## Enrollment In Local Schools Listed At 758

Enrollment in Eastland schools for the new semester totals 758 students, Supt. Wendell Siebert revealed this week. A breakdown shows 193 students in high school, 149 at South Ward, 180 in junior high, 204 in West Ward and 32 in Douglas School. The overall number is an increase of one student over enrollment figures released in September. South Ward's enrollment increased by 10, West Ward's increased six and Douglas School remained the same. High School enrollment is down by nine and junior high enrollment dropped six.

## Mavs Dump Wylie; Throckmorton Next

Eastland's vastly improved Mavericks revenge their worst defeat of the season Tuesday night when they upset highly favored Wylie 57-49 in a District 10-A cage game played here. In the first game of the twin bill the Wylie girls downed Eastland's girls, 43-30. It was Eastland all the way in the boys game Tuesday. The Mavs, beaten 48-33 earlier in the year by Wylie, jumped out front in the first period and never turned loose. Dale Slatton pushed his season total to 240 points in 10 games with a 32 point performance, his best of the year. That makes Slatton have an average of 24 points a game, one of the best averages in this part of the state. Both the girls and boys will see action again Friday night. The Mavs will journey to Throckmorton to attempt to take their second win over the Greyhounds. Eastland edged the Hounds in overtime play earlier this year. Clyde, the district leader, downed Throckmorton easily 69-46 to push their district record to five wins and no defeats. Eastland's only chance to win the crown now would be for Clyde to drop their three remaining games while Eastland won theirs. Coach Tate admits that isn't probable, but he says he still hopes the Mavs can ruin Clyde's unbeaten record. The district pace-setters beat Eastland with 18 points, while Peggy Humphreys had seven.

David Fry is serving as chairman of the pancake committee. Others on the committee include Norman Guess, Charlie Marshall, James Wright and Virgil Moore.

Fry passed out 10 tickets to each member of the Lions Club at their Tuesday meeting. "We do not want any pressure exerted by any member of this club in trying to sell these tickets," he declared. "We are not going to high pressure anyone if you don't sell the tickets you just get to buy them yourself, that's all."

Fry said his head cook would be Marshall. "I understand Charlie turned down a very promising career as a short order cook to become a school principal," he explained.

Fry said he faced two critical problems. "I'm having trouble getting enough tickets printed up to meet the demand," he said, "and everyone in the club wants to be head dishwasher, and I hate to hurt anyone's feelings by not selecting him."

Mrs. Virgil Moore, general chairman, said that the Dimes drive, which got off to a two-week late start here, is progressing "better than we had hoped for." She

## Executive Secretary of Christian Churches To Speak At Local Church

Previously, Crow served more than nine years as the pastor of the Hyde Park Christian Church in Austin. He is a graduate of Texas Christian University and Bible College of the Bible. A native of Austin, he is widely known throughout the Brotherhood of the Disciples of Christ. At one time he served as President of the Religious Education Field Workers Association of the Disciples of Christ. His present position is in general assistance of churches, helping to establish new churches, rendering assistance in the evangelistic program of the churches and rendering general assistance to churches and ministers on a consultative basis.

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### MAN-MADE LAW?

Some people find confusing our different state and national laws dealing with the same things. In come tax laws for an example.

Surely, they say, you can have no real justice, unless there is some one "best way" to do each thing — to hold property, to manage traffic, to pay taxes, or to enforce contracts.

So it bothers them. Why should Englishmen drive on the left side of the street? Why should married couples hold title under community property laws in some states and not in others?

Is law merely a man-made contraption? Is it true that like good manners much law is man-made, growing out of custom or local problems. In card games you can play many different games with one deck. You merely change the rules.

But as with cards and all games, the law goes deeper than convention into man's basic needs for order, for a grasp of the part he is to play, and for a way to settle disagreements.

Law provides an orderly way to do things so that people can make long-range plans and work together. Its rules help you to find out where you stand—your rights and duties. And last, law has binding ways of settling disputes if need be, first to keep the peace, and then win people over by dealing with them in ways that satisfy their sense of fairness.

You can find these traits of law in most groups from the most primitive to the civilized. As man finds out more and more about himself and his world, as his experience and wisdom grow, the law may get better. For example, as the psychological laboratories find out more about man's reaction times, his fears and faults, our laws about driving, for instance, may improve.

### Frequent Wash Important To Finish of Car

The finish on the family car should be washed as often in wintertime as in the summer, according to automobile manufacturers. They say street-salt and other chemicals used to melt ice on streets are very harmful to the car's lustrous finish.

A weekly washing is recommended to remove these harmful chemicals from the paint and chrome trim. Bumpers and hubcaps should be cleaned as thoroughly as the finish.

If a once-a-week car wash looks pretty expensive, the job can be done quickly and easily at home.

