ABOUT Eastland

Ever heard of ECO? It's a fascinating deal, and one which we think would go over despite the fact that Dr. Jim Whittington, who thought up the idea in the first place, terms it a "beautiful but unworkable theory."

ECO would be an organization to get more small industries operating in Eastland County. Note that word "county," it is important. For we didn't say Eastland, we included Ranger, Cisco, Rising Star, Gorman, Carbon, Olden, Desdemona, Scranton and any other spot in the county.

The theory, as best we understand it, works something like this. ECO finds a man with a good idea and helps him put it over. For instance, say a guy has made himself a mousetrap that not only catches a mouse when it happens to get in it, but reaches out and grabs it when it takes its first step. Now we all know that old saying about inventing a mousetrap better than all the rest and the world will beat its way to your doorstep. We also know that it is one of the most often quoted lies in the world.

That's where ECO comes in. They find the fellow really does have a trap that would sell, if only he could get it on the market. So ECO calls in Mr. Super Sales, ECO's one and only salesman. He looks the product over, gets a few samples and goes on the road. He doesn't try to sell the trap door to door, instead he hunts wholesale markets. Mr. Super Sales does his job well, gets orders for 100,000 dozen traps and reports back. Our inventive hero looks at the order and passes out. "I couldn't make that many traps in a year," he declares when ECO man asks him why. "I would need money to buy equipment that I don't have."

ECO agrees. They tell the fellow he lives in America, where the wonderful capitalist system is in force. They go with him to a banker or some other investor, wave the order for 100,000 dozen traps in the money man's face, and our hero gets his money.

Now Mr. Mousetrap puts five men to work making his traps. He may be in Ranger, Cisco, or Eastland, or one of the other towns, but he must be in Eastland County.

Mr. Super Sales, by the way, didn't go on the road with just the go-get-'em trap. He had about 50 Eastland County-made traps with him. Some of them he sold, some of them he didn't. But in all, he got enough sales to put about 10 new small industries in business. These 10 businesses pay so much to ECO to help pay the cost of keeping Mr. Super Sales on the road and for operating expenses. They may even need a second salesman.

A couple of years pass by. ECO is getting to be a big thing. A few fellows in neighboring counties decide they would like to get in on the deal. They come see the ECO boys. "Why, certainly," ECO tells the gentlemen. "You boys have some products there that Mr. Super Salesman could sell. We would be pleased to have you in our organization." There's just one requirement. You have to move within the bounds of Eastland County. Pick your spot, but it must be in county."

outsiders move in to get in on the good deal. The story repeats itself a hundred times. Soon some of the small industries are big industries. Maybe they even out-grow ECO, and if so ECO would without doubt set them free.

What has happened? Eastland County has quit fighting like brothers and sisters. An Eastland County Chamber of Commerce springs up. An Eastland County airport springs up. An Eastland County recreation center is built. Anything that Eastland County wants it can now get, because its people are united and strong enough.

"But wait," you say. "No one around here has a mouse trap that would sell."

No, maybe not. But we personally know of several little products that folks around here make to sell locally that would go over like hotcakes. And if you will admit it, so do you.

Since success breeds copycats, the system would by this time have been started in other counties. But

Local Clean-Up Drive Underway

Today begins Clean-Up, Pick-Up and Fix-Up Week in Eastland. This year members of the Civic League and Garden Club, annual sponsors, have announced a special goal: to make the city shine for the first all-Eastland High School homecoming in June.

The City is cooperating with the Civic League as in the past. City Manager Jimmy Young said city workers would begin special trash pick-ups the first week in April, so actually the drive will continue for a little over two weeks.

Young said that all types of trash will be picked up. He said everyone should put the trash in the usual place that it is picked up. He urged citizens to keep their pick-ups reasonable, however. Trees and limbs must be saved up small enough that two men can handle them, and rocks a n d concrete must be broken up.

Eastland has held the drive for many years and at one time was named the cleanest small city in the United States by the National Clean-Up, Fix-Up, Pick-up organization.

A spokesman said, "It is reasonable that many ex-citizens will be here during the homecoming. We want them to find Eastland a wonderful place to live, so that some may even decide they would like to move back home. By cleaning our city up even more than it is now, we may accomplish just that."

Car Sales Rate As Big Business Here

Probably one of Eastland's most important assets is one which, although respected by many, is overlooked by even more. It is the retail automobile business.

Few here realize that Eastland is probably the leading small city in the entire state in both sales and market. Total amount of money spent here on new cars alone last year has been estimated at \$3,474,000.

A total of 1158 new motor vehicles were sold by Eastland retailers during 1956. Dealers here include Blevins Motors, Mulrhead Motors, Don Pierson, Fullen Motors, Rushing Motors, McGraw Motors, King Motors, Wayne Motors and Tom's Sport Cars.

It's a buyers market, and one which draws customers from a large area.

Soil Conservation Work Is Progressing In Area

Farmers and ranchers of this area continue to apply conservation practices to their lands at a most favorable rate. Terrace construction on cropland is the number one goal of many landowners at this time. Based on the capability of the land as determined by depth of the top soil, the slope of the field and the amount of erosion that has already taken place some 1500 miles of terraces are needed in this area. The purpose of terraces is twofold—to hold maximum rainfall on the land where it falls and to conduct excessive run off water to protected outlets with least possible erosion.

