psychological and medical, to be sure there was no inherited traits from the mother's extended use of the drugs.

Newest member of the Goheen family is "Butch", so named by the Juvenile Court, who was left in a Houston honky-tonk by an unknown man who simply walked into the place one night, sat down on a chair, and told the waitress, "...here, look after him for awhile". This was the last anyone ever saw of the man. It has been assumed by the Court, as well as the Goheens, that perhaps his real parents are dead.

The Goheens have not, as yet, obtained full legal custody of Butch, but are looking forward to that day.

But, the story of love and adoption hasn't ended. Judy Scott, and her husband, J.B., have recently adopted one of Scott's relatives, David Stailey, 18, whose parents were killed in a car wreck. Immediately after their death, David went to live with J.B. Scott's father and mother, but Scott was also killed, and J.B.'s mother was not able, due to her health, to care for David, so the Scotts have taken him into their home.

The Lewises, Goheens, and Scotts are all members of the Church of Christ. Lewis is lay minister of the North Ostrom Church of Christ, in Eastland.

Ag Department To Hold Welding Course

A farm arc welding short course for adult farmers will be held in November under the sponsorship of the Eastland High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. Wendell Siebert, Superintendent and Mr. Don Griffin, teacher of vocational agriculture.

Mr. Bill Hollenback, welding specialist with the Agricultural Education Adult Specialist Program headquartered at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing in the course.

Mr. Hollenback, holds a B.S. degree in Agricultural Education from Oklahoma State University and an M.S. degree in Agricultural Education from Texas A&M University. Mr. Hollenback was a professional welder for Atlas Tank and Steel for five years with headquarters at Tonkawa, Oklahoma. He has taught Vocational Agriculture for seven years prior to joining the Adult Specialist Program.

The short course at Eastland is scheduled to begin Nov. 27, 1972, at 7:00 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held Nov. 28, 29 and 30th. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Hollenback will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Don Griffin.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call Mr. Griffin. An

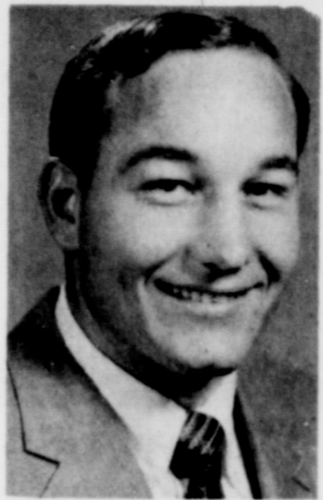
entry fee of \$5.00 will be charged. Farm Welding Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Hollenback states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects

as safety in welding, factors controlled by the operator in running a bead, striking an arc, types of electrodes, preparation of joints, distortion, cutting, hardsurfacing, and pipe welding.

"Short courses in welding, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under a cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University," stated Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M University, who coordinates the program for Texas A&M.

"This cooperative program," states Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide im-
