Murder Trial Due To Begin Here Monday

A 150 member special venire will report Monday morning in 91st District Court in Eastland where selection of a jury in the George Crawford murder trial is due to begin.

Crawford is charged with "murder with malice" in connection with the Sept. 19, 1956 fatal shooting of his wife, Lilly Pearl Crawford. District Attorney Joe Nuesse says the State will demand the death penalty for Crawford, who before the shooting was con-

sidered a valued employee of the Eastland Memorial Hospital.

Crawford surrendered to officers on the night of the shooting, which took place in the home of friends in Eastland. Witnesses said Crawford emptied a .32 automatic into his wife's back. Frank Spark, has been retained by the dead woman's family to aid Nuesse as special prosecutor. Defense Attorney will be Earl Conner Jr., of Eastland.

Crawford has been held in jail in Eastland since the shooting. Justice of the Peace Jim Boggs has refused to set bond. Mrs. Crawford was the mother of six children, ranging in age from six months to 10 years.

Nuesse said he would fight any attempt to delay the case. "The State is ready and wants to go to trial," he declared. The case has been reset twice so far. Conner has not indicated any intention of asking another delay.

The special venire will be the first called in Eastland County since the Clary murder trial some three years ago. That case failed to go to trial, and was transferred out of the county.

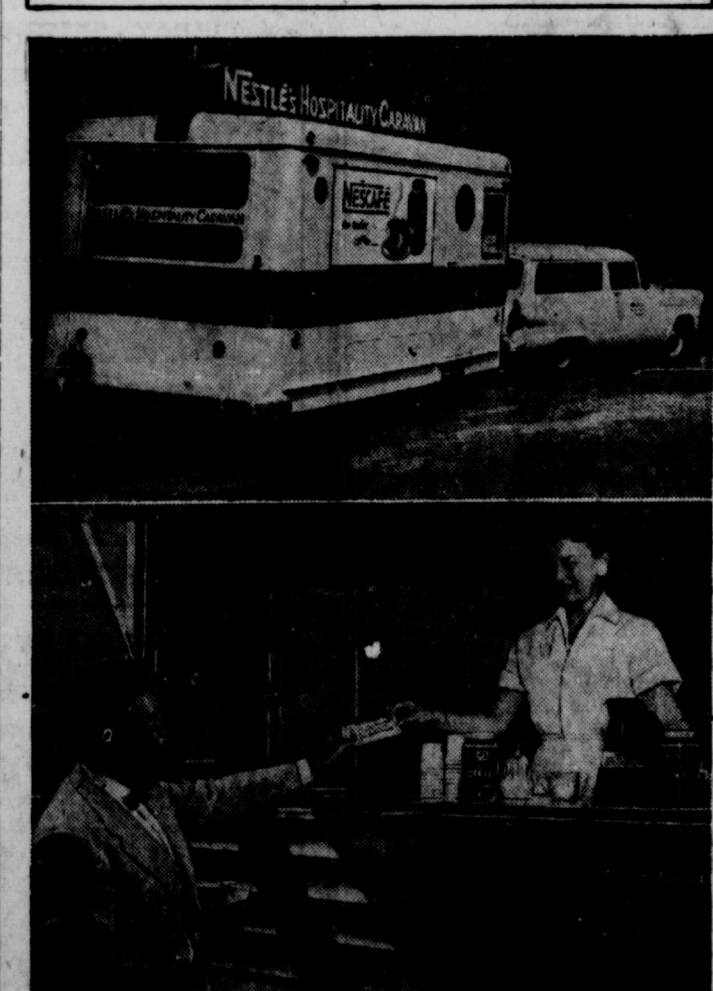
Speaker this year is Lawrence Melton, Dallas civic, religious and church leader.

More Adult Interest Needed In Local 'Y'

"More interest among our adult population in the Y.M.C.A. is needed here," Mrs. Horace Horton declared Saturday.

Mrs. Horton, a leader in the "Y" movement here from the very beginning, gave a most favorable progress report, but the fact that too few are having to do too much kept creeping in between the lines.

Hubert Westfall, who has served as Hi-Y advisor, has resigned that post to begin organizational work among junior high school students. The Hi-Y here has 75 active members. Mrs. Horton said she felt it would be wise to get two or three men to take the duties of advisor so that the workload could be divided. She urged anyone interested in aiding in the program to step forward and let themselves be known.

Cook Needed
She also said a cook is still needed on Saturday nights. All the

facilities for cooking hamburgers and other such short orders are available at the "Y" youth center in the basement of the Petroleum Building, but so far no cook.

"Actually," Mrs. Horton said, "it would give someone a good chance to make a little money and at the same time to do a good deed." She explained that plans call for selling sandwiches and soft drinks to "Y" members at a very reasonable price, with the profit going to the person who does the work.

Mrs. Horton also revealed plans for Hi-Y and Tri-Hi-Y members to attend the district meeting this year in Abilene. She said Eastland members were fortunate that the meeting is to be held so close. She said Abilene "Y" members will invite visiting "Y" members to stay in their homes during the conference.

The meeting will cost members only \$6.75 including transportation, meals and other activities.

County Ordered To Pay \$1667 To W. H. Hailey
An Eastland County Court jury Thursday ordered the County to pay \$1667.50 as market value of property condemned and as damage to remaining property of W. H. Hailey.

The jury set the "reasonable cash market value" of the 5.323 acres condemned at \$667.50 and ruled that damage to the remaining acreage amounted to \$1000.

The land involved is located two miles south of Staff on Farm Market Road 2214. It is located in Commissioner B. M. Bennett's precinct.

