Garden, Gardener Benefit From Exercise With Spade

One of gardening's extra bonus-es is exercise—and no place is that exercise more profitably applied than in spring spading. To one unfamiliar with it, spad-

To one unfamiliar with it, spad-ing might well appear to be an onerus chore, to be delayed or avoided whenever possible. Ac-tually, eight hours work, spread over as many days, will give the gardener 1,500 square feet of spaded soil—and, no sore muscles. Gardening experts agree that there is no substitute for spad-ing or plowing. In a small gar-

den, of course, plowing is im-practical, so the home gardener usually must rely on his spade.

Faced with a spading job, the novice gardener would be only human if he asked himself, "Why do it, anyway? The answer is the same simple

explanation for any of the things done around a garden, "To help the seeds grow."

Roots must have air and water, and unless these essential ele-ments can penetrate the soil, the plants are starved.

Like any job, spading is easier when it is done systematically. To begin, don't try to turn over your whole garden in one day. This would make an otherwise pleasant exercise back-breaking labor.

It is important that you don't skimp on the depth of your spad-ing. Limit the area that you spade each day, rather than the depth to which the soil is turned. Drive the spade straight down, not at an angle, so that you get the full benefit of its 12-inch blade.

The first day, spade as much as you can without tiring. Let that be your guide for succeed-ing days' work. When you know about how much one hour's work is, translated into the amount of
