RISING STAR - Rising Star will host the annual Eastland County Pecan Field Day Friday, April 26, it was announced this week after a meeting held by County Agent J. M. Cooper of Eastland with the County Pecan Growers Association and the Rising Star Chamber of Commerce.

The meeting will be held at the American Legion Hall beginning at 10 a.m. when Extension Service specialists and other pecan experts will discuss various phases of pecan culture and insect control. Speakers will include L. G. Rom-

berg of the U. S. Pecan Station at Brownwood; B. G. Hancock of Texas A&M College; T. E. Denman of the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station at Stephenville, and W. Foster, Weatherford entomologist.


Early in the afternoon there will be a meeting of the County Pecan Growers Association to consider proposed by-laws and a constitution for the newly organized organization.


