The first order of business in the Tuesday, September 21, City Council regular meeting was the passing of an ordinance by Council, amending the budget for the fiscal year of 1981-82. This was done in order to adjust the prior budgeted receipts and disbursements of 1981-82 to the current estimated bud-

Council also passed an ordinance approving the adoption of a budget for the fiscal year heginning October 1, 1982, and ending September 30, 1983, which included revenue sharing. Seperate appropriations for the budget are included at the end of the An ordinance was passed

levying taxes for the use and support of the municipal government of the city of Muleshoe, providing for the interest and sinking fund for the year, 1982-83 and providing for the time and manner of paying the ad valorem taxes levied. The amount of taxes levied for ad valorem taxes (all property, real, personal and mixed within the city limits) was set at a tax of \$0.63 per \$100 of valuation of property. An amount of \$0.57 of this 63 cents is for the general funds, and \$0.06 to be provided for the interest and sinking fund of the city. Ad valorem taxes shall become due on the first day of October, 1982, and may be paid up to and including the following January 31, without

penalty; but, if not paid,

delinquent and penalties provided by law will be added for each month they are delinquent. These taxes represent less than 3 per cent increase over last year's tax rate.

#### Grant Received For Airport

A representative in

Senator John Tower's office notified the Journal by phone Thursday that an FFA Airport and Airway Insprovement grant has been approved for the proposed Muleshoe Municipal Airport. The amount of the initial grant will be \$411,948 to be used to construct runways for the new general aviation airport. According to Dave Marr, City Manager, more grant funds are expected sometime after the first of October for additional building of the proposed airport. Since no written agreements have yet been received, further information was not available at this time. A more detailed report will appear in a later issue of the Journal.

Council also adopted an ordinance amending the code of city sewer service and revising the charges for sewer rates for the first time since 1975. City Manager Marr stated that the reason for these increases was simply because the service charge was not pay-Cont. Page 6, Col. 1

Do you really control your snack choices -- or do your habits control you? If changes are needed, only YOU can decide to make them -- and that will depend on four steps: a specific goal, a learning nutrition basis, "unlearning" misinformation and changing your traditions. Few of us eat foods because we've been told they're "good for us", particularly when it comes to snacks. In fact, health may be one of the least - effective notivations for change. Most of us will respond to a specific goal, however -- weight reduction or diabetes control, for example, so setting a specific goal is step 1. Of course, if we can see health as part of our specific goal, then our food choices will be a stronger one, especially where snacks are concernedl The second step is controlling snack choices is understanding nutrition basics -and how snacking can fit into each day's total nutrition picture. We need facts that point out pathways to our nutrition future -- suggest the time and effort that success will require. Most of us are interested in nutrition only if it means something good will result today. We seek immediate results, and we're not too realistic about the time and effort needed to reach or obtain our desireed goal. Learning nutrition basics will help us to be realistic for now and for later as we make meal and snack choices throughout life. Learning and "unlearning" is a never-ending process and about my choices? 5) Do I nutrition education is not a simple matter. Changes in types and forms of foods will become even greater in the future, so there will be "unlearning" along with the learning. "Unlearning" is the third step in controlling food choices, and realizing that this is a constant

throughout life will make the third step in changing our eating and snacking habits more successful. The fourth step is developing the ability to actually change. One key to success is knowing how strongly food habits become entrenched in our daily routines. Their grip is so strong we often fail to recognize that the laws of nutrition apply to everyone -- or we ignore that fact. How do we know if we need to change? Start with self-analysis. /) What factors are most important when I select particular foods? 2) How does my overall dietary program affect my lifestyle and health? 3) Or, does my lifestyle determine my eating habits? 4) Do I decide on meals and snacks out of impulse, or am I rational really understand why I choose the foods I eat? Remember, also, for most people, the price of food items does not play a central role in consumer decisions -- cost does limit our purchases, but it doesn't determine our eating habits. Here's one last 'super snacks' available.

this first step is controlling process in which will go on question - a "food fer thought" question. Are you snacking more? Recent food consumption surveys indicate that more Americans are eating more foods between meals. Snacking is part of our lifestyle. Unplanned snacking, however, can lead to health problems such as obesity and tooth decay. To avoid potential problems, select snack foods carefully, and make them "super "Super snacking" doesn't require special foods. Old standbys, such as carrots, celery and apples, are excellent choices, but so are other foods. For variety try fresh pineapple, unbuttered popcorn, cheese, vegetable juice, or frozen yogurt. The best way to approach snacking is to plan for the in-between meal Take time to think about your food habits. Do you skip breakfast or do you frequently miss lunch or do you snack while watching television? Recognizing when you snack can help you avoid snacking on empty calorie foods. If you know that you will eat between meals, you can be sure to have nutritious



Council also adopted an ordinance which repealed ordinance number 15 of the City, and adopted a new ordinance pertaining to licenses for peddlers or itinerant vendors, including fees, rules, etc.

