An Editorial

Through the happen chance find of a long lost deed, and not by design, the City of Eastland got into the library and womens' club business - and Tuesday, voters will decide if the city is to compound its position in these and additional

Voters will mark "for" or 'against" at City Hall Tuesday, Oct. 31, on \$215,000.00 worth of tax bonds which would up taxes 30 percent.

It is hoped that a large turnout of voters go to the polls on that day so that the results, whatever they may be, will be conclusive.

This newspaper has and is urging the defeat of this proposal for several reasons. First and foremost, we hold. as has been stated earlier: it's too much, too soon, advocated by too few.

There are so many things that Eastland needs to be doing that would, if done, benefit more people than this one project. And this is not to fault the need for "adequate" library and meeting facilities. These undoubtedly are needed. but should they be given top priority? We think not. Nor do we think such elaborate, shrine like grandeur is in keeping with Eastland's basic philosophies of sound progressiveness which put us in our enviable position today. We believe that Eastland's low tax structure has contributed greatly to its advancement. If they're raised, we hope it will be for a whole lot of nice improvements and not just one shot in the arm.

If this bond issue passes, the City is going to find itself in the convention center business and no better equipped for that than the women's club business. The few advocates for the center suggest that rentals will pay the month - to - month operations. We doubt it. First, we question whether the clubs and - or groups who would use the center would have the budgets to pay the fees. Secondly, It'd seem that a full - time person would be required to supervise the bookings, cleaning and routine maintenance. These finer points apparently haven't been

worked out, except that it's been said that a board of directors would supervise the

advisability of the city providing club rooms at all.

Afternoon Club over the years have done a wonderful job with their library and few question the city's contributions to that educational process. Not so long ago, the deed was hed showing that the city owns the Women's Club Building which houses the

The building is not in good repair and the women rightfully sought help, for their beloved library first.

Then, some got in a hurry, engaged professionals who conceived a beautiful, but costly master facility to provide library, civic center, complete with stage and kit-