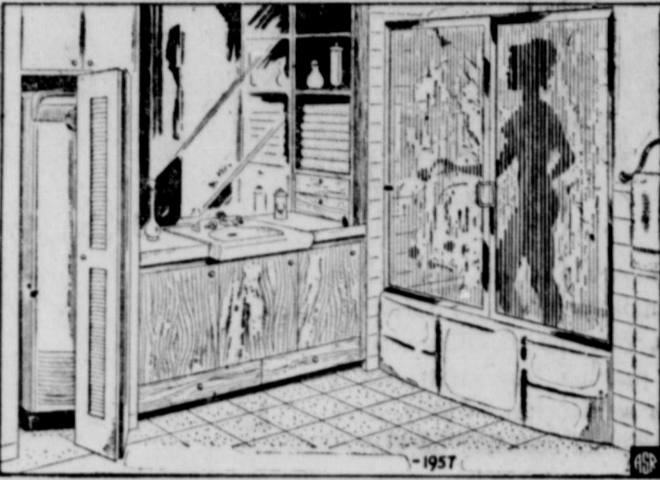
Make sure the necessary equipment is on hand before beginning. High hubber boots should be worn to prevent wet feet, and rubber gloves to protect the hands. Other necessary equipment includes a large sponge, two galvanized steel pails, a garden hose and a chamois or discarded bath towel to wipe the car dry.

Drying the car is an important step to prevent a thin coating of ice over the entire job. If the auto has white wall tires, a steel brush and an abrasive cleaner will get them clean. Use one of the two pails for soapy water and the other for clean rinse water. Two pails will save making extra trip for rinse water.

A word of caution—auto finish specialists recommend the use of lukewarm or cool water when washing the car in cold weather. Hot water on a cold car may take the life out of the car's paint, leaving it dull and lustreless.

### Good Records Save Dollars At Tax Time

College Station.—It is usually the small-expense items, especially those paid for in cash, which are overlooked at income tax reporting time, says Cecil Parker, extension farm management specialist. In his work, Parker says he has observed that farmers could save additional tax dollars by learning which of these items are tax deductible and by keeping accurate records of all expenses and receipts regardless of their size.

Parker has further observed that farmers have little trouble keeping records of major transactions for most are paid by check and the cancelled check then becomes a part of the record. Don't overlook the small items, he advises, for they can amount to a lot of money over a period of a year. They may include such items as interest payments, membership dues in farm organizations, subscriptions to farm magazines or small fees for services required in connection with the farm business, overnight business trips and losses on household goods and equipment used by hired help.

The specialist suggests that all cancelled checks, receipts and re-

ceipts be kept for at least five years and that checks be used whenever possible. Extra check fees are well-worth the protection provided by the cancelled check. Depreciation records should be kept on equipment, improvements and installations and machinery as well as on all purchased breeding animals. These items lose some of their value each year and the loss is deductible for income tax purposes only at the end of the year in which the depreciation occurs.

And finally, Parker suggests a visit with a good farm-income tax consultant. Here advice and suggestions can be secured on all the items which should be included in the farm record system and also a listing of the small items which are deductible and most often overlooked.

### New Ford Trucks Go On Display Friday At King Motor Co. Here

Ford's new 1957 truck line, originally not scheduled for production until 1958, will be introduced by Ford dealers Friday offering nearly 300 different models, the Ford line represents the biggest change in the history of the company, and cost \$77,000, 000 to design and put into production.

"We have made this great change in our truck line because we believe truck users are on the threshold of vast improvement in delivering goods to the American public," said Robert S. McNamara, Ford Motor Company vice president and Ford Division general manager.

"To help truck operators make this progress, Ford has launched the new line a year ahead of its original 1958 scheduled introduction," he explained.

Cutting one year off the design and production schedule cost Ford an extra \$5,900,000, it was disclosed.

The new Ford truck line features new "Style-side" pickup models with streamlined load area 25 per cent bigger than last year; a

new series of six tiltcab transport truck models which are the lowest priced in the industry; a new Ranchero model which combines passenger car styling and comfort with all-around pickup truck utility; greater payload capacities in medium and heavy duty models; and an expanded parcel delivery series.

Engine power throughout the line has been raised an average of 8 per cent to help truck operators stay abreast of modern traffic flow. Engines have been redesigned for better breathing. They have a new rotor oil pump for more effective lubrication, a dry-type air filter that is more easily cleaned, new economical heavy duty carburetors, and lighter flywheels to permit faster acceleration. Hydraulic clutches are a new feature, standard for the whole line at no added cost.

Fear basic power plants are offered, with 27 different modifications available for special hauling service.

Light duty models have new hypoid rear axles, with pinion gears straddle-mounted for longer life. All engines, transmission,

and final components have been redesigned to take more load.

Recognizing the trucking industry's need for greater payloads, better maneuverability, and reduced maintenance time and cost, Ford engineers discarded their former cab-over-engine design.

The new tilt-cab series is the result of this change. Designers shifted 1,100 pounds of vehicle weight to the strengthened front axles of the tilt-cab units. This shift means extra payload of more than a half-ton can be hauled. The tilt-cab tractor's length is only 80 inches, meaning it can handle trailers up to 37 feet long within legal road limits. Reduced length cuts turning radius, and makes handling easier. The whole cab rises out of the way for service, and mechanics can do ordinary maintenance jobs in as much as three hours less time than on old-style models.

The "Style-side" pickup body, with its 25 per cent greater load area, is available on a total of nine light duty models in the new Ford line. In addition to carrying more bulky loads, the new body design makes loading over the sides easier. Also, Ford's pickups are three inches lower than last year, so loads need not be lifted as high as before.

As with the tilt-cab models,

greater cargo space has been built into conventional Ford trucks because total cab and front end length is 2-2 1/2 inches less than last year, permitting a longer body on the rear. With over-all height reduced nearly 3 1/2 inches, Ford truck cabs will be easier to enter than any other make. Though height came down, ground clearance was increased an inch.

Redesign of the new vehicles from the ground up provided opportunity to improve the driver's compartment more than in any previous series.