Budget estimates for the period of October 1, 1982, to September 30, 1983, were adopted and approved and are set forth as fol-

1. The sum of \$984,108 is appropriated out of the general fund for operating expenses and capital outlay of the city government, which is up from the \$957,710 in the 1981 - 82 budget.

2. Appropriated out of the general debt service fund for the purpose of paying accruing interest and redeeming serial bonds and warrants as they mature, the sum of \$81,388 was set forth, as compared to \$80,025 for the same category for 1981-82.

3. The sum of \$409,128 was appropriated out of the Water and Sewer Revenue Fund for the paying of operating expense, capital outlay and debt service for the Water and Sewer Revenue Fund. The amount appropriated in the 1981 -82 budget was \$375,908.

4. In revenue sharing funds, \$79,603 was appropriated for the payment of operating expenses and capital outlay of the City Government. A large portion of this is tagged for seal coating of streets. The figure on the same thing

last year was \$63,597. 5. The sum of \$5,200 was appropriated out of the Airport Fund for payment of operating expenses and capital outlay of the Munic-

ipal Airport as compared to the \$10,450 appropriated for 1981-82.

Each of these appropriations are set forth in detail in the actual budget.

The Council also considered and approved a proposed platt, which will be called the Hunter Subdivision of the City of Muleshoe. This particular plat of land is located west of the Five Area Telephone and will be used to develop lots for sale for mobile homes. According to calculations by the Council, a portion of this land lies within the city limits now, and the other portion, which lies outside the city limits, would be annexed in the Courts Busy Cont. from Page 1

The seventh grade Mules kicked off another game, September 16, against the Breezers of Floydada. was a shut-out for the Bre-






#### **UIL Plans** Activities Conference



"Yesterday my eyes opened wide and my vision was clear. Today, I cannot control my dropping eyelids, and I see two of you.

"Yesterday I ate a hearty meal of chewy meat and vegetables. Today I must take nourishment through a straw; I don't have the strength to chew."

The person who made these statements is a myasthenic, someone plagued by the mysterious malady called myasthenia gravis (MG). Its symptoms come and go from one day to the next, sometimes from one hour to the next. Persons with MG are assulted with a baffling array of symptoms that range from fatigue to dropping eyelids, to loss of balance, slurred speech and difficulty in walking, swallowing, chew-




Wednesday night, September 29, will be the firemen's family watermelon feast. It will be at 7:30 p.m. at the fire station.

Class room instruction was held on hazardous materials, fire ground tactics, preserving evidence with salvage, air craft firefighting and civil disorders. Field classes included instruction on ladders, pump operations, spill, house, LPG fires and breathing apparatus.



ing and breathing. Every year, for the past

20 years, Dr. J.E. Tether, associate professor of neurology at Indiana University School of Medicine or one of his associates, has held a two-day MG Clinic at Hi Plains Hospital in Hale Center. In the last five years alone, 30 patients have been diagnosed as myasthenics. One man diagnosed at the clinic had lived, and almost died, with the disease for 30 years before receiving a correct diagnosis. Now in remission, he does a full day's hard labor.

Dr. Tether is the only physician in the United States who devotes his total private practice to the diagnosis and treatment of myasthenia gravis.

Once thought to be a rare disease, MG now is believed to torment one person in every 10,000 to 40,000 persons. Because weakness and fatigue are symptoms of so many illnesses, even the most reputable physicians have misdiagnosed MG - calling it vitamin deficiency, anemia, neurosis or psychoneurosis, even brain tumor. It can strike amyone of any age at any time.

Dr. Tether, "that most myasthenics, when properly diagnosed and treated, can return to a normal life."

The free clinic at Hale Center this year, will be Oct. 1-2, beginning at 8 a.m. each day. Diagnosis and treatment will be prescribed without charge, but an appointment is necessary, said Jenne McVicker of Muleshoe, secretary of the Northwest Texas Chapter of the Myasthenia Gravis Foundation. Appointments can be made by calling (806) 839-2471. New patients must have a physician's referral for an ap-

pointment. The free clinic also will provide consultation services for persons already diagnosed.

Dr. Tether will address chapter members and guests on strides in recent researh on MG at a chapter meeting at 8 p.m., Oct. 1, at the First Baptist Church of Hale Center.