A special commission appointed by County Judge John Hart earlier had awarded Hailey \$1000 and "in addition the terms agreed upon by the parties concerning fences, water lines, etc." The County filed an appeal to the ruling.

Quarterback Club Membership Now Over 200 Goal

Eastland Quarterback Club members are now 208 strong. That's the report of Neil Hurt, who is heading this year's membership campaign.

Hurt said that the drive, which began with a goal of 200, is still not over. Last year the club had 109 members. The 200 goal was believed to be a little high by most members, but Hurt and his small committee went over the top in record time.

Many believe that the figure is the highest in the club's history. A few old timers recall that a "back there one time" there were more members in the organization, but no one can recall just when. The biggest number showing in the record book was 187.

After being cornered by Ranger Chief of Police W. G. Gounds and told the facts of life, six Ranger Junior College have confessed they were the perpetrators of the fake shooting that took place in front of Shorty Varner's Cafe on Highway 80 Wednesday night.

Although at liberty at the present time, their fate will hinge on the outcome of a meeting scheduled for Saturday between Chief Pounds, Sheriff J. B. Williams and Texas Ranger Jim Riddle.

The boys said they did it all as a Ranch Day prank, but it is said they violated so many laws it was hard to find a starting place to consider their case.

The case was broken by the black and white 1957 Ford car which has been a prominent vehicle on the RJC campus for weeks.

As a matter of fact, the car and its occupants were picked up by Ranger City Policeman Don Butler only a short time after the "shooting" took place. Butler took the car and the boys to the police station. (Continued on Page 2)

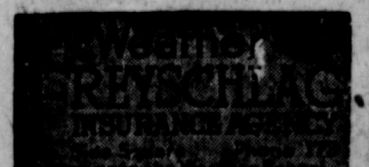

Former Eastland Man Receives National Honors

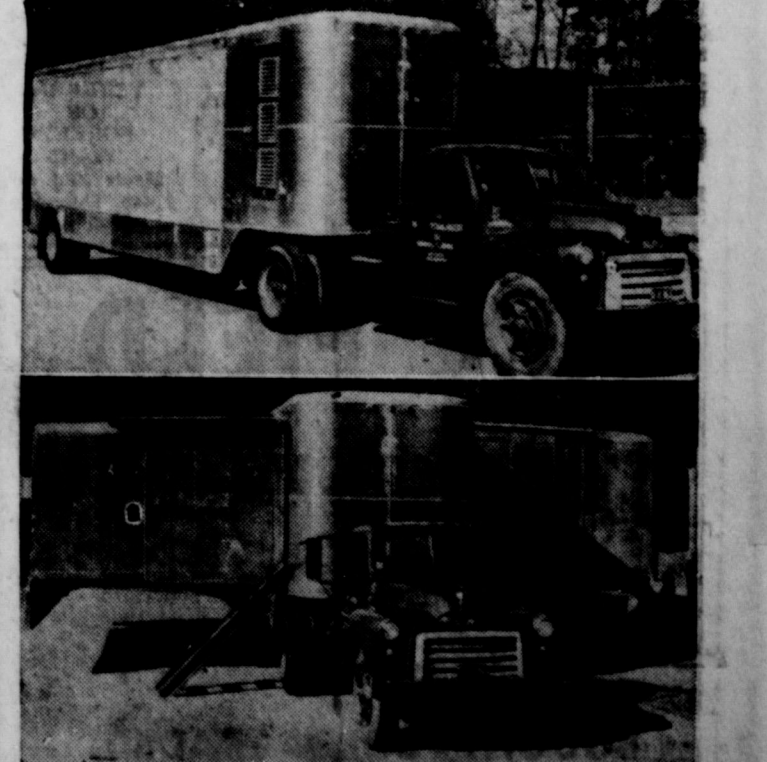

Thursday afternoon the car drove up and parked at the curb across the street from the Ranger police headquarters and Pounds decided right then was as good a time as any to have it out with the boys. He got the owner of the car on the carpet and told him there was no use beating about the bush, that the police knew it was the car involved, and he asked the boy if he had been driving it Wednesday night. The boy said he had, and after lengthy questioning he admitted it was the car the officers were looking for. The owner of the car later named all of the other boys involved, Chief Pounds said.

Suspicion never had been lifted from the car, even after Varner failed to identify it. It was noted at the Ranger Times that the car appeared at the office just as the paper was coming off the press Thursday afternoon, and two boys entered to get copies of the paper and appeared to be having a lot of fun reading the story of the "shooting."

Chief of Police Pounds said the lads have now decided there wasn't anything very funny about it. The chief said he realized the whole thing was an innocent Ranch Day trick without any thought being

Kids Cautioned About Flying Kite Near Highlines

Texas Electric Service Company today appealed to parents to caution their children about flying kites near electric wires.

"The windy season brings kite flying time and this traditional sport is one that is lots of fun for children if it is done safely," A. N. Larson, Texas Electric Service Company manager, pointed out. "Many youngsters don't realize the dangers in this innocent pastime if certain safety rules are not observed, the most important of which is to never fly kites where there is the possibility of them getting tangled in electric power lines."

Other dangerous practices in connection with kite flying include using metallic cord or wire for the kite string, making the kite frame of metal, flying kites in the rain when even a cotton kite string can become a dangerous conductor of electricity and trying to retrieve a kite in case it does get caught in electric wires, Larson stated.

"Local youngsters who fly kites have been careful and cooperative in the past and we've had no serious mishaps in several years, but each year, over the nation, there are many cases of injuries to kite flyers," Larson said. "If kites are made right and flown right, kite flying is an enjoyable wholesome sport."