Soil Conservation Service technicians of the local work unit assisting the soil conservation districts supervision work with land owners in laying out a terrace system for their fields, give needed supervision during construction and finally check the complete terraces to determine that each terrace meets specification and will function properly. The total amount of terraces constructed by the land owner is then certified to a S. C. committee for payment in case land owner has requested cost share on the practice. Eastland county has a most favorable A.C.P. program on terrace construction. Payments for terracing is 70 percent of the cost of construction not to exceed \$5.00 per hundred feet, which is a maximum of \$3.50 per hundred feet Federal cost share.

W. H. Cooper of the Cisco area recently completed one and a half

miles of terraces on his cropland. H. A. Scitern of the Carbon area constructed over two miles of terraces on his farm with his own farm equipment. F. S. Crawley near Staff built one and a half miles on his farm, and Wayne White in the same area has completed about two miles of terraces on his farm. J. G. Harlow has recently built about three miles of terraces on his farms west of Eastland. Bill Mitcham of Cisco is now building about four and a half miles on his ranch north of Cisco. Roy Adams west of Cisco is now building about three miles of terraces, and J. D. Herrell is building about a mile on his farm near Olden.

Examination For Rural Carrier To Be Held April 9

An examination for rural carrier for the post office at Eastland will be open for acceptance of applications until April 9, 1957, the Commission announced today.

"Applicants for this examination must actually reside within the delivery of the above-mentioned post office and must have so resided for one year next preceding the closing date for acceptance of applications. They must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date. There is no maximum age limit. However, persons who have passed the age of 70 may be considered only for temporary renewable appointments of one year.

"Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office for which this examination is being announced. Application forms must be filed with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, 25, D. C. and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date."

County Officers Nab Pair Of Car Thieves

The Ranger Police Department flashed the word again shortly after noon Thursday that caused a network of road blocks to be thrown up all over this section of West Texas but it was not a false alarm like it was the last time when a front shooting was pulled off in front of a cafe there and the road blocks were called out.

Officers caught a couple of young hoodlums this time, thanks to the alertness of the Ranger Police in losing no time putting the network on its toes.

It all started when Calvin Brown, owner of Ranger Lumber and Supply Company of Ranger, reported his car stolen only seconds after it had been taken away from its parking place.

Ranger police notified the network of law officers and in the short length of time that it took the car thieves to drive from here to Cisco the alert was on.

Cisco officers spotted the thieves, who turned out to be a pair of juvenile hoodlums from Fort Worth, as they drove into Cisco, but the moment the officers started to give chase the police car they were driving had a blowout. The officers radioed ahead to Sheriff J. B. Williams at Eastland, and more road blocks went up all over Eastland, Callahan and Brown Counties.

The young hoodlums drove through one road block on the Cisco-Putnam road when the officer in charge thought they were a couple of local boys he knew. However, their escape was short-lived because they were arrested shortly afterward about four miles west of Cottonwood on a rural road by Deputy George Caudle of Brown County.

The youths were turned over to Sheriff Williams who locked them up in the Eastland County jail. The boys told the sheriff they had stolen a car in Fort Worth which they drove to a spot near Ranger before stealing Brown's car, but if they did abandon such a car it has not been located anywhere near Ranger.

They later told Williams it might have been Weatherford where they left the car. They also told him several different stories about their ages and about what they had been doing over the past few days.

Calvin Brown's car was returned to him apparently unharmed. At last accounts, Williams was thinking of getting in touch with the parents of the car thieves, and also the Fort Worth officers.

The resolution is as follows:
RESOLUTION
BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF EASTLAND COUNTY WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT, CALLING AN ELECTION FOR THE PURPOSE OF ELECTING (4) DIRECTORS OF SAID DISTRICT.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF EASTLAND COUNTY WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT:

1. That an election be held on April 2nd, 1957, in Eastland County Water Supply District as created by House Bill No. 888, passed by the Fifty-First Legislature, and as amended by House Bill No. 845 by the Fifty-Third Legislature, for the purpose of electing (4) Directors of said District.

2. For the purpose of said election, Eastland County Water Supply District is divided into two election precincts. All of the territory of the District contained in the City of Ranger shall be known as the "Ranger Precinct" and all the territory of the District contained in the City of Eastland shall be known as the "Eastland Precinct".

5. Mr. F. P. Brashier, Wilson Guest, M. H. Perry, L. E. McGraw have made application to this board to have their name printed on the Ballot and such applications are hereby granted. The Ballot however, shall be large enough to permit the writing in of other names.

7. No person shall be elected a Director unless he resides in and owns taxable property in the District. No member of the Governing body of the City of Ranger or the City of Eastland and no employee of either of said cities shall be elected as Director.

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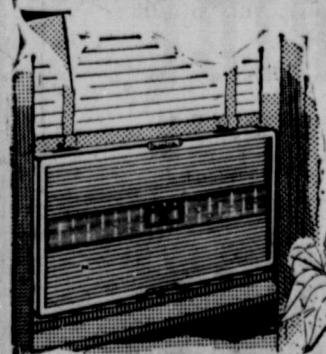
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Importance of Family Recreation Stressed At Training Workshop

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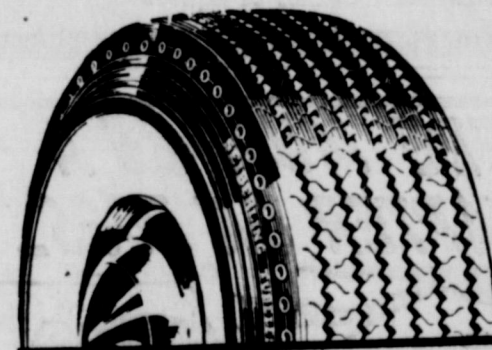


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
